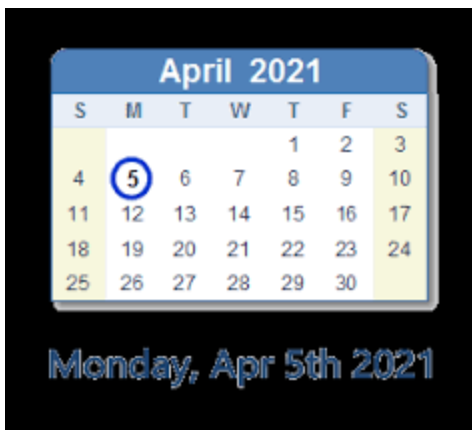

Return to Full In-Person Learning on April 5

The rumors are true, Cohasset Middle School is returning all students to school April 5th! The cohorts will be combined and attend in-person school together for five days a week. This change has many positives, but some things won't be as exciting.

The CMS schedule will be changing in many ways including lunch, utility, dismissal, and period times. There will be four periods before lunch and utility, instead of four after. Each grade will have their own lunch period,

with all of the students from the grade. Utility time will be extended, due to three CMS lunch periods. The dismissal time will start at 2:40PM, instead of 2:50PM. Some period times will shorten, so school can dismiss earlier. The Cohasset Middle School will still start first period at 8:15AM.

The schedule is not the only thing we need to adjust to; the students will need to re-adjust to each other. Social groups have formed within the cohorts, excluding the other ones. The reunion of students could cause conflict socially and academically. Friends will reunite and new friends may appear.

COVID-19 safety will still be expected by social distancing, wearing a mask and cleaning hands. These precautions will be extremely important because there will be double the students in the building.

The hybrid learning model including Zoom is officially over!

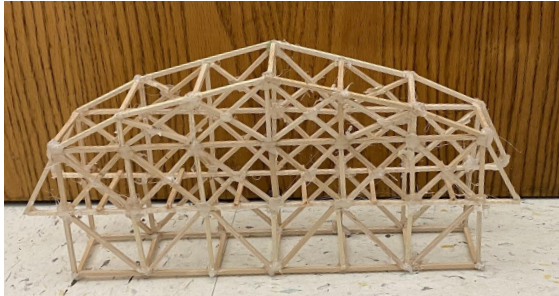

Mock Trial Club

“All rise. The Court of the Second Judicial Circuit, Criminal Division, is now in session.” These words have been repeated several times in sixth grade World Geography classes as they debate over who will win the court case.

Mock trials are beneficial for one's vocabulary, public speaking, and critical thinking skills. Ms. Weisslinger, the World Geography and Ancient Civilizations teacher, has set up a mock trial to help with the students' understanding of Babylonian king Hammurabi's Code of Laws. The sixth graders have been learning about Mesopotamian empires. The mock trial cases have been built around the 282 laws that were made in 1755-1760 B.C.

In these mock trials, the jury is composed of the other cohort and they decide which side will win the case, the prosecution or the defense. One of the cases is about a builder who built a house for a respected man. During a long period of heavy rain the mud brick house collapses on the homeowner's son. Then the homeowner takes the builder to court. The court is composed of Hammurabi (the judge), the plaintiff, the plaintiff's lawyer, the defendant, the defendant's attorney, and the witnesses, as well as a scribe and bailiff. The students are required to come up with a script and come with costumes!

Most of the students have enjoyed this project, which led to the idea of having an after school club based around debating and mock trials. The Mock Trial club will meet every Thursday. If you're looking for a way to have fun with your classmates while practicing your improv and critical thinking skills, you should really consider joining!

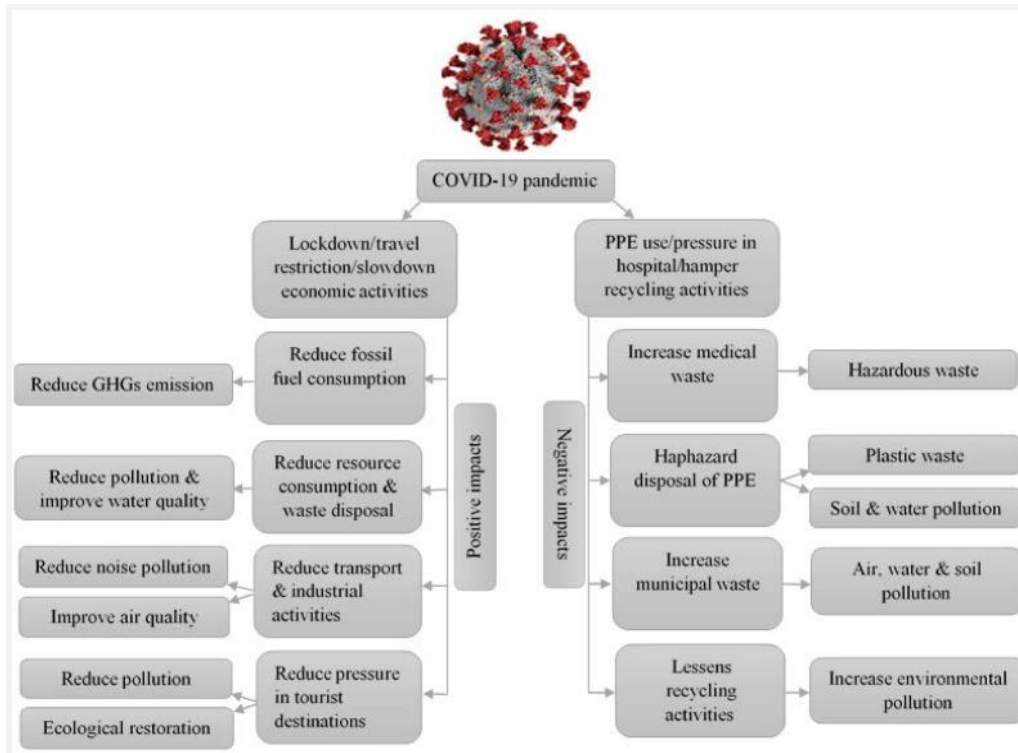

March Madness This Year

Spring is finally here! It is not only a time when we start to think of the warmer days ahead, but also time for sporting events to start up. One very popular event that happens in March is March Madness. No, it doesn't mean that everyone goes completely crazy in March, although some may! According to [Britannica](#) March Madness is when different college basketball teams face off in a tournament. It refers to the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the tournament takes place every year in March. Although this year it will look slightly different due to COVID, it will still take place in Indiana, starting on Thursday, March 18 and will end on Monday, April 5.



According to [Ihsa](#), March Madness was created in Illinois in the late 1930's, when an annual tournament of high school boys basketball teams grew from a small tournament to a statewide competition with over 900 schools. The teams attracted sellout crowds at the University of Illinois and college basketball became a popular game to watch. Henry V. Porter, who was Assistant Executive Secretary of the Illinois High School Association gave the event its name when he wrote about the basketball craze and called it "March Madness". His essay was published in the Illinois Interscholastic (the IHSAA's magazine) in 1939 and the term stuck with the other newspapers reporting about the tournament. Over the years, the excitement of March Madness grew and in 1973 the IHSAA began using the term officially.



According to [Sporting News](#) Today, the single-elimination tournament consists of fields of 64 women's and 68 men's teams. Fans make predictions before the event and enter their selections in office pools or with friends. Studies have shown that American workers become less productive during March Madness as many fans spend their time following their brackets while on the job.

Most of the teams have an equal chance to win the tournament this year, but only a few teams are favorites to run to the national championship. Those teams are Baylor, Gonzaga, Michigan, and Ohio State.
