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## Message from the Dean



**UPDATE FROM THE NCS PRESIDENT** 


Dear Friends of Newman Catholic Schools,

#### **CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK 2024**



During the week of January 28-February 3, 2024, Newman Catholic Schools joined schools across the nation in celebration of Catholic Schools Week; a week in which we celebrate Catholic education and how it helps students embrace their faith, enrich their spirit and build community. Catholic Schools Week offers an important reminder to students that living their faith is more than simply going to Mass on Sundays but must be part of all they do. It is important that they take an active role in their faith education.

As plans for the week came together, two driving messages were kept in mind; the Catholic Schools Week theme, "United in Faith and Community", and the system's mission statement, "Newman Catholic Schools fosters disciples of Christ through Catholic faith, service and academics." By keeping both themes at the forefront of the planning process, students were ensured to experience an enriched week in which they could come together in community and strengthen their relationship with God.



This year's system-wide service project focused on supporting The Neighbors' Place and The Babies' Place. ## A Journey to the Priesthood

#### **JUSTIN DAMASK, CLASS OF 2015**

While a student at Newman Catholic High School, the path to priesthood was not one Justin Damask thought he would take. For him, the vocation of marriage was the journey he sought. His goal, to have a happy marriage like his parents and to raise a family in a house full of love and support just as he and his brothers were. Even after losing their father at a young age, Justin's mother, Paula, made sure that they knew their father's love and that God was always with them to help get them through.

With God's guidance, his mother's love and with strong men who stepped in as father figures throughout his time at Newman, Justin graduated in 2015 ready to take on the world and accept God's plan. A plan that took an unexpected turn.

Justin's original goal was to get a degree in Mechanical Engineering through the University of South Carolina, a path that he stayed on through freshman year. His journey began changing after getting involved in the Newman Center on the campus. Fr. Marcin, priest of the Newman Center, played a crucial role in Justin discerning a vocation to priesthood. The young priest joyfully lived out a spiritual fatherhood in his relationships with the students and families of the community. His actions were so human and profound that it became apparent to Justin for the first time that spiritual fatherhood could be meaningful and life-giving.

During this time, Justin also got involved in a Bible Study group which lead to a Men's Discernment group; a smaller group of college aged men committed to asking God what He wanted them to do with their lives. Originally attending the meeting for the free food, he grew to enjoy praying with this small community and their talks about vocations. Through his experiences with Fr. Marcin's Newman Center parish and the Men's Discernment group, Justin found himself considering the idea of spiritual fatherhood. Though the vocation of marriage was still his goal,

a vocation in the priesthood suddenly seemed possible.


Over a six-month period, Justin made a concerted effort to embrace his faith to its fullest. While attending daily Mass, going to confession regularly and continuing to be active at the Newman Center, Justin started to unintentionally put himself in the priest's shoes. While listening to the Homily, he found himself considering the message he would have offered or how he would work towards building a parish community. He started imagining himself as a priest, and in the spring of 2016, he made the decision to join the seminary.

Because there are no seminaries in South Carolina, the Diocese of Charleston sent Justin to study at Holy Trinity Seminary on the University of Dallas campus in Texas. He studied philosophy for two years at Holy Trinity before joining the seminary at Catholic University of America (CUA) in Washington D.C. Three years later, he made a final move to begin Theology Studies at St. Vincent Seminary in Pennsylvania where he is currently in his third year of Theology Studies.

On May 24, 2024, Justin will be ordained as a Transitional Deacon for the Diocese of Charleston. He will then spend a full year as a Transitional Deacon working in parishes and completing his final year in theology studies. All leading to June of 2025, when Justin will be ordained as a priest. A glorious day after an eight-year journey.

When asked what advice he would offer current NCS students, Justin offered multiple thoughts.

First, embrace the mentorship your teachers offer. He thanks Mrs. Joy Orozco for suggesting to the seniors that they should



The other piece of advice he would give, "God created each of us with a vocation in mind. One helpful distinction is to ask whether God created me to spend my whole life loving one person with all the love I have in an exclusive way or whether He created me to love everyone in a more universal way. Radically exclusive love is the aim of marriage, and it is the foundation necessary for family life. Radically inclusive love is the aim of priesthood and religious sisters, and this vocation makes a person part of every family. Only God can love universally with the intensity of exclusivity. He invites us to participate in His love by choosing between vocations. Both paths are supernaturally life-giving, in a way that a mere career could never be."


