### Early Years Foundation Stage Policy (EYFS)

Policies and procedures are essential to ensure good quality provision that is compliant with the updated Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) 2024. The EYFS requires us to have written policies and procedures, which comply with the requirements of the EYFS, Ofsted and Independent Schools statutory requirements. We also need to provide staff with training at induction to ensure that they fully understand and know how to implement them. These policies help to ensure children are safe, well and ensure that we follow the Keeping Children Safe In Education (KCSIE). Policies are available on the school website and are discussed on induction with parents.

#### The EYFS at Abbotsholme

This stage consists of three classes, as follows:

#### The Learning and Development Requirements

##### Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum

Abbotsholme follows the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) curriculum for all children between the age of 2 and 5 years.

##### Procedures

- Children are guided through the 7 areas of learning and development as outlined in the EYFS.
- These areas are split into 3 "prime" areas and 4 "specific" areas. Pupils in the Caterpillars classes will mainly focus on the prime areas of learning as these lay firm foundations for successful learning in the specific areas. There will be an equal focus on all areas of learning within the Butterflies, Pre-Prep and Reception classes.
- Each area of learning and development is implemented through a rich variety of planned, purposeful play and a combination of adult-led and child-initiated activities.

- Practitioners use both the indoors, the playground and the wider estate to support the learning needs of all of the children.
- Practitioners must take account of the different ways in which children learn. In planning activities, the characteristics of effective learning must be carefully considered. These are: playing and exploring, active learning and creating and thinking critically.

### The prime areas

- **Communication and language:** we allow children the opportunity to experience a rich language environment, develop self-confidence and develop the skills to express themselves and to be able to speak and listen in a range of situations.
- **Physical development:** we provide opportunities for children to be both active and interactive and to develop co-ordination, control and movement. We emphasise the importance of physical activity and the need to make healthy choices in relation to food.
- **Personal, social and emotional development:** we help children to develop a positive sense of themselves and others; to form positive relationships and respect others; to develop social skills, learn how to manage their feelings; to understand appropriate behaviour in groups; and to have confidence in their own abilities.

### The specific areas:

- **Literacy:** children are encouraged to link sounds and letters and to begin to read and write. We give children access to a wide range of reading materials to ignite their interest.
- **Mathematics:** we provide children with opportunities to develop and improve their skills in counting, understanding and using numbers, calculating simple addition and subtraction problems; and the ability to describe shapes, spaces and measures.
- **Understanding the world:** children are guided to make sense of their physical world through exploring, observing and finding out about people, places, technology and environment.
- **Expressive arts and design:** we enable children to explore and play with a wide variety of media and materials, and give children the opportunity and encouragement to share their thoughts, ideas and feelings through a variety of activities in art, music, movement, dance, role-play and design and technology.

Early Learning Goals – by the end of EYFS (Reception), the level of development attained by children is defined by the Early Learning Goals (ELGs). These support

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teachers to make a holistic, best-fit judgement about a child's development and readiness for year 1.

### Daily Routines

- Daily routines are organised which take into account the individual needs and interests of the children and are age appropriate. The Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage recommendations guides our planning and best practice. These take into account how children learn and reflect the broad range of skills, knowledge and attitudes children need as foundations for good future progress and that they are ready for school.
- Daily routines are available in the reception classroom through visual timetables and an outline of daily routines are communicated to parents. A mixture of adult-led and child-initiated activities are carried out throughout the day with a gradual shift towards more activities led by adults as pupils progress through the Reception class, in preparation for their transition to Year 1.
- Children are encouraged to learn independence from the outset, with accessible resources and areas to keep their belongings in their classroom.
- Our School Values of Respect, Integrity (Good Morals), Courage, Honesty and Humility are promoted using cuddly toys and age-appropriate language so that children can talk about our values linked to everyday activities. Children hear stories about the characters and how they have demonstrated each of the values.

Daily routines are specific to the age and needs of the children.

**In Reception our children have opportunities for OED/Forest schools, equestrian, agricultural studies, specialised teachers for music, PE, dance, swimming and choir.**

### Supporting children with special educational needs (SEND)

- We provide an environment in which all children, including those with SEND, are supported to reach their full potential.
- The Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO), Rosie Kneller (Head of EYFS) has that role, working closely with all nursery and reception staff. They strive to ensure that current best practice is followed, to support children with specific learning differences. The provision for children with SEN is the responsibility of all members of staff.
- We have regard for the Special Educational Needs Disability Code (2015).
- We ensure our provision is inclusive to all children with SEND.
- We support parents and children with SEND.
- We identify the specific needs of children with SEND and meet those needs through a range of SEND strategies.

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- Support plans are put in place for those children who need reasonable adjustments and support to be made for them to access learning and make progress. These will be discussed with parents and regularly reviewed.
- We work in partnership with parents and other agencies in meeting individual children's needs.
- We monitor and review our policy, practice and provision and, if necessary, make adjustments. Our inclusive admissions practice ensures equality of access and opportunity.
- We use the graduated response system for identifying, assessing and responding to children's specific learning differences (assess, plan, do, review).
- We work closely with the parents of children with SEN to create and maintain a positive partnership.
- We ensure that parents are informed at all stages of the assessment, planning, provision and review of their children's education.
- We provide parents with information on sources of independent advice and support.
- We liaise with other professionals involved with children with SEN and their families, including in connection with transfer arrangements to other settings and schools.
- We provide a broad, balanced and differentiated curriculum for all children with SEN.
- We use a system of planning, implementing, monitoring, evaluating and reviewing individual educational plans for children with SEN.
- We ensure that children with SEN are appropriately involved at all stages of the graduated response, taking into account their levels of ability.

### **Supporting the Most Able Pupils**

- We provide an environment in which all children, including those who are more able, gifted or talented are supported to reach their full potential.
- We recognise that all children are individuals with their own strengths, weaknesses, gifts and talents. Within this range there are children who are more able intellectually than others, and/or particularly talented in certain specific areas of ability.
- Every child has the right to a broad, balanced and relevant curriculum which challenges, motivates and rewards them, so that they can each fulfil their individual potential.
- We work in partnership with parents and other agencies in meeting individual children's needs.

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- We monitor and review our policy, practice and provision and, if necessary, make adjustments.
- We recognise that the abilities that gifted and talented pupils possess will vary, and it is therefore important for us to have a very wide view of intelligence. This ensures that we recognise all types of high ability.
- We use as many different sources of assessment, baseline and phonics, to identify gifted and talented pupils.
- The identification of gifted and talented pupils in our pre-school is a continuous process.
- Having identified our more able pupils we aim to provide:
  - The opportunity to work at higher cognitive levels.
  - The opportunity to develop specific skills or talents.
  - Support and care for the whole child socially and intellectually
- We aim to provide each pupil with activities that build and extend upon their existing abilities. Any provision for gifted and talented pupils should aim to build on thinking skills, problem solving, questioning, and use of resources, creativity and co-operative working.
- We provide enrichment and extension opportunities for these pupils as part of their individual planned differentiation.

### **EAL**

Pupils within the EYFS with English as an additional language (EAL) are encouraged to interact with other children and use their home language during play and learning. Through interaction with other children and within our small classes, they are given excellent opportunities to learn and reach a good standard of English. Specific resources to develop their language will be used as necessary, such as visual cards, toys, auditory and visual resources as well as parents being encouraged to reinforce key vocabulary at home.

### **Assessment and Children's Records**

We have record keeping systems in place that meet legal requirements; this means we use to store and share that information takes place within the framework of GDPR 2018 and the Human Rights Act (1998).

We keep two kinds of records on children attending our setting:

### **Developmental records**

- These include observations of children in the setting, photographs, video clips and samples of their work and summary developmental reports.
- These are uploaded to our on-line EYFS Learning Journal 'Family' which can be accessed by parents online at any time throughout the year. Access details will be provided when children start in EYFS.
- The EYFS Profile for Reception children will be completed by the end of June and parents invited into school to discuss this with staff. The profile will be summarised in the end of year report for parents and the Reception teacher will also pass this to the Year 1 teacher as part of our transition policy.
- The EYFS Profile details are passed on to the local authority on request and EYFS Profile Moderation takes place regularly.
- We carry out a progress check at age 2 years and send to parents a written report identifying strengths and areas where a child's progress is less than expected.
- Practitioners will discuss this report with parents and provide advice about how they can support the child at home.
- Across the whole of EYFS, initial assessments through observations help to provide a 'baseline' position against which to judge progress.

