





Finals scheduled for last week of school for freshmen, sophomores, and juniors

ALL FINAL EXAMS WILL BE GIVEN DURING THE FINAL EXAM PERIODS!

Finals will take place during each of your class periods. Some form of structured evaluation is expected to be given to students during the examination period. The nature and design of the course or curriculum should dictate the method of final examination.

- The first final exam will begin on Monday, May 20 at 8:15 AM.
- All students will remain in classes for the entire final exam period.
- Students will **<u>not</u>** be required to attend commons or study hall during final exams times.
- The commons will be made available and supervised for study during finals for those wanting to stay at school during free periods.
- During break times between exams, students will be allowed to access the commons, study quietly in the classrooms, or leave the building. There will be no loitering in the halls or bathrooms.



French Students Take on France

During Spring break, twenty-three French students traveled to France with Monsieur Wopat and Monsieur Pettys to spend a week touring the D-Day beaches, a couple of castles, and finally the city of lights, Paris. The trip began with a stop in Chartres, a city near Paris known for its large Cathedral. Then the group headed to Normandy, where they spent the next three days touring multiple D-Day beaches, the American Cemetery, the walled city of Saint-Malo, and finally touring the Mont Saint Michel. Their return towards Paris took them through the Loire Valley where they toured Leonardo Da Vinci's house, a castle in Amboise, and Chenonceau, a castle over the Loire River. Finally, the group spent the last three days in Paris. They took a bike tour of Paris, visited the Eiffel Tower, Louvre, Arc de Triomphe, and Montmartre. Despite some chilly mornings and a few rain showers, the students had a great time, tried new foods, and walked away with a renewed sense of traveling abroad. The next France trip will be June 2026.



Juniors Classes of 2025 – It's Time to Schedule Campus Visits:

Juniors planning to apply to college should be sure to visit their schools of interest. Go to your college's website for sign up information. Visiting campuses (technical, 2 or 4 year) is a great way to get a feel for which school "fits" for you! While it's important to meet with admissions counselors and take the official campus tour, it's also helpful to take your own personal tour. Check out the places they don't show you, talk to a student in the student union about what they like about the school, as well as what they do not like about the school. Pick up a campus newspaper to see what's important to students and soak in the environment. If you don't feel like the school is a good fit, it may be a difficult place for you to find success. Refer to your STAR Conference materials for more helpful tour information.

It's Financial Aid Time!

FAFSA: To apply for financial aid, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) must be filled out online. The FAFSA should be released sometime in December. Be sure to register for a FSA ID # at https://fsaid.ed.gov/npas/ BEFORE filling out the FAFSA form! Contact your college to find out their campus-specific financial aid priority deadline. Find more information about earning money for college on the "Paying for College" link on the Student Services website.

FSA ID: Seniors and their parents BOTH need to create a FSA ID to be able to complete and submit their financial aid application. Now is a great time to start the federal financial aid process by visiting https://fafsa.gov/.

Any student who has participated in, or has younger siblings who have participated in the free or reduced lunch program should reapply each year, **even if they do not eat in the school cafeteria.**Many opportunities are available to students participating in this program such as fee waivers for tests, like the ACT, and scholarship/grant programs. OHS Counselors often confidentially inform students of these opportunities, but only know who is eligible based on this program.

Applications for the School District of Onalaska's Free and Reduced Lunch Program are available in the main office or online. Names of students participating in this program are kept confidential.

Youth Apprenticeship

Students who participate in Youth Apprenticeship are able to learn essential skills under the supervision of a skilled mentor while earning high school credit. Juniors and Seniors who have part-time jobs in areas including food service, banking, automotive, construction, computer science, agriculture, nursing assistant or other related careers who are interested in earning high school credit for their employment should see Mrs. DeLong in Student Services for more information about the Youth Apprenticeship program!

