Robotics Team Attends Competition in Worcester

On December 9th, the CMS Robotics Team attended a robotics competition at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. This article is a simple explanation of what our 8th grade CMS Robotics Team's goals were at the competition in Worcester.

Our Goals:

We wanted to do well in all aspects of judging, which includes the robot, core values, and project. Our most successful thing this year was our robot, which scored 215 points on the board this year compared to last year, where we only scored 165 points. Our project on stop motion and filmmaking also seemed to do pretty well, although we do not get a specific score.





What do we do at the competition?

At the actual competition, it is much more serious than when in the robot room. We have to stay calm as the matches we are in are quick and tend to be pretty stressful. We have five "heats" of competition where we have two and a half minutes to try and score as many points with the robot as possible. Then there is also judging, where our team goes into a private room with two judges and we present our innovation project.

What does it take to make it to states?

State competitions are very difficult to get into as some teams have less time constraints or are more experienced than others. These teams typically don't just have a goal for states but also possibly nationals. For CMS, our goal is simply to make it to states, as nationals are very difficult to get into and take lots of commitment.

What do the judges judge us on?

The two judges which we present to go over our innovation project and robot first. After those are finished, they go over core values for teams which is a measure of teamwork and inclusion. The hardest part of the judging process is the core values as everyone may have to answer a question on the spot.