### **Personal records**

- These include registration and admission forms, signed consent forms, correspondence concerning the child or family, reports or minutes from meetings concerning the child from other agencies, an ongoing record of relevant contact with parents, and observations by staff on any confidential matter involving the child, such as developmental concerns or child protection matters.
- These confidential records are securely stored.
- Parents have access to the files and records of their own children via 'Family', but do not have access to information about any other child.
- We retain children's records for three years after they have left the setting, except records that relate to an accident or child protection matter, which are kept until a child reaches the age of 21 years. These are kept in a secure place.

### **Other records**

- We keep a daily record of the names of the children we are caring for, their hours of attendance and the names of their key person.

### **Family Policy**

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At Abbotsholme we use an online system called 'Family' across EYFS to record and store all observations and assessments relating to each child. This is a safe and secure system and one that enables parents and carers to access their child's learning journey at any time. They can share it with their child, family and friends at home and also post any comments and photographs of their own, helping to create a fully holistic view of the child and strengthen the parent partnership.

### **Use of mobile devices in EYFS - Safety**

- As part of our commitment to safeguarding our children, all learning journeys are password protected so that parents and carers can only access the account of their child. Other than family, only the child's key person and the manager have access to the journal.
- Staff are not permitted to have mobile phones on their person. These must be locked away in the office.
- Staff use tablets to take the photographs for observations but these will not be stored on the device. Photos will be uploaded to the journal as they are taken and then deleted shortly after from the device.
- Staff are not permitted to take the tablets home and they will remain on the premises at all times, unless specific permission has been granted by the Head of EYFS. They are to be stored and charged in a locked cupboard at the end of each day and over the holidays as a security measure. Staff wishing to update journals at home are able to access the Family site using their own school device.
- Staff are not allowed to use personal devices for photographing children.

### **Sharing with children**

- Staff will share the photos they take with the children as they are taken and will record any comments made by the child on the Tapestry site either under the photo or in with the observation. We will also encourage parents and carers to share the journals at home with their child. Within setting, we will continue to take photographs of events and activities, which we will then display around the classroom for the children to see. This enables children to develop their sense of belonging and share experiences with their peers.

### **Parents without internet**

- For parents without access to the internet, we will print all the information from Family and put it into a scrap book. This will be available in the setting for the parent to view at all times and will be sent home at the end of the year.

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- When the children leave the setting permanently, we will save the learning journey to disc for them, so they have a lasting record of their child's time at nursery.

### **EYFS Transition Policy**

At Abbotsholme School we are totally committed to the need for a smooth transition between the different stages in our children's education. The purpose of this document is to outline the procedures in place to ensure a smooth transition between these two important phases.

### **Aims**

We want our children to experience a smooth transition across the EYFS and from Reception into Key Stage 1 so that the pace and quality of teaching and learning are maintained to ensure that children continue to make excellent progress.

### **Equal Opportunities & Inclusion**

We will aim to make sure that the children and parents are actively involved in this process and their perceptions about transition are explored, explained and valued. Whenever applicable we will aim to have clear guidelines, advice and support in place for the parents of pupils with learning difficulties at transition.

### **Principles underlying the policy**

- Approaches to teaching and learning are harmonised at the point of transition.
- Planning is based upon assessment information from the previous class / setting.
- Styles of teaching and learning meet the needs of all the children.
- There is a professional regard for the information from the previous phase/setting.
- Children are able to enjoy new approaches to teaching and learning at transition.
- Transition motivates and challenges the children.
- All staff are made aware of the particular needs of individual children to ensure continuity.

### **Transition through the EYFS**

- Discussions occur between teachers and staff from other settings.
- Individual tours of the school are offered to all incoming parents and children.
- Children joining EYFS are invited for taster sessions.
- A 'Come and Meet the Teacher' opportunity takes place in the summer term before children start in Reception. Information about the learning and developmental

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needs of the children, assessment and welfare are discussed and parents can ask any questions.

- Parents receive a school admissions pack on entry to the Prep School.
- Prospective Reception children visit school on several occasions during the term before they start, to become familiar with their new school and setting.
- The Pre-Prep class (3-4 years) are located within the main Prep Department building, adjacent to the Reception class, and are familiar with the staff and setting as they work closely together.
- Children begin full-time in the Reception class during the September of the school year (September – August) in which their 5th birthday occurs.
- If children in Nursery transition to schools other than Abbotsholme, we invite the child's new teacher from the school to visit our setting.
- We offer parent workshops to help with parent partnerships and activities that can be done at home to support learning.

### **Transition from Reception to Year 1**

Reception have lots of opportunities for transition throughout the year as they have some timetabled lessons and opportunities to work with years 1&2. In addition to this there is one full transition day when the Reception children spend the day with the Year 1 teacher.

The Reception class and Year 1 teacher will be given time to discuss the learning journeys and the data collated within the Foundation Stage Profile, and how this can be best used to inform future planning, assessment and support for each child.

Parents of the Reception children will be invited to visit the Year 1 classroom and meet their child's new teacher towards the end of the summer term. During this meeting parents

will be given the key information that they need in preparation for the new school year.

This

will include:

- An introduction to the curriculum we offer and the teaching methods used
- An introduction to daily/weekly classroom routines and expectations of behaviour
- The names of all the teachers the child will be taught by and the subjects they are responsible for.

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Reception children join the rest of the prep school for playtimes and end of day activities. Reception join in the Prep celebration assembly on a Tuesday and Reception go to Prep choir and whole school 'Congo'.

### **Continuity of Teaching & Learning**

The Early Years Foundation Stage promotes a very kinaesthetic approach to teaching and learning and in Year 1 we aim to maintain this approach and build upon it to offer a creative, 'hands on' method of teaching and learning. The Year 1 curriculum builds on and extends the experiences children have had during the Early Years Foundation Stage. The aim is that, as a school, we help to develop the 'whole' child and ensure that there is a continuum to build upon each child's basic skills, knowledge and understanding. There are distinctive differences between the Reception year and Year 1. We still continue to value and promote the children's personal independence, independent learning skills, and the ability to select activities and resources appropriate to the tasks set and to develop their decision-making skills.

Year 1 is the first year where a more formal approach to education begins and we will begin to introduce many of the 'subject' areas that will continue to be developed further up the school.

### **The Management of Transition**

Before the children move from the Reception Class into Year 1 the teaching staff will arrange to meet to discuss the children's progress. During this time the present teachers inform the Year 1 teacher of the child's level of ability, special educational needs and any other information relevant to the well-being and development of each child. Information passed onto the Year 1 teacher includes

- Knowledge of sight words, knowledge of phonics and letters and mathematical knowledge
- Reading ability/level
- Each child's last assessed piece of writing and numerical work.
- A printed version of each child's foundation stage profile highlighting each of the targets achieved.

All this information is used to assess pupil's knowledge and understanding, to adjust and fine-tune the curriculum, and set future targets. Links are made between the Early Learning Goals and the present Key Stage 1 curriculum, as many statements within the

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Foundation Stage Curriculum are very similar to key objectives for Numeric, Literacy skills and the foundation stage subjects that are taught in KS1.

### **Safeguarding and Welfare**

#### **Maintaining children's safety and security on premises**

We maintain the highest possible security of our premises to ensure that each child is safely cared for during their time with us.

#### **Children's personal safety**

- In EYFS we follow KCSIE guidance and Prevent duty guidance in addition to working together to safeguard children.
- We ensure all employed staff have been checked for criminal records via an enhanced disclosure through the DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service).
- Adults without full DBS are not left alone with the children.
- All children are supervised by suitable adults at all times.
- Whenever children are on the premises at least two adults are present.
- We carry out risk assessments to ensure children are not made vulnerable within any part of our premises, nor by any activity.
- All staff are given annual training in safeguarding awareness and know the school's Safeguarding Team consists of Sarah Brick (Designated Safeguard Lead), Trish Beetar, Richard Brindley (EYFS and Prep) and Amy Thornton. If staff have concerns about the safeguarding or welfare of any children they must contact the safeguarding team immediately via email or visiting 'My Concern'.
- All staff wear lanyards with their photograph, name and position along with safeguarding team contact information.
- Adults on site without a visitor lanyard are challenged by staff to establish who they are.
- The Head of EYFS and Prep School Head have regular safeguarding meetings to discuss any concerns about pupils.

#### **Security**

- Systems are in place for the safe arrival and departure of children.
- Children are only released to the Authorised Persons
- Parents are asked to advise us beforehand, if a different person will be collecting their child and give us the appropriate password.