NEW ACT Updates

The University of Wisconsin System has suspended the ACT requirement for all UW colleges and universities for the class of 2026. Many other colleges have also waived the ACT requirement. UW colleges and universities have not announced admission requirements for ACT beyond the class of 2026. A strong ACT score can still help with admission to college and scholarship placement. Since most schools are now "test optional", students can choose not to use a score if they are not pleased with it. Students will choose if they wish to include their ACT scores as part of their application. Visit the websites of your colleges for more information.

ACT Prep Course Options

Preparing for the ACT can increase test scores to gain entry into the college of your choice and receive scholarships. There are several options that are available each year, which can help students prepare for this test.

- All Juniors took a FREE practice ACT test on September 19. This retired ACT test was
 administered, timed and will be scored identically to an actual ACT. ACT will score this test, and
 provide students with sub scores, a composite score and most importantly an itemized list of
 correct answers compared to the student answers. Students can use a printout of the exam to
 see the questions they answered correctly, and identify content they need more review.
- 2. There are FREE resources located in the Student Services office, such as practice tests, which can be scored and timed by the student. Several FREE resources are also available online at sites such as ACT.org. Every Junior at OHS will also participate in a FREE two-day ACT prep program this February.
- 3. UW-L's Continuing Education office offers an ACT prep course for \$199. Students will learn test-taking strategies, receive instruction in each of the four testing areas, and take a retired pre- and post-ACT test. Writing strategies to assist you in the essay part of the ACT test will also be provided. Visit https://www.uwlax.edu/gel/ypc/act-test-prep-online/ for more information.

Register to Retake the ACT

Students interested in retaking the ACT, please register at ACT.org.

The following are tips to help students complete the registration process:

- Students go to myACT.org to log into their account, register and pay for the ACT test
- Plan to register at least a month in advance of the test date to avoid late fees!
- Decide if you want to take the writing test. Most schools do NOT require the writing test.
- Give yourself at least 45 minutes to complete the registration
- Decide which 4 colleges/universities you want FREE score reports sent to. It is better and easier to do this now to avoid extra steps later.
- Be prepared to upload a clear headshot photo to the website. Students without a picture are NOT allowed to test!
- Fee waivers are available for students who qualify see your school counselor if you need one.
- Print your admission ticket, and keep it somewhere safe you will need it to be admitted to your testing room.

Still Time to Apply for College

Seniors are encouraged to complete and submit their applications to colleges and universities as soon as possible. Many colleges and universities will be closing their admissions process in the coming months. Technical college programs, especially, fill quickly on a first come first serve basis. Seniors considering applying to college for the fall of 2024, but who still need help with the process, should stop in to see their counselor today!

College Bound Student Athletes

Students who plan to compete in D1 or D2 athletics in college must register with the NCAA in order for you to be eligible to compete prior to enrollment this fall.

How to Help Your Teen Develop Empathy and Compassion

The best thing about empathy and compassion is they are skills that can be taught, practiced, and improved over time.

Your teen will pick up on things they see at home and carry them into their own life. You can model empathy, compassion, and kindness in big and small ways.
You can:

- Model the act of giving the benefit of the doubt and assuming others have good intentions.
- Ask how you can support your teen during a tough week instead of just asking how they are doing.
- Share times when you have supported friends going through something and ask how they support their friends

Conversation Starters

- "What's something you admire about a friend?"
- "What do your friends tell you they appreciate about you?"
- "Has someone done something to help you that you now do to help others?"

Small Moments

- Acknowledge when your teen shows kindness.
- Ask your teen if someone did something nice for them, or if they did something nice for someone else this week.
- Put a short, supportive note in their lunch, on their mirror, or on their pillow.
- Send random texts of kindness.

Acts of Kindness

- Ask your teen to think about a cause they care about and look for local volunteer opportunities your family can do to support it.
- Enlist your family in putting together care packages for people who are unhoused to keep in the car and hand out.
- Encourage your teen to bring a treat for a friend on an exam day or write a supportive note for their sibling before a sporting event or performance.




