

## CISD Medical Emergency Plan AND Videos for Classroom Health / First Aid


**CISD's Medical Emergency Plan:** Each campus will identify First Responders who will receive training on CPR, First Aid, and emergency response. Identifying signs will be placed outside each First Responder classroom/location. In the event of a medical emergency including but not limited to: anaphylactic reaction, fainting, diabetic emergency, fall/break, etc., the following actions will take place:

1. Faculty/Staff will initiate Medical Emergency Plan by calling front office and reporting incident/injury/emergency and location.
2. Office Staff will radio the campus nurse and call the Director of Health Services, or select Team Assist in your Raptor app by selecting Team Assist> Medical Assistance> enter room number or location> initiate. If the nurse is not on campus call over the intercom for First Responders and identify location and campus “hold-in-classroom” (keep hallways clear). If a nurse is on campus, the nurse will respond and notify the office if First Responders/ Hold-in-classroom is needed.
3. Once Medical Emergency is cleared, hold-in-classroom status will be announced over the intercom.