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- The times of the children's arrivals and departures are recorded on 'Family'.
- The arrival and departure times of adults - staff, volunteers and visitors - are recorded.
- Visitors must sign in at the main school reception and a visitor's form must be completed by staff.
- Our systems prevent unauthorised access to our premises; key pad locks on doors.
- Our systems prevent children from leaving our premises unnoticed; key pad locks on doors and room gates.
- The personal possessions of staff and volunteers are securely stored during sessions.

### **Safety and Suitability of Premises, Environment and Equipment**

The School has a team of maintenance and support staff who are responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the school building and premises. The Nursery staff are responsible for carrying out daily checks of the classroom environment, equipment and the playground and outdoor equipment. They ensure that the classroom and outdoor environments are fit for purpose and suitably organised for the activities provided and the needs of the children. There is a 'maintenance' shortcut on all staff lap tops to ensure prompt reporting of any issues which need to be addressed. Resources and equipment are regularly reviewed and updated to ensure they are of high quality and fit for purpose. Staff are able to request new resources and equipment from the Head of EYFS and the Head of Prep School throughout the year.

Risk assessments are carried out specifically for the EYFS classrooms and outdoor areas and reviewed regularly.

The classroom environments and activities are organised to ensure the safety of all children at all times and take into account their individual needs. Pupils are given regular guidance about how to use equipment and the indoor and outdoor environments safely.

Equipment in the outdoor play areas is organised so that the climbing frame has no equipment immediately beside it, to avoid trip hazards and collisions when the children move off the climbing equipment.

Tricycles are used in the adjacent playground area so as not to cause a hazard when the climbing equipment is being used.

Suitable outdoor clothing and footwear are worn by the children when they access the 'mud kitchen' area of the playground or parts of the estate such as the farm and equestrian centre.

Fire alarm tests are carried out weekly and fire evacuation practices take place each term.

Adequate space is provided for children who wish to relax, play quietly or, in Nursery, sleep. These areas are equipped with appropriate furniture and sleeping children are checked frequently.

Toilets and wash basins are provided close by to the EYFS rooms. All children are supervised when they use the bathroom and Reception children are closely monitored whilst they use the bathroom independently. Stools and potties are available where necessary.

### **Staffing**

We provide a staffing ratio in line with the Safeguarding and Welfare Requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and Independent School Regulatory requirements. This ensures that children have sufficient individual attention and to guarantee care and education of a high quality. We pride ourselves in keeping classes small so our classes often have a much smaller staff to child ratio.

Induction training is given to all staff so that they understand their roles and responsibilities within the setting, safeguarding procedures, health and safety issues, equality policy and emergency evacuation procedures.

### **Leadership**

Rosie Kneller is responsible for administration and transition between the Nursery classes and school. The Head of Prep oversees the work done by all the staff in the Nursery and regularly meets with the Head of EYFS to discuss curriculum, well-being of the children, health and safety and budgets. The Prep DDSL and DSL of the whole school are updated on any safeguarding concerns using the safeguarding protocols by staff using KCSIE guidance. The whole school including Nursery is led by the Head Teacher, who is regularly updated.

- The School is a Boarding School with a Headmaster who lives on site and House parents within the Boarding Houses.
- Reception is open between the hours of 8.00am – 5.30pm.
- The onsite Medical Team can be contacted between 8.30-5.00pm, for medical advice or emergencies, a doctor is on call 24hrs a day.
- All of the EYFS staff are paediatric first aid trained and training is renewed on a rolling programme. For off site trips staff have someone with this training with them.
- Each child is assigned a key person. This helps them become familiar with the setting from the outset and to ensure that each child has a named member of staff with whom to form a relationship. The key person plans with parents for the child's well-being and development. The key person meets regularly with the family for discussion and consultation on their child's progress and offers support in guiding their development at home.
- We hold regular staff meetings to undertake curriculum planning and to discuss children's progress, their achievements and any difficulties that may arise from time to time.
- Staff have regular training about EYFS best practice.

### **The role of the key person and settling-in**

In line with EYFS requirements, each child is assigned a key person. Their role is to help ensure that every child's care is tailored to meet their individual needs, to help the child become familiar with the setting, offer a settled relationship for the child and build a relationship with their parents.

We aim to make the setting a welcoming place where children settle quickly and easily because consideration has been given to the individual needs and circumstances of children and their families.

- A trial visit is offered before the child starts.
- The key person is responsible for the induction of the family and for settling the child into our setting. The key person offers unconditional regard for the child and is non-judgemental.
- The key person works with the parents to plan and deliver a personalised plan for the child's well-being, care and learning.

- The key person acts as the key contact for the parents and has links with other carers involved with the child, such as a child-minder, and co-ordinates the sharing of appropriate information about the child's development with those carers.
- The key person is responsible for developmental records and for sharing information on a regular basis with the child's parents to keep those records up-to-date, reflecting the full picture of the child in our setting and at home.
- The key person encourages positive relationships between children with her/his peers.
- 'Family' online Journal and School Post are used as a means of regular home-school communication.
- We promote the role of the key person as the child's primary carer in our setting, and as the basis for establishing relationships with other staff and children.

### **Settling-in**

- Before a child starts to attend the setting, parents are provided with information, and policies. There are also displays about activities; information regarding food, funding and general notices.
- During the half-term before a child enters, we provide opportunities for the child and his/her parents to visit the setting.
- We allocate a key person to each child and their family when they start to attend; the key person looks after the child and their parents during the settling-in process.
- When a child starts to attend, we explain the process of settling-in with his/her parents and jointly decide on the best way to help the child to settle into the setting.
- We have an expectation that the parent, carer or close relative, will stay for most of the child's first session, gradually taking time away from their child, increasing this as and when the child is able to cope.
- Younger children will take longer to settle in, as will children who have not previously spent time away from home. Children who have had a period of absence may also need their parent to be on hand to re-settle them.
- We judge a child to be settled when they have formed a relationship with their key person. The child is also familiar with where things are and is pleased to see other children and participate in activities.
- When parents leave, we ask them to say goodbye to their child and explain that they will be coming back, and when.
- We recognise that some children will settle more readily than others, but that some children who appear to settle rapidly are not ready to be left. We expect that the

parent will honour the commitment to stay until their child can stay happily without them.

- We do not believe that leaving a child to cry will help them to settle any quicker. We believe that a child's distress will prevent them from learning and gaining the best from the setting.
- We reserve the right not to accept a child into the setting without a parent or carer if the child finds it distressing to be left. This is especially the case with very young children.

### **The progress check at age two**

- The key person carries out the progress check around the age of two years in accordance with any local procedures that are in place and referring to the guidance 'A Know How Guide: The EYFS Progress Check at Age Two'.
- The progress check aims to review the child's development and ensures that parents have a clear picture of their child's development.
- Within the progress check, the key person will note areas where the child is progressing well and identify areas where progress is less than expected.
- The progress check will describe the actions that will be taken by the setting to address any developmental concerns (including working with other professionals where appropriate) as agreed with the parent(s).
- The key person will plan activities to meet the child's needs within the setting and will support parents to understand the child's needs in order to enhance their development at home.

### **Visitors & Parents in EYFS**

We maintain the safety of the children through ensuring that no person without the relevant DBS checks is left alone with the children at any time.

### **Procedures**

- All visitors sign in and out at Abbotsholme main reception.
- Visitors for EYFS are met by staff and escorted into the building which is accessed via a key pad secure door.
- Any mobile telephones, handbags etc., are locked away securely in the store room – no use of such equipment is allowed on the EYFS premises
- No visitors, including parents, are allowed to be left alone with any of the children.

- EYFS parents must drop off and collect their children via the external garden gates and external classroom doors only and must not enter the main Nursery/Prep School building.
- Parents/carers visiting with their children, must advise a member of staff if they wish to use our facilities to change their children's nappies or take them to the toilet. A member of staff will supervise this. No child will be left with the visitor.

### **Student placements**

We recognise that qualifications and training make an important contribution to the quality of the care and education provided by early years settings. As part of our commitment to quality, we offer placements to students undertaking Early Years qualifications and training. We also offer placements for school pupils on work experience.

We aim to provide for students on placement with us, experiences that contribute to the successful completion of their studies and that provide examples of quality practice in early years care and education.

