



Response: We were able to preserve 7-periods despite our budget shortfall next year.

Middle school sports was also an area parents hoped we could preserve despite necessary budget reductions.

Response: We will be reducing but not eliminating middle school sports next year. We have also been able to identify efficiencies that allow for competition across schools - not just intramurals. More details about reduction areas will be shared soon.



The topic of safety and security came up across all parent groups.

- Questions about planning and opportunities to learn more
- Updates on bond related improvements
- General concerns about safety

Response:

- Continue to practice drills including large scale reunification exercises just had another reunification drill in April.
- Implementing a visitor badge program; will be fully operational by fall 2024.
- Video intercom systems with a buzzer at the front door is 50% complete.
- New handheld radios delivered to every school.
- Implementing recommendations of the Student Wellness and Safety Taskforce including revisions to the Campus Supervisor position and required training.

Special Education families shared questions across a variety of topics, including navigation of services, who to contact, IEPs, etc.

Response: Working to improve communication and family engagement.

- The Special Education and Communications and Engagement Department hosted focus groups with families to solicit feedback on a new website structure for Special Education. The new navigation has been built and being tested by parents. The new website will launch this summer in time for school year 2024-25.
- Upgraded our IEP online program to include translation services for special education paperwork.

Northshore

 The Special Education Department has started meeting monthly with the new Special Education PTA.

Families and students wanted more information about the District's approach to preventing and addressing racism, discrimination, and bias.

Our Response: The Racial and Educational Justice Department, Student Services, and Safety and Security developed a **Safety and Anti-Discrimination toolkit** for educators. It can be found on the Racial and Educational Justice resource page on the website.

In addition, the REJ Department just shared a new **2024-2027 Racial and Educational Justice Framework**. This Framework was co-designed with students and is focused on three areas of upcoming work:

- Anti-discrimination and microaggressions
- Identity-affirming environments and experiences; and
- Student and family co-design
