New School Building in the Future?

Recently, The Pond Street Press was alerted that there was talk of potentially building a new Cohasset Middle/High School. We were intrigued and decided to ask around. We asked Mr. Mills, Middle School Principal, and then we asked Superintendent Dr. Sullivan, who gave us the email of the chairman of The School Committee, Mr. Craig MacLellan. We then interviewed Mr. MacLellan about the matter.

Sienna and Grace: "What is your opinion on the topic of a new school building?"

Chairman MacLellan: "I am excited by the prospect of a new Middle/High School in Cohasset and am very much in favor of it. I think we do the best we can with our current facility, but technology and teaching and learning practices have both changed significantly since the existing school was constructed, so I believe our students, and therefore our community, would be best served by a new, state-of-the-art facility."

Sienna and Grace: "If you like this idea, would you rather redo CMS at its current location, or would you rather build an entirely new building at a new address."

Chairman MacLellan: "While this will be a data-driven, community decision, my initial research tends to show that an entirely new building is the most cost-effective solution. In terms of the physical location, that decision would be based on a number of factors and would involve the input from the community-at-large and the advice and recommendations of various construction and design professionals."

Sienna and Grace: "Also, would it separate from the High School, or would it be another Middle/High School?"

Chairman MacLellan: "This is another decision that would be based on community input and advice and recommendations from construction and design professionals. Generally speaking however, it is likely that another middle/high school would prove to be the most cost-effective and practical solution for our small community."

Sienna and Grace: "When did this possibility first come up in the Facilities Committee, and who brought it up?"

Chairman MacLellan: "I first raised the prospect of new schools in a School Committee meeting. The then-chairperson of the School Committee, Ellen Maher (Mr. Maher's mother),

pointed out that Cohasset's bylaws called for the formation of a School Facilities Committee in order to explore and carry out such a project. I then drafted a charge for the School Facilities Committee, which was approved by the School Committee, and the town began to solicit volunteers to fill the 9 spots on the School Facilities Committee. In July, the School Facilities Committee was finally formed and it had its first meeting in August."

Sienna and Grace: "What is the timeline for this new possibility?"

Chairman MacLellan: "This is difficult to answer with any accuracy, as the response is dependent on too many unknown variables. What I can tell you is that the average length of these types of projects throughout the Commonwealth of Massachusetts seems to be about 5 years, from the very beginning to the opening of the



new building. If our community decided to build a new middle-high school, it would probably take about 2 years to physically build, but there is a lot of planning that accounts for the other 3 years. Again, there is no way to know how long this process would be for our community - it could be longer, or it could be shorter (but probably not much shorter than 5 years even if it was shorter)."


This is a definite possibility, but the process will take many years so current middle schoolers will probably never experience this. If this plan goes through, the future middle and high school students will benefit greatly.

CMS Student Council Revamp By Eli Kagel

In the past, the process of running for and outcomes of Student Council elections have been skewed. Student Council elections of the past were akin to tyranny; less popular students did not participate as popular students were guaranteed a competition among themselves.

Teachers Mrs. Ryan and Ms. Jewell are this year's advisors and have recognized the need to redevelop the election process and structure of CMS's Student Council. They are committed to giving more power to the students while effectuating parameters that ensure fair representation in the elections and therefore, the resulting Student Council.

During the October 14th utility assembly Mrs. Ryan and Ms. Jewell presented the vision behind the revamp. This presentation included an organizational chart (see below), defining the



leadership opportunities, and distilling the selection process. Promising "we will say 'yes' to as much as possible," they spoke of their commitment to bestow those who obtain these leadership positions reasonable authority and influence over decision-making such as, allowing Student Council to plan field trips. This expansion of influence is enticing for all middle school students but

comes with great responsibility.

In order to obtain a leadership position on the Student Council, students must apply and be permitted to proceed by the administrative group composed of Principal Mills, Dr. Salas, Mrs. Ryan, Ms. Jewell, and last year's 8th grade Student Council President, J.P.Giglio.