We wish Justin all the best as he takes his final steps to priesthood and ask all of our Newman Catholic family to keep him in their prayers.

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## Celebrating Our Unsung Heroes

#### THE NCS FOOD SERVICE TEAM



When sharing about all that goes on within a school, it is natural to celebrate the work of teachers, the activities in the classroom or on the court and fields, or students' successes, but it is easy to forget to celebrate the unsung heroes. The men and women who work behind the scenes.

One such group deserving of praise, is the Newman Catholic Food Service team who works hard to provide delicious meals while fostering healthy partnerships with students, local growers and staff. At Newman Catholic Schools locations, the food service team feeds over 450 students. This is done while ensuring meals are healthy and balanced to include a protein, vegetable, fruit and milk.

The food service team is blessed to have nine regularly scheduled team members who help in planning, prepping, receiving and serving lunch for five schools and early childhood sites. Because the nature of food service requires limited hours, between three and eight hours per day, and may not need a full staff regularly, the positions are perfect for retirees and parents with flexible schedules. This flexibility allows employees to give of themselves in service to the students, faculty and staff while also ensuring work-life balance.

Over the past few years, the Newman Catholic Schools Food Service team has taken advantage of local opportunities to foster relationships with local farmers; such as, Wilson Creek Orchard, Cattail Organics and Red Door Family Farms. Purchasing food from local farmers offers many benefits. Not only is NCS helping the local economy but the system is able to offer students fresher foods from farm-to-table.

Newman Catholic Schools is grateful to the Food Service team for their hard work and dedication to providing the system with healthy and balanced meals. Well-nourished students are able to focus which leads to success in the classroom, in co-curricular activities and in all they do.

Living as a Disciple of

#### **NICOLE KAST**

CLASS OF 2004

There's a saying in Improv Theater (a love that began while participating in plays at Newman), "Step into a space and say, "Yes, and..." If Nicole Kast, NCHS Class of 2004, could offer any advice to current NCHS parents, it would be to say "Yes, and..." to their children. Allow students to share their ideas and explore possibilities. Encourage them to be curious about life, question their reality and consider what opportunities life has in store for them. Parents should encourage exploration, saying "Yes you can do that, and you could..." This was exactly the approach Nicole's parents took with her and in doing so they encouraged her to reach her goals.

Nicole learned from a very young age that it was okay to ask questions and to consider the possibilities; to say "Yes" but then ask "why", even when the "why" had to do with her faith. Being able to embrace her faith in such a personal way, and in a loving and comforting environment extended to the halls of Newman Catholic High School, where she was given an opportunity to explore Social Justice and the impact our actions have on the community. This freedom led her to start the Peace & Social Justice Club.

While at NCHS, Nicole felt the deep commitment her teachers had to helping their students succeed and how they encouraged students to find themselves. As she stated, "It was inspiring as a young adult to know that it was okay to explore what you wanted out of life." A concept reinforced during the I-Search project her senior year which focused on students exploring different career paths, researching industries, careers, post-secondary education, and much more. Though work in public health or international development was not a career path she thought of at the time, the project did show her that there were opportunities beyond what she had directly experienced growing up in Wausau. By the time she graduated from NCHS in 2004, Nicole was ready to see where the possibilities would take her.

The first step on her journey, Swarthmore College in Pennsylvania, a liberal arts college that offers a strong focus on social justice and activism. Nicole's original degree was English Literature until she joined her father on a trip to Oaxaca, MX, where she fell immediately in love with the people, culture and being immersed in the community; experiences that led Nicole to change her major to Anthropology.