### **Procedures**

- Students on Early Years qualification courses must meet the 'suitable people' requirements and have a DBS check.
- They must have a sufficient understanding and use of English to contribute to the well-being of children in our care.
- Students undertaking qualification courses who are placed in our setting on a short term basis are not counted in our staffing ratios.
- We work with students' tutors in order to help students to fulfil the requirements of their course of study.
- All students receive induction on how our setting is managed, how our sessions are organised and our policies and procedures.
- We require schools placing pupils under the age of 17 years with the setting to vouch for their good character.
- We supervise pupils under the age of 17 years at all times and do not allow them to have unsupervised access to children.

### **Looked after children**

Abbotsholme EYFS is committed to providing quality provision based on equality of opportunity for all children and their families. All staff in our provision are committed

to doing all they can to enable 'looked after' children in their care to achieve and reach their full potential.

We recognise that children who are being looked after may have experienced traumatic situations. We also recognise that there are a range of reasons for children to be taken in to the care of the local authority. Whatever the reason, a child's separation from their home and family signifies a disruption in their lives that has an impact on their emotional well-being.

All children have a right to be strong, resilient and listened to. Our aim is to develop attachment and build resilience and so increase a child's responsiveness to learning and enable the development of positive dispositions for learning.

- In exceptional circumstances, we offer places to two-year-old children who are in care. In such cases, the child should have been with the foster carer for at least two months and show signs of having formed a secure attachment to the carer, and the placement in the setting will last a minimum of three months.
- We offer places for funded three and four-year-olds who are in care to ensure they receive their entitlement to early education. We expect that a child will have been with a foster carer for a minimum of one month and that they will have formed a secure attachment to the carer. We expect that the placement in the setting will last a minimum of six weeks.
- We will always offer 'stay and play' provision for a child who is two to five years old who is still settling with their foster carer, or who is only temporarily being looked after.
- Where a child who normally attends our setting is taken into care and is cared for by a local foster carer, we will continue to offer the placement for the child.

### **Procedures**

- The designated staff for looked after children is the Rosie Kneller.
- The designated staff ensure that the key person has the information, support and training necessary to meet the looked after child's needs.
- They will liaise with agencies, professionals and practitioners involved with the child and his or her family and ensure that appropriate information is gained and shared and will make decisions on any changes with the child's social worker.
- A care plan will be developed after consideration of the following issues:
  - their emotional needs and how they are to be met;

- how any emotional issues and problems that affect behaviour are to be managed;
- their sense of self, culture, language(s) and identity – and how this is to be supported;
- their need for sociability and friendship;
- their interests and abilities and possible learning journey pathway; and
- how any special needs will be supported.

It will also consider:

- how information will be shared with the foster carer and local authority (as the 'corporate parent') as well as what information is shared with whom and how it will be recorded and stored;
  - what contact the child has with his/her birth parent(s) and what arrangements will be in place for supervised contact. If this is to be at the setting, when, where and what form the contact will take will be discussed and agreed;
  - what written reporting is required;
- The settling-in process for the child is agreed. It should be the same as for any other child, with the foster carer taking the place of the parent, unless otherwise agreed. It is important that the 'proximity' stage is followed until it is visible that the child has formed a sufficient relationship with his or her key person for them to act as a 'secure base' to allow the gradual separation from the foster carer. This process may take longer in some cases, so time needs to be allowed for it to take place without causing further distress or anxiety to the child.
  - In the first two weeks after settling-in, the child's well-being is the focus of observation, their sociability and their ability to manage their feelings with or without support.
  - Further observations about communication, interests and abilities will be noted to form a picture of the whole child in relation to the Early Years Foundation Stage prime and specific areas of learning and development.
  - Concerns about the child will be noted in the child's file and discussed with the foster carer.
  - If the concerns are about the foster carer's treatment of the child, or if abuse is suspected, these are recorded in the child's file and reported to the child's social care worker according to the setting's safeguarding children procedure.

- Regular contact should be maintained with the social worker through planned meetings that will include the foster carer.
- The transition to school will be handled sensitively. The designated person and/or the child's key person will liaise with the school, passing on relevant information and documentation with the agreement of the looked after child's birth parents.

### **Valuing diversity and promoting equality**

Abbotsholme School is fully inclusive in meeting the needs of all children.

We understand that many factors affect the well-being of children and can impact on their learning and attainment. Abbotsholme is committed to anti-discriminatory practice to promote equality of opportunity and to valuing diversity for all children and families. We aim to:

### **Procedures**

We develop an action plan to ensure that people with impairments can participate successfully in the services offered by the setting and in the curriculum offered.
- We take action against any discriminatory behaviour by staff or parents.

- Displays of openly discriminatory and possibly offensive materials, name calling, or threatening behaviour are unacceptable on, or around, the premises and will be dealt with in the strongest manner.

### **Parental involvement**

We believe that children benefit most from Early Years education and care when parents and settings work together in partnership. Our aim is to support parents/carers as their children's first and most important educators by involving them in their children's education and in the full life of the setting.

- We consult with all parents to find out what works best for them during the settling in period.
- We inform all parents about how the setting operates, and its policies, through access to written information and through regular informal and formal communication.
- We inform all parents on a regular basis about their children's progress through the use of 'Family'.
- We involve parents in the shared record keeping about their children - either formally or informally – and ensure parents have access to their children developmental records.
- We provide opportunities for parents to contribute their own skills, knowledge and interests to the activities of the setting.
- We inform parents about workshops in school relevant to their child's learning and development.
- We consult with parents about the times of meetings to avoid excluding anyone.
- We welcome the contributions of parents and carry out regular questionnaires, as well as having a suggestion box available in the Nursery.
- We inform all parents of the systems for registering queries, complaints or suggestions and we check to ensure these are understood. All parents have access to our written complaints procedure.
- We provide opportunities for parents to learn about the curriculum offered in the setting and about young children's learning, in the setting and at home.

### **Working in partnership with other agencies**

We work in partnership with local and national agencies to promote the well-being of all children.

### **Procedures**

- Procedures are in place for the sharing of information about children and families with other agencies. These are set out in the Information Sharing Policy, Safeguarding Children and the Supporting Children with Special Educational Needs Policy.
- Information shared by other agencies with us is regarded as third party information. This is also kept in confidence and not shared without consent from that agency.
- When working in partnership with staff from other agencies, we make those individuals welcome in the setting and their professional roles are respected.
- We follow the protocols for working with agencies, for example on child protection.
- Staff from other agencies do not have unsupervised access to the child they are visiting in the setting and do not have access to any other child(ren) during their visit.
- Our staff do not casually share information or seek informal advice about any named child/family.

When necessary, we consult with local and national agencies who offer a wealth of advice and information that help us to develop our understanding of the issues facing us and who can provide support and information for parents. For example, ethnic/cultural organisations, drug/alcohol agencies, welfare rights advisors or organisations promoting childcare and education, or adult education.

### **Supervision of children on outings and visits**

Children benefit from being taken out of the setting to go on visits or trips to local parks, or other suitable venues, for activities which enhance their learning experiences. Some settings do not have direct access to outdoor provision on their premises and will need to take children out daily. Staff in our setting ensure that there are procedures to keep children safe on outings; all staff and volunteers are aware of and follow the procedures as laid out below.

### **Procedures**

- Parents sign a general consent on registration for their children to be taken out as a part of the daily activities of the setting.
- This general consent details the venues used for daily activities.
- There is a risk assessment for each venue carried out, which is reviewed regularly.
- Parents are always asked to sign specific consent forms before major outings.
- A risk assessment is carried out before an outing takes place.

- All venue risk assessments may be viewed by parents.
- Our adult to child ratio is high, normally one adult to two children, depending on their age, sensibility and the type of venue, as well as how it is to be reached.
- Named children are assigned to individual staff to ensure that each child is well supervised, that no child goes astray and that there is no unauthorised access to children.
- Outings are recorded, stating:
  - The date and time of the outing.
  - The venue and mode of transport used.
  - The names of the staff members assigned to each of the children attending.
  - The time of return.
- Staff take a mobile phone on outings, as well as emergency equipment, medicines required for individual children, a mini first aid kit, snacks and water.
- Staff take a list of children with them with contact numbers of parents/carers, as well as an accident book and a copy of our Missing Child Policy.
- Records are kept of the vehicles used to transport children, with named drivers and appropriate insurance cover.
- A minimum of two staff accompany children on outings and a minimum of two remain behind with the rest of the children.
- At least one paediatric first aider accompanies a trip with EYFS children.

### **Before and After School Care**

The main school day runs from 8.00am until 5.00pm.

