SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Frankfort-Schuyler Families and Community,

I am honored and humbled to serve as the Superintendent of Schools at Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District. I continue to be proud of the accomplishments of our students and staff. The collaboration exhibited throughout our school buildings is tremendous and has lead us to great achievements.

As we navigate another budget season, I must also mention the commitment our Board demonstrates during the budget planning process. Each Board member has been actively involved in the development of the budget, asking thoughtful questions and reviewing all aspects of our expenditures as well as anticipated revenues. This work would also not be possible without the wisdom and guidance of our Assistant Superintendent, the District Administrative Team, and the numerous hours of lobbying we participated in in Albany. As a result of the extensive planning, advocating, analysis and future projections, the Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District is committed to providing our families and community with the necessary budget information to make an informed decision on Tuesday, May 21, 2024.

Our proposed budget balances the needs of both the taxpayers of the Frankfort-Schuyler school community and our students, through the development of a fiscally responsible budget designed to provide our students with the best diversified educational program. The proposed 2024-2025 school budget includes an increase in spending of 3.5% for

the Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District. The total budget of \$24,049,619 includes a tax increase of \$421,820. This will result in a 4.98% tax increase for Frankfort-Schuyler homeowners.

This fiscal plan upholds the goals of the Frankfort-Schuyler CSD Strategic Plan and maintains desirable class sizes, continues the implementation of our regular instructional program, maintains current transportation services, maintains our student support programs, and maintains our two full day pre-K classes. This budget also continues to support our After School Exploratory Enrichment Program, and maintains the current interscholastic athletic and co-curricular programs. In order to be prepared for potential future reductions in federal and state aid, we are attempting to appropriate well-planned reserves to sustain our programs and serve the needs of our students and staff, while still considering the District's fiscal future.

Please take the time to read our newsletter before going to vote on May 21. You may also wish to review our budget presentation, which can be accessed on our website. Your consideration of the 2024-25 school budget is greatly appreciated.

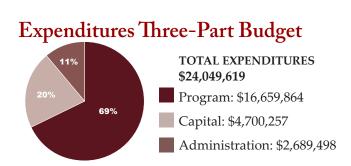

Frankfort-Schuyler CSD Earns Utica National's School Safety Excellence Award



The Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District is one of at least 160 school districts and Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) in New York State to receive the Utica National Insurance Group's School Safety Excellence Award for 2024 at the Titanium with Honors level.

The honor is presented annually and recognizes school districts' safety efforts as they work to help keep students, staff and visitors safe. The Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District received its award at Utica National's 42nd school safety seminar, one of seven such seminars the company hosts in the state.

Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District officials accepted a certificate to commemorate the District's safety efforts and a check for \$500 to use as reimbursement for and/or in connection with the school safety program.

Utica National's School Safety Excellence Award Program has three levels – titanium, platinum and gold – in which schools can earn a meritorious distinction by meeting specific criteria to enhance overall safety. Through the program, schools with their own transportation, schools with contract transportation, and BOCES are evaluated. Categories covered include bullying prevention programs, playground safety and other areas, and are measured using specific, quantifiable surveys.

"Safety and health concerns continue to be a priority in our school districts," explained Brian Saville, Senior Vice President in Utica National's Educational Institutions Unit. "Districts that go 'above and beyond' to provide a safe, healthy and focused culture for learning are to be applauded, and we're pleased to count Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District among them."

Frankfort-Schuyler Elementary School Psychologist Jana Lambert Receives School Psychologist of the Year Award

After 21 years working as a school psychologist with the Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District, Jana Lambert has added a new title to her name: School Psychologist of the Year.

The New York Association of School Psychologists (NYASP) Chapter F named Mrs. Lambert School Psychologist of the Year, and she was then chosen out of 15 chapter winners across New York to receive the statewide Frank Plumeau School Psychologist of the Year award. She was then honored at the NYASP annual conference in Saratoga in November.

Mrs. Lambert has worked at Frankfort-Schuyler Elementary School for all 21 years of her tenure with the District, and she was nominated for the award by Frankfort-Schuyler Elementary School Principal Mrs. Melanie Welch.

"I was so incredibly honored and humbled to even be nominated," Mrs. Lambert said. "I was very surprised to be notified that I was chosen, and I certainly did not expect it."

"Frankfort-Schuyler CSD has been blessed to have Mrs. Lambert in our school district for over 20 years," Mrs. Welch said in her letter nominating Mrs. Lambert for the award. "She is well respected in the community. She facilitates family and school partnerships, and also interacts with community agencies to enhance academic and social-behavioral outcomes for children."

Last spring, Mrs. Lambert was part of the team that accepted the What's Great in Our State award from the New York State Office of Mental Health on behalf of the Frankfort-Schuyler Central School District. The award was given for the various mental health and social-emotional learning efforts within the District.