Catholic Relief Services carries out the commitment of the Bishops of the United States to assist the poor and vulnerable overseas. We are motivated by the Gospel of Jesus Christ to cherish, preserve and uphold the sacredness and dignity of all human life, foster charity and justice, and embody Catholic social and moral teaching as we act to:

- PROMOTE HUMAN DEVELOPMENT by responding to major emergencies, fighting disease and poverty, and nurturing peaceful and just societies; and,
- SERVE CATHOLICS IN THE UNITED STATES as they live their faith in solidarity with their brothers and sisters around the world.

As part of the universal mission of the Catholic Church, we work with local, national and international Catholic institutions and structures, as well as other organizations, to assist people on the basis of need, not creed, race or nationality.

During her Junior year, Nicole had another opportunity to explore new possibilities with a full year of studying abroad. First semester was spent back in Mexico where she focused on independent study, developing her own educational journey, studying the culture of health and traditional medicine within indigenous communities. Second semester was spent as part of the International Honors Program which allowed her to travel to India, China and South Africa studying Public Health around the world.

After graduating in 2008, Nicole moved to Oaxaca, MX, where she spent four years immersing herself in the community and culture. Those four years brought wonderful opportunities which included working with local journalists to publish a book, "Lo Vimos Lo Vivimos", consisting of a collection of short stories, poems, chronicles and essays focused on the social movement in Oaxaca in 2006.

Nicole also studied the benefits of sustainable living while working with the Universidad de la Tierra (University of the Earth), and spent her last two years working for a local NCO called Coral as the Community & Early Detection Coordinator. Coral focused on providing diagnoses, treatment and support to people living with hearing loss. Nicole spent most of her time in rural communities helping identify children with hearing loss and supporting families of children with disabilities to build support networks and advocate for their rights.





Though her four years in Oaxaca were rewarding, Nicole felt that she wanted to make a bigger impact by focusing on systemic change.

This new path took her to the University of Minnesota where she received a Masters Degree in Public Health. While at U of M, Nicole was accepted into a fellowship program with Catholic Relief Services (CRS). During her fellowship with CRS, Nicole traveled the world to:

- Kenya: studied health practices and child protection.
- South Sudan: focused on projects in child protection and community-led development.
- Ecuador: helped offer support after the 2016 earthquake.
- South America, Ecuador, Perú, Bolivia and Columbia: worked with programs that supported agriculture, peace building, migration and emergency response.

In 2018, Nicole took a position as Deputy Head of Programs for CRS Guatemala and became Head of Programs in 2019. Since 2018, she has helped over 600,000 individuals by supporting programs in

agriculture, child protection, education, emergency response, disaster risk reduction, and migration.

As a fellow with CRS, Nicole found a home. As she states, "To work for an organization that is mission driven and constantly questions the why and how behind what they do, has been a blessing. I feel honored to work with a wonderful mission and truly live it. The work of organizations like CRS is transformative – we meet and support people in some of the most vulnerable moments of their lives. No matter what their circumstance or who they are, our mission is to treat them with dignity and serve them."

Nicole plans on taking all she has learned at CRS with her as she begins her next adventure as the Country Director for Peru & Ecuador with the International Rescue Committee (IRC), a role she began in April 2024. She, her husband, Juan Ochoa, and their two-year old son recently relocated to Peru to explore the possibilities of this new journey. A journey that brings them closer to Juan's family and allows Nicole to continue her mission of serving others.

To assist teachers and students with the teaching and learning of socialemotional skills, Newman Catholic Schools has adopted Second Step. Second Step, an initiative of the "Committee for Children", is a program created to guide teachers in supporting the development of positive behavior skills in their students, which in turn, will allow for a better classroom environment. When students have a positive sense of wellbeing, they are much more likely to engage in their academic work, have better self-control, and develop healthy relationships.

As school staff work to help students learn the concepts and skills associated with social-emotional wellness, Second Step also supports the teaching of empathy and respect; two key components in getting along in a world where kindness seems to have become less important than it once was. In a school community where we celebrate our Catholic faith every day, learning how to be kind and compassionate reflects our love for Jesus.