Children in Nursery may be booked into morning, afternoon or full day sessions and may be dropped off from 7.30am.

Children in Reception should be dropped off at Prep School between 8.00am and 8.15am with duty staff available to supervise children.

Children in Reception may be collected at either 4.00pm or stay on for the after school club, until 5pm.

There is no supervision for Reception children after 5.00pm so if any pupils are not collected by then, the uncollected child procedure is followed.

Nursery children should be collected by 5.30pm.

### **Uncollected child**

In the event that a child is not collected by an authorised adult at the end of a session/day, we put into practice these procedures. These ensure the child is cared for

safely by an experienced and qualified practitioner who is known to the child. The child will receive a high standard of care in order to cause as little distress as possible.

### Procedures

- Parents of children starting are asked to provide information on the Registration Form:
  - Home address and telephone number.
  - Place of work, address and telephone number (if applicable).
  - Mobile telephone number (if applicable).
  - Names, addresses, telephone numbers and signatures of adults who are authorised by the parents to collect their child, for example a child-minder or grandparent.
  - Who has parental responsibility for the child.
  - Information about any person who does not have legal access to the child.

On occasions when parents are aware that they will not be at home or in their usual place of work, they will be asked to inform us in writing of how they can be contacted.

- On occasions when parents, or the persons normally authorised to collect the child, are not able to collect the child, they provide us with written details of the name, address and telephone number of the person who will be collecting their child and agree with parents how to verify the identity of the person who is to collect their child (usually a password and/or photograph).
- Parents are informed that if they are not able to collect the child as planned, they must inform us.
- Parents know that we apply our child protection procedures in the event that their children are not collected by an authorised adult within one hour after the final collection time at the end of the day.
- If a child is not collected at the end of the session/day, the procedures below will be followed:
  - Family is checked for any information about changes to the normal collection routines or times.
  - Parents/carers are contacted at home or at work.

- The adults who are authorised by the parents to collect their child - and whose telephone numbers are recorded on the Registration Form - are contacted.
  - All reasonable attempts are made to contact the parents or nominated carers.
  - The child does not leave the school with anyone other than those named.
  - If no-one collects the child after the setting has closed and there is no-one who can be contacted to collect the child, we apply the following procedures.
    - The school Safeguarding Team are informed
    - We contact our local authority children's social care team:

  - The child stays at the setting in the care of two fully-vetted workers until the child is safely collected either by the parents or by a social care worker.
  - Social care will aim to find the parent or relative. If they are unable to do so, the child will become looked after by the local authority.
  - Under no circumstances will staff go to look for the parent, nor do they take the child home with them. A full written report of the incident is recorded in the child's file and passed to the school Safeguarding team

- Depending on circumstances, we reserve the right to charge parents for the additional hours worked by our staff.
  - Following advice for Social Services.
  - Ofsted may be informed: 0300 123 1231
  - The local Early Years Improvement Officer may also be informed.

### Missing Sessions

In the event of a child not attending for an extended period of time, we would follow the procedure:

- Monitor the register
- Check the holiday/sickness absent forms
- Telephone the two contacts given on the child's registration form
- Inform school Safeguarding Team
- Notify NEG funding if the child is in receipt of Grant funding.

### **Late Collection of Child**

In the event that a child is going to be collected from the Nursery after 5.30pm, a "Late Collection" charge may be made.

### **Procedures**

We understand that occasionally, unforeseen circumstances may occur to prevent parents from collecting children at the agreed time.

- Parents must inform the school as soon they realise that they will not make their agreed collection time.
- A Late Collection charge may be made on parents' next invoice.
- If the child has still not been collected by 6pm, our Uncollected Child Policy will fall into place.

### **Missing Child**

Children are dropped off and collected by their parents or carer directly to staff. The premises are secured with key code locks on doors and external gates have locks to prevent pupils leaving the premises and unauthorised adults entering the building. Pupils are registered at the start and end of each day with a record being kept of who will collect them at the end of the day. Pupils in Reception are also registered after lunch before the afternoon sessions begin.

Pupils are supervised around the school beyond their own classroom at all times during the day. Statutory staff ratio guidelines are followed to ensure adequate supervision during lessons, break times and whilst out of school on trips. Staff ratios are amended depending on the activity.

In the event of a child going missing the key worker would alert colleagues and then go and look for the child in the last known location. The classroom, outdoor play area, toilets and corridors would be thoroughly checked. If the child is not found then the member of staff would immediately inform the Prep School Head or Head of EYFS would initiate the 'missing child' procedures below:

- **Designation of Search Co-ordinator** - A Search Coordinator is designated (Nursery Manager, or Head of Prep School).

- **Condensed Supervision** - EYFS children are condensed into one classroom, with the appropriate number of staff to cover ratios being allocated to supervise them.
- **Search Plan** - The Search Co-ordinator gathers any remaining EYFS staff and also sends for any Prep School teaching assistants.
- **Immediate and Area Search** - The Search Co-ordinator allocates areas of the immediately surrounding buildings and outside areas to be searched with staff reporting back to her.
- **Wider Area Search** - A search of the school building and estate is conducted, including:
  - Checking common rooms and bag rooms, the Library, the Music Block, Reddie Hall, the boarding houses, etc.
  - Checking CCTV records (see Ray Morrison)
- **Emergency Procedures** - If a pupil has not been found within 30 minutes, full emergency procedures come into effect: The Head of Prep meets with the Headmaster and/or Deputy Head to agree a plan which is likely to include:
  - Phoning parents or guardians.
  - Informing the police.

### First aid

The policies and procedures below, for First Aid and Medical Procedures are supplemented by our whole school medical policies.

### First Aid policy statement

In EYFS staff are able to take action to apply first aid treatment in the event of an accident involving a child or adult. For more serious injuries, children are taken to the medical centre or a member of the medical team brought to the child for first aid treatment. At least one member of staff with a current paediatric first aid certificate is on the premises, or on an outing at any one time. There is a first aid box accessible at all times in the Nursery room and the main Prep building, with appropriate content for use with children. Any medicines given by parents for their children will be kept in a locked cupboard or fridge for Nursery children or sent to the medical centre for Reception children. Nursery keep a written record of accidents or injuries (PFA's are renewed every 3 years) and first aid treatment. In Nursery accidents are recorded on Family and parents notified.

While it is not our policy to care for sick children, who should be at home until they are well enough to return to the setting, we will agree to administer medication as part of maintaining their health and well-being or when they are recovering from an illness. Only medicine which has been prescribed by a doctor and has the original label on it may be administered.

In many cases, it is possible for children's GPs to prescribe medicine that can be taken at home in the morning and evening. As far as possible, administering medicines will only be done where it would be detrimental to the child's health if not given in the setting. It is advised that the parent keeps the child at home for the first 48 hours to ensure there are no adverse effects, as well as to give time for the medication to take effect.

The Head of EYFS is responsible for ensuring all staff understand and follow these procedures.

Rosie Kneller is responsible for the correct administration of medication in the Nursery and medical staff for the Reception class. Rosie Kneller may allocate the role to the key person. This includes ensuring that parent consent forms have been completed, that medicines are stored correctly and that records are kept according to procedures. In the absence of the key person, the manager is responsible for the overseeing of administering medication.

### **Procedures**

Children taking prescribed medication must be well enough to attend the setting. Only medication prescribed by a doctor (or other medically qualified person) is administered. It must be in-date and prescribed for the current condition (medicines containing aspirin will only be given if prescribed by a doctor).

Children's prescribed medicines are stored in their original containers, are clearly labelled and are inaccessible to the children.

Parents give permission for the administration of medication. The staff receiving the medication must ask the parent to complete a consent form on Family stating the following information. No medication may be given without these details being provided:

- Child's name

- The name of the medication
- The dosage to be given in the setting; unscheduled(as needed), scheduled (regularly at set times), amount and unit
- Reason for medication
- Acknowledged by parent

The child's medication will be placed in the lockable medicine cupboard or fridge. Parents/carers MUST then complete a consent form. Staff will be verbally made aware of details of administration. This will be recorded on Family

The administration of medicine is recorded accurately on Family each time it is given and is signed by the key person/manager and witness. Parents are notified of administration of the medicine.