Within her role as school psychologist, Mrs. Lambert juggles many different responsibilities, including: conducting psychoeducational and behavioral assessments to determine disabilities and learning styles, and helping to develop plans to enable students to achieve their best; consulting with teachers, staff, administration and outside agencies to address students' academic, behavioral and social-emotional needs; serving as DASA co-coordinator; providing individual counseling to both special and general education students; co-founding the Spirit Team to promote positivity and pride in school for both students and staff; heading the school-wide character education program and the anti-bullying Unity Day celebration; and more.

Mrs. Lambert also developed a four-week Diversity and Differences curriculum to teach second grade students awareness of different cultures, beliefs, abilities and disabilities, and a six-week Girl Power Lunch program for fourth grade students to address topics such as self-esteem, body image, bullying and social conflicts, among others.

When asked what her favorite part of her job is, Mrs. Lambert said that every day is different and it's never boring. She also enjoys working with students and watching them grow and shine in their own ways.

"I am very mindful that the little things that we say to and do for a student can make a world of difference to them," Mrs. Lambert said. "We all make an impact on our students, whether we realize it or not. I choose to make it as positive as possible!"

Mrs. Lambert said she wants students and staff to feel safe and supported when they're in school, and to know that they're all part of the same team.

"Mrs. Lambert maintains the highest level of legal, ethical and professional practice of any staff member I've had the pleasure of working with," Mrs. Welch said. "The services she provides are consistent with professional standards, including effective interpersonal skills, responsibility, adaptability, dependability, advocacy, respect and commitment to equity."

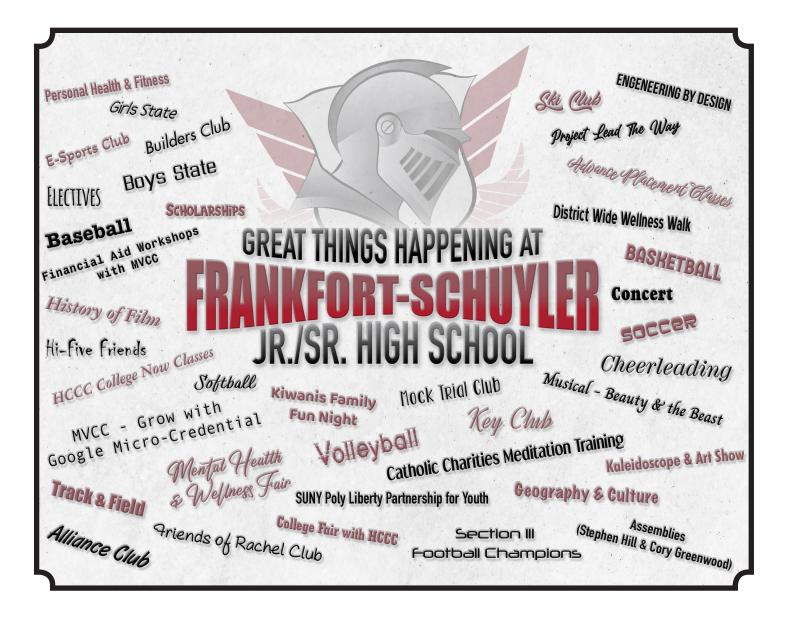

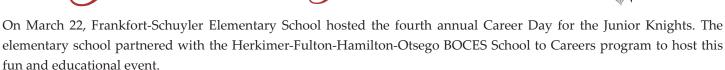


COMETS PLAYERS VISIT K-KIDS CLUB

FRANKFORT-SCHUYLER FIRST GRADERS LEARN ABOUT FARMING

On November 30, 4-H Educator Wendy Richardson from the Cornell Cooperative Extension of Herkimer County visited Frankfort-Schuyler Elementary School to teach first grade students about farming.

Richardson's lesson, called My Farm Web, was taught with the help of the book "If It Weren't for Farmers" by Allan Fowler. She handed out pictures of various agricultural concepts to the students and they used photos and yarn to create a web that explored the role of agriculture in their daily lives, as well as how most of the things that we use daily can be tracked back to the farm.

Agriculture is an umbrella term that includes many concepts, ranging from farm to fork and from field to fabric. In addition to food and fiber, agriculture also provides numerous products for industrial use such as linseed oil for paint and corn for fuel. The lesson plan was designed for young learners to focus on just one aspect of agriculture: farming. The students used the pictures and yarn to create a simple concept web and the relationships were then discussed as a class while the concept web was completed.

Richardson regularly teaches hands-on activities throughout the school year with various groups of students. The purpose of these activities is to teach students the importance of agriculture, dairy and beef through the Dairy in the Classroom program.