Social and emotional learning helps build community and a sense of belonging. In combination, our school community focuses on the whole child, the whole teacher, and the whole school and church community. The power and influence we have as we weave our Catholic faith, virtues, and emotional characteristics into our daily routines and interactions, promotes a stronger inner health for children which allow them to tackle the daily challenges and celebrations encountered. It gives all of us the vocabulary needed in our interactions with others and offers ways to appropriately engage with friends, family and staff.

Newman Catholic Schools supports all families, students and staff in their devotion to Christ and embeds critical elements of virtues, values, and connections that lift us up to be the best versions of ourselves. ### Creating Academic Superweapons ONE CLASS AT A TIME

NCMS/HS SCHOOL SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Passion: the teacher's love for the task of educating people and for their students

Collaboration: a growth-based learning environment and for increasing student learning progress.

By themselves, these two concepts are powerful but when combined, they offer an untouchable learning experience for students, and this is exactly the experience that the Science Department at Newman Catholic Middle & High School have strived to offer. Teachers created a learning environment that fosters academic competitiveness, where every student, no matter past achievements or struggles, can succeed. This is done by creating symmetry between subject matters and methods of teaching, ensuring that curriculum is connected and feeds into each other - curriculum symmetry.

When Mr. Jon Smith joined the Newman Catholic family for the 2022-2023 school year, he and Mrs. Sonja Gasper began an easy partnership that focused on working together to offer a more rigorous experience for the students. They have achieved this by embracing true collaboration; making sure that their curriculums align and help students master subject matters. Though methods of instruction may differ, their goal is the same, which is to create an environment in which students are encouraged to push themselves as well as work together to help each other succeed. Mr. Smith shared a great example of this, the Physics "Think Tank", a group of six students who meet and work together to solve ten questions/ problems. The Think Tank offers an opportunity to strengthen their ability to work in a team and to build leadership when they take their turn as "CEO", a member designated at each gathering to keep the group on track.

Take this collaborative focus one step further by adding in the partnership with the 8th grade Physical Science class where Ms. Halle Vardon has adjusted the curriculum to ensure the groundwork is being laid for students to succeed when entering high school. For example, chemistry is a sophomore level course but Ms. Vardon introduces students to the subject matter. This gives them a leg up when they get to their sophomore year and are already familiar with basic concepts; which allows Mr. Smith to hit the ground running versus having to start with the basics.

Taking a symmetrical, collaborative approach to education offers a strong foundation for students to build upon. In essence, the program becomes college preparatory and ensures students are ready for post-secondary coursework. This is further enhanced by ensuring students are exposed to better resources and equipment which fosters efficiency, accuracy and better focus. Through independent donations and the Religious Care Foundation Grants, funding has been used to replace necessary equipment and to bring in updated resources to enhance the educational experience.

Newman Catholic Schools is blessed to have teachers dedicated to their students and passionate about the subject they teach. Teachers who ensure NCS students receive the best in Catholic education.

## Continued Focus on Safety and Security SYSTEM-SIDE INITIATIVE

In 2018, Newman Catholic Schools joined schools across the state to strengthen the safety and security of school buildings. Through the Department of Justice's Safety Grant initiative, NCS secured funding to improve safety standards by adding cameras throughout buildings, applying security film to exterior doors, replacing locks and doors in need of repair and sending faculty and staff to state sponsored training sessions. Taking advantage of the Safety Grant program allowed NCS to take first steps in improving safety and security throughout its buildings, ensuring students learn in a safe and comforting environment.

Next steps will be taken during the summer of 2024 with a full-system focused safety and security improvement project. The project will consist of four key areas which will further enhance safety in all buildings. Work will kick off at the end of the school year, to be completed by the end of summer in preparation for the students' return for the 2024-25 school year.

Safety and security upgrades will be fully funded through donations raised during the Winter Wonderland Fund-a-Need and through private donations made to the system's annual fund drive. Thank you to the generous benefactors who are helping to fund these much needed improvements.

Thank you also goes out to the NCES: St. Anne families who donated to the fence project; the addition of a security fence with locked gates around the school's playground area. A project that has been on the needs list for many years finally came to fruition thanks to the support of St. Anne Parish and through the generosity of many.

Working together, the students of Newman Catholic Schools will have the comfort of growing in faith and knowledge in safe and secure buildings.