- name of the child;
- Time given
- Witnessed by
- Acknowledged by parents

### Storage of medicines

- In the Nursery, all medication is stored safely in a locked cupboard or refrigerated as required. Where the cupboard or refrigerator is not used solely for storing medicines, they are kept in a **marked plastic box**.
- The manager is responsible for ensuring medicine is handed back at the end of the day to the parent.
- For some conditions, medication may be kept in the setting to be administered on a regular or as-and-when-required basis. The manager checks that any medication held in the setting, is in date and returns any out-of-date medication back to the parent.

Any conditions or medication needed are recorded on the registration form when joining and parents/carers are given time to go through all contents of the registration form in detail on their pre-visit. Staff are all made aware of all children's needs, health care plans & risk assessments are completed.

- If the administration of prescribed medication requires medical knowledge, individual training is provided for the relevant member of staff by a health professional.
- No child may self-administer. Where children are capable of understanding when they need medication, for example with asthma, they should be encouraged to tell their key person what they need. However, this does not replace staff vigilance in knowing and responding when a child requires medication.
- Children who have long term medical conditions and who may require ongoing medication.

A risk assessment is carried out for each child with long term medical conditions that require ongoing medication. This is the responsibility of the manager alongside the key person. Other medical or social care personnel may need to be involved in the risk assessment.

- Parents will also contribute to a risk assessment. They should be shown around the setting, understand the routines and activities and point out anything which they think may be a risk factor for their child.
- For some medical conditions, key staff will need to have training in a basic understanding of the condition, as well as how the medication is to be administered correctly. The training needs for staff form part of the risk assessment.
- The risk assessment includes vigorous activities and any other activity that may give cause for concern regarding an individual child's health needs.
- The risk assessment includes arrangements for taking medicines on outings and advice is sought from the child's GP if necessary where there are concerns.
- An individual health care plan for the child is drawn up with the parent; outlining the key person's role and what information must be shared with other staff who care for the child.
- The health care plan should include the measures to be taken in an emergency.
- The health care plan is reviewed every six months, or more frequently if necessary. This includes reviewing the medication, e.g. changes to the medication or the dosage, any side effects noted etc.
- Parents receive a copy of the health care plan and each contributor, including the parent, signs it.

### **Managing medicines on trips and outings**

- If children are going on outings, staff accompanying the children must include the key person for the child with a risk assessment, or another member of staff who is fully informed about the child's needs and/or medication.

- Medication for a child is taken in a sealed plastic box clearly labelled with the child's name and the name of the medication.
- If a child on medication has to be taken to hospital, the child's medication is taken in a sealed plastic box clearly labelled with the child's name and the name of the medication.
- As a precaution, children should not eat when travelling in vehicles.
- Any medicine administered will be recorded on the Family app for parents.
- This procedure should be read alongside the outings procedure.

### **Managing children who are sick, infectious, or with allergies**

(Including reporting notifiable diseases)

We provide care for healthy children through reducing the risk of cross infection of viruses and bacterial infections and promote health through identifying allergies and reducing the risk of contact with the allergenic substance.

### **Procedures for children who are sick or infectious**

- If children appear unwell during the day, have a temperature, sickness, diarrhoea or pains, particularly in the head or stomach, a member of Nursery staff or a member of the medical team calls the parents and asks them to collect the child, or send a known carer to collect the child on their behalf. Children are then treated by Nursery staff or kept in the medical centre for Reception children.
- The child's temperature is taken using an ear thermometer.
- If a child has a temperature, they are kept cool.
- In emergencies, call 999 or if further advice is needed 111.
- Parents are asked to take their child to the doctor before returning them to the setting; the setting can refuse admittance to children who have a temperature, sickness and diarrhoea or a contagious infection or disease.
- Where children have been prescribed antibiotics, parents will be asked to keep them at home for 48 hours before returning to the setting.
- After diarrhoea and sickness, parents are asked to keep children home for 48 hours from last episode and the child is well and able to enjoy a session.

### **Reporting of 'notifiable diseases'**

- If a child or adult is diagnosed as suffering from a notifiable disease under the Health Protection (Notification) Regulations 2010, the GP will report this to the Health Protection Agency.

- When the setting becomes aware, or is formally informed of the notifiable disease, the manager informs Ofsted and acts on any advice given by the Health Protection Agency.

### **Nits and head lice**

- Nits and head lice are not an excludable condition, although in exceptional cases a parent may be asked to keep the child away until the infestation has cleared.
- On identifying cases of head lice, all parents are informed that there is a case of head lice and asked to treat their child and all the family if they are found to have head lice.

### **Procedures for children with allergies**

- When parents start their children at the setting they are asked if their child suffers from any known allergies. This is recorded on the Registration Form.
- If a child has an allergy, a risk assessment form is completed to detail the following:
  - The allergen (i.e. the substance, material or living creature the child is allergic to such as nuts, eggs, bee stings, cats etc.)
  - The nature of the allergic reactions e.g. anaphylactic shock reaction, including rash, reddening of skin, swelling, breathing problems etc.
  - What to do in case of allergic reactions, any medication used and how it is to be used (e.g. EpiPen.)
  - Control measures - such as how the child can be prevented from contact with the allergen.
  - Review.
- This form is kept in the child's personal file and a copy is displayed where staff can see it.
- Where relevant parents or a healthcare professional train staff in how to administer special medication in the event of an allergic reaction.
- No nuts or nut products are used within the school.
- Parents are made aware so that no nut or nut products are accidentally brought in, for example to a party.
- We have nut free school catering.

### **Oral medication**

- Oral medications must be prescribed by a GP.

- The setting must be provided with clear instructions on how to administer such medication.
- All risk assessment procedures need to be adhered to for the correct storage and administration of the medication
- The setting must have the parents or guardians prior consent. Which is logged on Famly. It is not necessary to forward copy documents to your insurance provider

### **Lifesaving medication and invasive treatments**

Adrenaline injections (Epipens) for anaphylactic shock reactions (caused by allergies to nuts, eggs etc) or invasive treatments such as rectal administration of Diazepam (for epilepsy).

The provider may ask for:

- a letter from the child's GP/consultant stating the child's condition and what medication if any is to be administered;
- Consent from the parent or guardian allowing staff to administer medication; and
- proof of training in the administration of such medication by the child's GP, a district nurse, children's nurse specialist or a community paediatric nurse.

### **Key person for special needs children**

This applies to children requiring assistance with tubes to help them with everyday living e.g. breathing apparatus, to take nourishment, colostomy bags etc.

- Prior written consent must be obtained from the child's parent or guardian to give treatment and/or medication prescribed by the child's GP.
- The key person must have the relevant medical training/experience, which may include those who have received appropriate instructions from parents or guardians, or who have qualifications.

### **Health and safety general standards (see whole school policy)**

The health and safety of children is of paramount importance.

- We aim to make children, parents, staff and volunteers aware of health and safety issues and to minimise the hazards and risks to enable the children to thrive in a healthy and safe environment.

### **Raising awareness**

- Induction training for staff and volunteers includes a clear explanation of health and safety issues, so that all adults are able to adhere to our policy and procedures, as they understand their shared responsibility for health and safety. The induction

training covers matters of employee wellbeing, including safe lifting and the storage of potentially dangerous substances.

- Health and safety issues are explained to the parents of new children, so that they understand the part played by these issues in daily life.
- As necessary, health and safety training is included in the annual training plans of staff, and health and safety is discussed regularly at staff meetings.
- Children are made aware of health and safety issues through discussions, planned activities and routines.
- We take precautions to prevent children's fingers from being trapped in doors (guards).
- All floor surfaces are checked daily to ensure they are clean and not uneven, wet or damaged. Signs are inserted where needed.
- Boiler/electrical switch gear/meter cupboard is not accessible to the children.
- Fires, heaters, electric sockets, wires and leads are properly guarded and the children are taught not to touch them.
- The temperature of hot water is controlled to prevent scalds.
- Lighting and ventilation is adequate in all areas including storage areas.
- All resources and materials, which are used by the children, are stored safely.
- All equipment and resources are stored or stacked safely to prevent them accidentally falling or collapsing.
- The outdoor area is securely fenced.
- The outdoor area is checked for safety and cleared of rubbish before it is used.
- Adults and children are alerted to the dangers of poisonous plants, herbicides and pesticides.
- Where water can form a pool on equipment, it is removed before children start playing outside.
- The outdoor sand pit is covered when not in use and is cleaned regularly.
- All outdoor activities are supervised at all times.