Applications will then be reviewed and vetted by a committee who will thin the herd and select those who will be admitted into the candidate pool. This mechanism is intended to ensure fairness in the representation of students from whom the student community will vote by ballot. The hope is that those who are truly serious about comprehensively representing the student community will remain as the final candidates. Accordingly, those who are committed to the impact they will have on our school community should arguably supersede those who are interested in how this role will impact themselves. Candidates who have reached this phase and subsequent phases of the election process would have inherently displayed character and performance that informed their accomplishment of succeeding through rounds of vetting. At this point in the process, the final candidates will resume more traditional processes of public speaking and campaigning. According to this design, it is believed that these candidates will, or at least should, be afforded a fair shake by their peers as to their campaigns based on merit, commitment, and campaign content rather than on social status.

Student interest has peaked and change is in the air in response to the Student Council's revamp. Many students are optimistic that the result will be in candidates and leaders who are more focused on realizing their investment in CMS and our student community.

"I'm motivated to encourage and help the students of CMS, and driven to create a friendly environment at school to help students walk into class with a smile on their faces," said Faisal Al Rashid.

James Lanza, a 7th grader running for student, explained, "I am running for student council because, I am looking for a leadership opportunity and to be a voice for the students."

Faisal and James are just two of many students who are beginning their campaigns.

As Fasial explained, in the past "the quality of votes largely depended on the student's popularity, rather than the ideas they harbored."

The recently released design does empower students to run for the right reasons. As campaign promises are made, all must be mindful our future elected leaders have been promised greater responsibility and influence over the future of our school. Conscientious voters should be even further compelled to vote on the basis of integrity, rather than popularity, as to who will speak for them.

Coach Sullivan explained, "Once we get to the meets, we do a brief warm up. Normally the courses are really confusing, so we do a walk through, or the other coaches tell us where to go. On Wednesday, there are Cross Country meets! The team meets up with other towns' schools and Cross Country teams, and you either go there or the team comes here for a race.

From Ciaran Bergan, a Cross Country member, "At the meets, you usually start off in the woods. It is nerve racking before the start of the first meet, but after, you feel more comfortable and you get a hang of it. It becomes really fun."

You are encouraged to go to every practice. If you need to miss it's fine. New Gym Rock Wall

Some exciting news greeted middle and high school students this fall - a new rock wall in the gym. The wall was funded by the Cohasset Education Foundation (CEF). We had the opportunity to speak with the President of the CEF, Kristin Quinn and find out how they funded and built the wall.

What is your role on the CEF board?

This is my 4th year on the board. It is my first year serving as President.

What was the inspiration for building the rock wall? Mr. Sweeney, Department Chair for Health, Wellness & Guidance at the Cohasset High School brought us this grant. He wanted to provide gym classes with a unique experience that encourages teamwork.

It looks like a big effort to get a project like this off the ground. How long did it take to raise the fund's? We are so proud of this, thank you! Without being able to host in-person events we were able to raise \$50,000 virtually thanks to the generosity of the community.

Who designed or built the rock wall? Project Adventure https://www.pa.org/. They custom design and install every wall and component. They also conduct inspection and repairs.

Can you describe some of the features of the wall? What are the dimensions? The rock wall scales one half of the High School gym wall, it's quite impressive! It's 20 feet wide by 24 feet high. The grant also funded a "Centipede" - a series of vertical wooden beams connected to each other and a "Wild Side" ropes course. A large part of the grant money went to a 2 day training session for the entire Wellness staff. They are now qualified to belay climbers on both the wall and the centipede. They were also trained on how to use the ropes

centipede. They were also trained on how to use the ropes course with 16 different challenges.

Can you share any future plans for school programs that will use the rock wall in physical education? The Wellness team has many different fun and exciting plans for use in the future!

It sounds like a great addition to the school. Is there anything more we should know about it before we end the interview? Cohasset does sports really well. We love to see the soccer, lacrosse, and baseball fields packed with happy kids. Not all kids are drawn to organized traditional sports,



though. This Project Adventure grant will involve all students in fun, engaging, team building exercises during Gym class. We love supporting our local schools!

Gym teachers perspective of the new rock wall: The gym teacher's perspective on the new rock wall is all about teamwork as Mrs. Beal says. The new rock wall will be open to Middle school and High schoolers. Also it will be open to The public as well! Mrs. Beal and Mr. Pimental spent 16 hours of training to make sure they know how to use it and make sure it is safe for everyone.
