Mask Decision Postponed to January 18th

Students have been wearing masks for a year and a half now. Many have even reached the point of asking, "Will we ever be able to take them off?"



In an email from Cohasset
Superintendent, Dr. Sullivan, he stated, as of
Nov 30, 2021, both the Cohasset High School
and Middle School have exceeded the 80%
vaccinated mark. This means that over 80% of
the staff and students are vaccinated. The
Department of Elementary and Secondary
Education (DESE) has approved that fully

vaccinated high schoolers will have the option to not wear masks.

At last night's School Committee Meeting, the Cohasset School Committee voted to move the date for approval for vaccinated individuals at the middle school to unmask until January 18, 2021. According to Dr. Sullivan, "Waiting two weeks after winter break allows us the opportunity to view infection rates in our community and in the middle school population (which is still has a lower vaccination rate than our high school community) before allowing vaccinated individuals to unmask. Waiting two weeks after winter break also allows younger middle school students who may not yet be fully vaccinated, but whose families want them to be fully vaccinated, the opportunity to have more time to reach full vaccination before allowing vaccinated individuals to unmask."



8th Grade Research Presentation




Next we interviewed the owner of Anchor and Sail General Store, Megan Fales. The business is located in Cohasset Village and supplies healthy food and other goods.


In conclusion, many local businesses are experiencing delays just like you may be for your own holiday shopping. Other small businesses that use local sources are thriving.

The boys team placed 3rd overall out of 13 teams competing. Eighth-grader Robert Blanchard placed 6th out of 90 runners in the boys' championship race with a time of 10:14. In the girls' division, 7th-grader Molly Campbell, earned an appearance at the podium, finishing an impressive 3rd out of 97 runners.

All of the runners ran their hardest! You could see the look of dedication on their faces as they ran by.