### Hygiene

- Daily routines encourage the children to learn about personal hygiene. There is a daily cleaning routine for the setting, which includes the play room(s), kitchen, rest area, toilets and nappy changing areas. There is a schedule for cleaning resources and equipment, dressing-up clothes and furnishings.
- The toilet area has a high standard of hygiene, including hand washing and drying facilities and disposal facilities for nappies.
- We implement good hygiene practices by:

- cleaning tables between activities;
- cleaning and checking toilets regularly;
- wearing protective clothing - such as aprons and disposable gloves - as appropriate;
- providing sets of clean clothes;
- providing tissues, nappy sacks and wipes;

### **Activities and resources**

- Before purchase or loan, equipment and resources are checked to ensure that they are safe for the ages and stages of the children currently attending the setting.
- The layout of play equipment allows adults and children to move safely and freely between activities.
- All equipment is regularly checked for cleanliness and safety, and any dangerous items are repaired or discarded.
- All materials, including paint and glue, are non-toxic.
- Sand is clean and suitable for children's play.
- Physical play is constantly supervised.
- Children are taught to handle and store tools safely.
- Children who are sleeping are checked regularly.
- Any faulty equipment is removed from use and is repaired. If it cannot be repaired it is discarded.

### **Recording and reporting of accidents and incidents**

(Including the procedure for reporting accidents and incidents to the HSE under RIDDOR requirements.) We follow the guidelines of the Reporting of Injuries, Diseases and Dangerous Occurrences Regulations (RIDDOR) for the reporting of accidents and incidents. Child protection matters or behavioural incidents between children are not regarded as incidents and there are separate procedures for this.

Our accident forms:

- are recorded and kept on Famly.
- are accessible to all staff who all know how to complete it; and
- are reviewed weekly by the manager and Health and Safety officer for the whole school to identify any potential or actual hazards.

### **Reporting accidents and incidents**

Accidents and injuries are reported to parents on the same day along with details of any first aid treatment given.

Accidents sustained at home prior to arrival at the setting are recorded on Famly when the child arrives.

Ofsted is notified as soon as possible, but at least within 14 days, of any instances which involve:

- food poisoning affecting two or more children looked after on our premises;
- a serious accident or injury to, or serious illness of, a child in our care and the action we take in response; and
- the death of a child in our care.

Local child protection agencies are informed of any serious accident or injury to a child, or the death of any child, while in our care and we act on any advice given by those agencies.

Any food poisoning affecting two or more children or adults on our premises is reported to the local Environmental Health Department.

### **Records of incidents, minor accidents and accidents**

- Incidents involving a child are recorded on an 'Incident Record' on Famly.
- Injuries sustained at home are recorded on a 'Injury on Arrival' form on Famly.
- Accidents are recorded on Famly. This can be accessed and viewed by parents.
- Major incidents, including those that are reportable to the Health and Safety Executive as above, are recorded on an accident Pro-Forma and given to Ray Morrison within 24 hours of the accident occurring.
- In the unlikely event of a child dying on the premises, the emergency services would be called, and the advice of these services are followed.

### **Nappy changing**

No child is excluded from participating in our setting who may, for any reason, not yet be toilet trained and who may still be wearing nappies or equivalent. We work with parents towards toilet training, unless there are medical or other developmental reasons why this may not be appropriate at the time.

We provide nappy changing facilities and exercise good hygiene practices in order to accommodate children who are not yet toilet trained.

We see toilet training as a self-care skill that children have the opportunity to learn with the full support and non-judgemental concern of adults.

### **Procedures**

- All staff are aware of the children in their care who are in nappies or 'pull-ups'.
- Changing areas are warm with safe areas to lay children.
- Each child has their own nappies or pull ups and changing wipes.
- Gloves and aprons are put on by staff before changing starts. The changing area is cleaned with antibacterial wipes between each change.
- All staff are familiar with the hygiene procedures and carry these out when changing nappies.
- In addition, staff ensure that nappy changing is relaxed and a time to promote independence in young children.
- Children are encouraged to take an interest in using the toilet; they may just want to sit on it and talk to a friend who is also using the toilet.
- Children are encouraged to wash their hands, and have soap, a hand-dryer and paper towel to hand. They will be allowed time for some play as they explore the water and the soap.
- Staff use gloves which are changed with each nappy change and hands are washed each time.
- Staff are gentle when changing; they avoid pulling faces and making negative comments about nappy contents.
- Staff do not make inappropriate comments about children's genitals when changing their nappies.
- Older children access the toilet when they have the need to and are encouraged to be independent. They are supervised at all times.
- Nappies and pull ups are disposed of hygienically. Cloth nappies, trainer pants and ordinary pants that have been wet or soiled are bagged for the parent to take home.
- We have a 'duty of care' towards children's personal needs. If children are left in wet or soiled nappies/pull ups this may constitute neglect and will be a disciplinary matter.
- All staff are aware of the intimate care Policy.

### Intimate Care

#### Introduction

The purpose of this policy is:

- To safeguard the rights and promote the best interests of the children
- To ensure children are treated with sensitivity and respect, and in such a way that their experience of intimate care is a positive one
- To safeguard adults required to operate in sensitive situations
- To raise awareness and provide a clear procedure for intimate care
- To inform parents/carers how intimate care is administered
- To ensure parents/carers are consulted in the intimate of care of their children

#### Principles

It is essential that every child is treated as an individual and that care is given as gently and as sensitively as possible. As far as possible, the child should be allowed to exercise choice and should be encouraged to have a positive image of his/her own body. It is important for staff to bear in mind how they would feel in the child's position. Given the right approach, intimate care can provide opportunities to teach children about the value of their own bodies, to develop their safety skills and to enhance their self-esteem. Parents and staff should be aware that matters concerning intimate care will be dealt with confidentially and sensitively and that the young person's right to privacy and dignity is maintained at all times.

#### Definition

Intimate care is one of the following:

- Supporting a pupil with dressing/undressing
- Providing comfort or support for a distressed pupil
- Cleaning a pupil who has soiled him/herself, has vomited or feels unwell
- Helping a child to go to the toilet outdoors (on hikes / camps only) if they need to urinate in between toilet stops.

#### Supporting dressing/undressing

Sometimes it will be necessary for staff to aid a child in getting dressed or undressed particularly in Early Years. Staff will always encourage children to attempt undressing and dressing unaided.

#### Providing comfort or support

Children may seek physical comfort from staff. Where children require physical support, staff need to be aware that physical contact must be kept to a minimum and be child initiated. When comforting a child or giving reassurance, the member of staff's hands should always be seen and a child should not be positioned close to a member of staff's body which could be regarded as intimate. If physical contact is deemed to be appropriate staff must provide care which is suitable to the age, gender and situation of the child.

If a child touches a member of staff in a way that makes him/her feel uncomfortable this can be gently but firmly discouraged in a way which communicates that the touch, rather than the child, is unacceptable.

### **Soiling**

On the rare occasion when a child has wet/soiled him/herself or has vomited over clothing the child has to be cleaned up.

When touching a child, staff should always be aware of the possibility of invading a child's privacy and will respect the child's wishes and feelings.

If a child needs to be cleaned, staff will make sure that:

- Protective gloves are worn
- The procedure is discussed in a friendly and reassuring way with the child throughout the process
- The child is encouraged to care for him/herself as far as possible
- Physical contact is kept to the minimum possible to carry out the necessary cleaning
- Privacy is given appropriate to the child's age and the situation
- All spills of vomit, blood or excrement are wiped up and flushed down the toilet
- Any soiling that can be, is flushed down the toilet
- Parents are informed.

### **Toileting outdoors on hikes, camps and during outdoor activities.**

On the rare occasion when pupils are participating in activities beyond the classroom and away from immediate toilet facilities, staff must plan the day carefully to include regular toilet stops before, during and after activities wherever possible. If a child is in need of the toilet between planned toilet visits then the following procedure must be followed:

- The child will be taken to a private area away from others
- The child must be reassured throughout
- The child will be asked to undress themselves as appropriate

- Staff would guide the child in how to toilet without soiling clothing
- The child will clean themselves independently if possible
- Physical contact by staff is kept to a minimum
- Protective gloves are worn as necessary

### **Hygiene**

All staff must be familiar with normal precautions for avoiding infection, must follow basic hygiene procedures and have access to protective, disposable gloves

### **Protection for staff**

Members of staff need to have regard to the danger of allegations being made against them and take precautions to avoid this risk. These should include:

- Gaining a verbal agreement from another member of staff that the action being taken is necessary
- Allow the child, wherever possible, to express a preference to choose his/her carer and encourage them to say if they find a carer to be unacceptable
- Be aware of and responsive to the child's reactions

Wherever possible the same child will not be cared for by the same adult on a regular basis; ideally there will be a rota of carers known to the child who will take turns in providing care. This will ensure, as far as possible, that over-familiar relationships are discouraged from developing, whilst at the same time guarding against the care being carried out by a succession of completely different carers.

