What to Consider and Resources



- Performance and work/life balance: How did this year go in terms of grades, stress, workload, etc?
- **Time:** Will you have the same amount of time during/after school next year? More time? Less time?
- Requirements: What requirements should you be working to complete?
- Co- and extracurricular commitments: what things besides academic work will take up your time both inside and outside of school?
- **Resources:** Parents, Academic Dean, Upper School Head, and Advisors



Honors and AP Expectations



Honors Criteria

- The workload in Honors courses is more demanding, both in terms of amount and difficulty faster moving.
- Students must be able to master skills and concepts quickly without additional support.
- They must be adept at both following instructions and working independently on classwork, be that a history paper or an experiment.
- Honors classes spend less time in class reviewing for tests and quizzes. Students are expected to be organized and responsible with respect to handing in work on time, asking questions, and keeping track of assignments.
- The standards for achievement in Honors classes are more rigorous than those in College Prep classes. Grades are but one factor used in determining readiness for work at this level.

AP Criteria

- Proficiency as a student, a reader, a writer, and a problem solver
- Intellectual ambition and sophistication

A student should demonstrate:

- Passion for learning and an active independent intellectual life
- An ability to think abstractly, critically, and creatively
- Curiosity about the different ways that meaning is constructed;
- Active engagement in class discussion
- A willingness to take intellectual risks and reconsider initial thinking.
- Initiative and independence

A student should demonstrate:

- Commitment to their studies
- An ability to manage a heavy workload
- The confidence and self-discipline to flourish without extensive guidance
- A positive responsiveness to being challenged

English



Students are required to take <u>4 years of English</u>.

- English $8 \rightarrow$ English 9 or English 9 Honors
 - Research and Writing twice a week for 9th grade!
- English 9 OR English 9 Honors→ English 10 OR English 10 Honors

After these two years serve as the foundation, students have more choice and variety in grades 11 and 12, including Advanced Placement courses.



History



Students are <u>required to take 3 years of history</u>. Typically, students follow this sequence:

- <u>Early World History</u> (CP or Honors) *or* <u>AP Human Geography</u> (9th grade)
- <u>Modern World History</u> (CP or Honors) *or* <u>AP World/Euro</u> (*10th grade*)

(AP World + Euro swap every two years - can take the other course later)

<u>US History</u> (CP or Honors) or <u>AP US History</u> (11th grade)








Business and Entrepreneurship

Mission

To emphasize the exploration of individual, career-based interests through rigorous coursework and experiential learning, leading to a deeper understanding of the skills necessary for a successful college and career path.

Field Experience

Designed by the student with assistance from their faculty mentor regarding location, work being performed, and expectations of both the student and the on-site mentor.

All field experiences will be documented through:

- Reflective journal entries
- Check-in with faculty mentor
- 5-10 page scholarly paper

Portfolio and Presentation

A diploma portfolio is the formal documentation of the progress a student has made focusing on the skills ascertained in:

- Critical-thinking,
- Creativity
- Scholarly writing
- Knowledge in their chosen specialization area.

Students will present their field experience in an evening presentation to the school community.


