Activities:

- ★ Read a book to a younger child. Be expressive as you read, and use good intonation.
- ★ Participate in the Richland Library Summer Reading program.

- ★ Read a book and watch the movie that is based on the book. Compare and contrast the different portrayals of the story.
- ★ Visit a museum. Look at the exhibits and read the information that is displayed in each one.
- ★ Start a book club of your own. Choose books to read and discuss. Set meeting dates, and goals and develop discussion questions.
- ★ Start a journal with a friend or relative. Take turns writing in it all summer long. You can even do this by mail or e-mail.
- ★ Pick an important news event from another city, state, or country. Find as much information on the topic as possible read newspapers, listen to the radio, and watch TV news. Talk about what you learned.
- ★ Start a round-robin story. Write the beginning, then ask friends to add to it until it has an ending.

Family Activities

- 1. **Book Clubs**: Start a family book club where each member picks a book to read and discuss together. Rotate who selects the book each week.
- 2. Literary Movie Nights: Choose film adaptations of classic literature or contemporary novels and discuss the differences between the book and the movie afterward.
- 3. **Creative Writing Prompts**: Create a jar filled with writing prompts and take turns drawing one each day. Set aside time for everyone to write and share their responses.
- 4. **Poetry Picnics**: Pack a picnic and head to a local park or beach. While enjoying the outdoors, take turns reading and discussing favorite poems or writing original ones inspired by nature.
- 5. **Library Visits**: Make regular trips to the local library to discover new books, attend author readings, or participate in writing workshops and book clubs hosted by the library.
- 6. **Literary Road Trips**: Plan day trips to literary landmarks, such as authors' homes, museums dedicated to literature, or locations featured in famous books.

- platforms offer courses tailored to different age groups and skill levels.
- 7. **Journaling**: Encourage everyone in the family to keep a summer journal. Set aside time each day for reflection and writing about experiences, thoughts, and feelings.
- 8. Literature-Inspired Cooking: Cook meals inspired by books or characters. For example, you could recreate dishes mentioned in a favorite novel or create a themed menu based on a literary genre.
- 9. **Theater Performances**: Attend local theater productions of classic plays or adaptations of beloved novels. Afterward, discuss the themes, characters, and interpretations.
- 10. **Literary Podcasts**: Listen to podcasts that discuss literature, author interviews, or storytelling. Afterwards, have a family discussion about the episodes and share thoughts and insights.
- 11.Bookstore Scavenger Hunt: Visit a bookstore and create a scavenger hunt based on different genres, authors, or book covers.

 Challenge each other to find specific books or items within the store.

<u>ICivics</u>- offers free games, planners, and activities to motivate students to get involved in Civics and to learn more about Social Studies and Civics.




Games that Promote Social Studies and Critical Thinking

Did you know that board games can encourage and explore concepts related to Social Studies? Some of the following board games can be a fun way to incorporate fun and social studies into a family game night!

- Monopoly -Yes, the most sold board game in the US contains many different Social Studies themes.
 This game encourages the player to think about ideas related to economics. While playing the game, players encounter the concepts of rent, bankruptcy, taxes, and monopolies (where one business owns a whole type of business or service). After the game, talk with your student about how monopolies and rent impacted their experience in the game.
- o **The Settlers of Catan** -Players learn about resources and how resources can impact a society's ability to advance and develop. All of these concepts relate to history and economics. After the game, talk with your student about how either an abundance of resources or lack of resources impacted their gaming experience.
- Risk -Incorporates geography and strategy into a game. Players learn about the interconnectedness of
 places on the world map while trying to expand their own empire. This game connects concepts related to world
 history and geography. After the game, talk with your student about how they think alliances, conflict, and territorial
 control can impact world history and events.




Games that Promote Mathematical Thinking









Books and Stories
