



EXPLORING CAREERS AT THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

WMS STUDENTS WIN WOMEN IN HISTORY CONTEST





State Representative Karen Reddington-Hughes, R-66 visited Woodbury Middle School on April 10 to congratulate sixth-grade students Stella Fitzgerald and Penelope Losh on their winning essays in her Women in Connecticut History essay contest.

Fitzgerald won first place for her essay on Harriet Beecher Stowe and Losh was the runner-up with her essay on Ella Grasso. Rep. Reddington-Hughes presented the students each with a citation from the Connecticut General Assembly for their winning essays on a notable Connecticut woman in history and what their contributions mean to them and for our state. All WMS sixth graders were assigned the essay for Women's History Month in March in their social studies and ELA classes. The essays were read by a panel of judges including WMS and district administrators and district social studies teachers and instructional leaders.

Reddington-Hughes said she was thankful for Woodbury Middle School's participation in this contest for Women's History Month. "These are women who are forerunners in their fields and have cleared the pathways for women in the future," she said.

"I chose Harriet Beecher Stowe because I already knew a lot about her from when we visited her house," Fitzgerald said. "She impressed me and I just think her life was so interesting."

Runner-up Penelope Losh chose Ella Grasso as her subject. "I think it is so cool that she was the first American woman elected as governor of a state on her own," Losh said.

REGION 14 HOSTED FREE CARDIAC SCREENING

Nonnewaug High School hosted a free cardiac screening program for all Region 14 students ages 8 - 25 courtesy of the "In A Heartbeat" organization. 120 students took advantage of this screening.

"In A Heartbeat" was founded in 2015 by Mike Papale who experienced sudden cardiac arrest at age 17, to raise money and awareness for sudden cardiac arrest and Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy (an enlarged heart muscle).

The organization works to spread the word about the importance of CPR and Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) and provides organizations with AEDs and emergency training. Papale is a student at Quinnipiac University and brings his team of QU medical student volunteers to perform the screenings.



CULINARY COLLABORATION BRINGS REGION 14 CHEFS TOGETHER FOR COMMUNITY EFFORT





In April, Region 14's middle and high school culinary arts students came together for a collaborative cooking experience. WMS Culinary teacher Mike Hadoulis brought a group of his eighth-grade chefs to John Dominello's Nonnewaug High School culinary room to work alongside the Advanced culinary students.

The students worked together and even shared some skills while they prepared batches of homemade Minestrone. The soup was distributed to the senior centers in both Woodbury and Bethlehem. This was a terrific multi-school learning opportunity, mentor experience, and collaboration that additionally benefited some of our local senior citizens.

Mr. Dominello said he was excited to have the two groups cooking together in the kitchen to learn and mentor. Mr. Dominello and Mr. Hadoulis are working on future collaborative opportunities for their culinary students.



CURRICULUM CORNER: MAY SBA AND NGSS ASSESSMENTS

In May, Region 14 students in grades 3 through 8 will participate in the annual state assessments in English language arts and mathematics by taking the Smarter Balanced Assessments. In addition, students in Grades 5, 8, and 11 will be tested in science through the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) Assessment.

Student reports will be sent home to parents and guardians in early fall. The results for the English language arts, mathematics, and science assessments are just a few of many data points that provide information about a student's learning and should be considered alongside other student performance indicators such as classwork, progress reports, teacher feedback, and district benchmark assessments to gain a full picture of a student's academic progress towards meeting the state standards.

Official results from the state assessments will be made available to school districts in the summer, and Region 14 will utilize the results in conjunction with the additional data points mentioned above to see how students are progressing at each grade level. Analyzing the results helps school and district staff strengthen our educational programs and instruction to improve outcomes for all of our students.

Our students are well prepared for these assessments and will be testing in a positive and encouraging environment.
