<u>Superintendent's Report</u> – Welcome back from April vacation. Over the break there was a Grand Canyon trip and a High School Trip to Europe. All schools are planning spring events that are enriching and fun. US News National Report of High Schools recently released its ratings of all High Schools in the US. This year Cohasset High School ranked #31 in MA, #28 Boston metro area, #1 on the South Shore, #783 in the nation and tied for #1 for our graduation rate!

Also, on Spots to live South of Boston, local photographer and Cohasset citizen Dan Leahy was quoted celebrating the wonderful qualities, natural beauty and phenomenal schools of Cohasset.

Dr. Scollins sent out an email to families for the free summer learning program. There will be a two-week program August 1 - 11 for rising 1 - 12 graders. That application will close on May 6.

Information for incoming Kindergarteners and jumpstart Kindergartner program will be August 8 - 11!Teachers are signing up and Principal Farrell will be the administrator again this summer.

**Finance Update**- FY22 March Finance Report. The school budget through March is 73.56% spent and we are 75% through the year.

The information attached represents an update concerning current budget conditions. Attached you will find a detailed copy of the budget in several different formats.

#### School Budget (general fund)

As of March 31, 2022 the School Department has expended \$14,710,500 out of the \$21,684,432 budget awarded (73.56%) and we are 75% through the year. We have encumbered supplies and materials on purchase orders in the amount of \$1,242,174. There is a remaining available balance of \$5,731,758 which will be expended by salary accounts and any other school department needs that cannot be anticipated or have not yet been entered as a purchase order.

**SPED Tuitions** were budgeted at \$1,187,528 and are currently encumbered on purchase orders in the amount of \$661,354. To date, we have expended \$1,116,906. This brings our shortfall to -\$590,732 (no change from the prior month). We are closely monitoring these accounts for any additional expenditures.

- New Press Box Insurance covering

#### **Cafeteria Revolving**

The Food Service Department is also making improvements/upgrades to their department by adding new equipment to their kitchens, upgrading existing equipment and/or replacing outdated or broken equipment. A few examples are as follows:

- Upgrades to web site
- (4) 55 inch TV screens 1 for each cafeteria to display menus, nutritional information etc.
- Elevator Vending Machine for reimbursable meals, refrigerated kitchen made food, snacks and beverages
- New serving line to include salad bar at the Middle/High
- New "snack room" adjacent to cafeteria
- Purchasing new "tall cafe style" tables for the senior dining area

High School added (2) 42 inch TV screens at the main entrance and the bus loop entrance.

<u>Transportation</u> we have added "Stopfinder" which allows parents to know where their child's bus is at all time. Just waiting for the equipment to come in.

#### Conclusion

At this point in the school year the budget is proceeding based on projections with minor concerns regarding special education tuitions.

#### School Committee Comments and Communication-

**School Facilities Committee** – The Select Board voted on the SOI last night (4/26/22). We will revote on the SOI by following the prescribed format as put forth by the MSBA.

Motion made by Chairman Craig MacLellan, that the Cohasset School Committee having convened in an open meeting on April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2022, prior to the Statement of Interest submission closing date.



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The School Committee of Cohasset in accordance with its charter-by-laws and ordinances has voted to authorize the Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Patrick Sullivan to submit the Massachusetts School Building Authority a Statement of Interest form dated April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2022 on what we submitted for the Cohasset Middle and High School at 143 Pond Street in Cohasset, Massachusetts which describes and explains the following deficiencies and the priority categories for which an application may be submitted to the Massachusetts School Building Authority in the future. Those priorities as we are applying or submitting our SOI for Cohasset Public Schools are. One, the elimination of existing or severe overcrowding. Two, placement of renovation or modernization of a school facility system such as roofs, ceilings, windows, boilers, heaters, and air ventilation systems to increase energy conservation and to decrease energy related costs in a school facility. Three, replacement or addition to obsolete buildings in order to provide for a full range of programs consistent with state and approved local requirements, seconded by Mr. Dial.

Dr. Sullivan can officially submit this certification with the language as Mr. MacLellan just stated on the district's letterhead signed by Chairman Craig MacLellan that attests to the fact that we just took that vote with that specific language and we need to submit that by the end of the month so that we're on track, everything is good and evidence of caution even though we voted last time.