If a child has a persistent problem then an Intimate Care Plan will be written in conjunction with the parents/carers to ensure processes and safeguarding concerns are met for all concerned. This would be reviewed on a regular basis on a health and well being plan.

If a member of staff has any concerns about physical changes in a child's presentation, e.g. marks, bruises, soreness etc. she/he will immediately report concerns to the designated person for child protection. A clear record of the concern will be completed and referred to social care and/or the Police if necessary. Parents will be asked for their consent or informed that a referral is necessary prior to it being made unless doing so is likely to place the child at greater risk or harm.

Information would be emailed to safeguarding, if a child becomes distressed or unhappy about being cared for by a particular member of staff, the matter will be looked into and outcomes recorded. Parents/carers will be contacted at the earliest

opportunity as part of this process in order to reach a resolution. Staffing schedules will be altered until the issue(s) are resolved so that the child's needs remain paramount. Further advice will be taken from outside agencies if necessary.

If a child makes an allegation against a member of staff, all necessary procedures will be followed.

### **Food and drink**

Eating represents a social time for children and helps children to learn about healthy eating. We promote healthy eating. At snack and meal times, we aim to provide nutritious food, which meets the children's individual dietary needs. Fresh drinking water is available at all times throughout the day.

### **Procedures**

We follow these procedures to promote healthy eating in our setting.

- Before a child starts to attend the setting, we ask their parents about their dietary needs and preferences, including any allergies.
- We record information about each child's dietary needs in the Registration Form and parents sign the form to signify that it is correct.
- We regularly consult with parents to ensure that our records of their children's dietary needs, including any allergies, are up-to-date. Parents sign the updated record to signify that it is correct.
- We display current information about individual children's dietary needs so that all staff and volunteers are fully informed about them.
- We implement systems to ensure that children receive only food and drink that is consistent with their dietary needs and preferences, as well as their parents' wishes.
- We plan menus in advance.
- We display the menus of meals/snacks for parents to view on the notice board and online.
- We provide nutritious food for all meals and snacks.
- We include a variety of foods from the four main food groups.
- We include foods from the diet of each of the children's cultural backgrounds, providing children with familiar foods and introducing them to new ones.
- We are a nut free school and are aware and follow allergy information.
- We provide a vegetarian alternative and will provide for dietary needs.

- We require staff to show sensitivity in providing for children's diets and allergies. Staff do not use a child's diet or allergy as a label for the child, or make a child feel singled out because of her/his diet or allergy.
- We organise meal and snack times so that they are social occasions in which children and staff participate.
- We use meal and snack times to help children to develop independence through making choices, serving food and drink and feeding themselves.
- We provide children with utensils that are appropriate for their ages and stages of development and that take account of the eating practices in their cultures.
- We have fresh drinking water constantly available for the children. We inform the children about how to obtain the water and that they can ask for water at any time during the day.
- In accordance with parents' wishes, we offer children arriving early in the morning, and/or staying late, an appropriate meal or snack.
- In order to protect children with food allergies, we discourage children bringing food into the setting and from sharing and swapping their food with one another.

### **Food hygiene**

(Including the procedure for reporting food poisoning)

We provide and/or serve food for children on the following basis:

- Snacks.
- Meals.

We maintain the highest possible food hygiene standards with regard to the purchase, storage, preparation and serving of food.

The School is registered as a food provider with the local authority Environmental Health Department.

### **Procedures**

- The Catering Manager and her staff understand the principles of Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point (HACCP) as it applies to their business. All the catering staff have been trained in food hygiene.
- The kitchen is subject to all the Health and Safety checks and uses reliable suppliers.
- All staff follow the guidelines of Safer Food, Better Business.

- In the setting, the person responsible for food preparation and serving carries out daily opening and closing checks on the kitchen to ensure standards are met consistently.
- Any food in the setting is stored at correct temperatures and is checked to ensure it is in-date and not subject to contamination by pests, rodents or mould.
- Food preparation areas are cleaned before use as well as after use.
- There are separate facilities for hand-washing and for washing up.
- All surfaces are clean and non-porous.
- All utensils, crockery etc are clean and stored appropriately.
- Waste food is disposed of daily.
- Cleaning materials and other dangerous materials are stored out of children's reach in a locked cupboard.
- All Nursery staff have food hygiene certificates.
- Staff supervising cookery activities have a Level 2 Food Hygiene certificate.
- When children take part in cooking activities, they:
  - are supervised at all times;
  - understand the importance of hand washing and simple hygiene rules;
  - are kept away from hot surfaces and hot water; and
  - do not have unsupervised access to electrical equipment, such as blenders etc.

### **Reporting of food poisoning**

- Food poisoning can occur for a number of reasons; not all cases of sickness or diarrhoea are as a result of food poisoning and not all cases of sickness or diarrhoea are reportable.
- Where children and/or adults have been diagnosed by a GP or hospital doctor to be suffering from food poisoning and where it seems possible that the source of the outbreak is within the setting, the manager will contact the Environmental Health Department to report the outbreak and will comply with any investigation.
- Any confirmed cases of food poisoning affecting two or more children looked after on the premises are notified to Ofsted as soon as reasonably practicable, and always within 14 days of the incident.

### **Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan**

The aim of this Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan (PEEP) is to provide people who cannot get themselves out of a building unaided with the information they require. All staff are made aware of their responsibilities.

This plan should be completed for any child/young person/adult who requires assistance with any aspect of emergency evacuation. The plan should include assistance required from the point of raising alarm to passing through the final exit of the building. Once completed this should be held by:-

- The child/young person (on file)
- Parent or carer of the child/young person
- Persons designated to assist
- EYFS staff
- Inclusion Officer (stored centrally)

Note: This plan must be reviewed on an annual basis (at least) and when there is a significant change in circumstances of the building, or child/young person or staff team.

### **Managing Behaviour**

We provide a safe and supportive learning environment for every child where the welfare and development of the child are our utmost priority. Positive praise and age appropriate rewards are used throughout the day to recognise and value the strengths and interests of each child. Staff get to know the children well so that they can support those areas in need of development, both socially, emotionally and in their learning. Weekly celebration chapels enable Reception children to receive Stars of the Week certificates and share any achievements out of school.

Close home-school partnerships are developed and built upon through staff being available to parents at the start and end of each day, regular workshops for parents, informal communication via Seesaw and Family and newsletter via electronic communication.

No corporal punishment is used in our school; it must never be threatened, either.

Staff give verbal guidance to pupils about their behaviour and actions, they are encouraged to talk about our school values during circle time and assemblies so that positive behaviour is continually promoted.

When children's behaviour falls short of our school expectations, parents are contacted personally to discuss the situation in case there are any circumstances outside of school which may be affecting a child's emotional state. We work together to support the child and model acceptable behaviour, monitoring the situation carefully and

giving lots of praise when the child displays good behaviour to reinforce our expectations.

Learning activities are regularly planned which allow the children to play collaboratively in order to promote turn taking, speaking and listening skills, cooperation, negotiation and compromise. Children have opportunities to discuss their feelings and emotions and those of others in a supportive environment which builds mutual trust and understanding.

Rosie Kneller is responsible for behaviour management in the Nursery and the Reception class.

### **Physical intervention**

In general physical contact with children should be avoided, although there are occasions when it may be appropriate. **FORCE IS NEVER TO BE USED AS A PUNISHMENT**

The need to use force is a last resort and is usually avoided by

- creating a calm environment
- developing positive relationships
- teaching pupils how to manage conflict and strong feelings
- defusing/de-escalating incidents if they do arise

However, all staff are authorised to use reasonable force, as necessary, to prevent a pupil from doing or continuing to do any of the following:

- injuring themselves or another
- causing damage to property, including the pupil's own property
- causing, or at risk of causing, injury or damage by misuse of dangerous materials or objects
- being in immediate danger e.g. spilt boiling liquid, something falling from above, pulling a child from the path of an oncoming car

Physical intervention might involve

- physically interposing between pupils.
- blocking a pupil's path.
- holding.
- leading a pupil by the arm or hand.

- shepherding a pupil away by placing a hand in the centre of the back.

Physical intervention should always be kept to a minimum and appropriate to the situation.

With EYFS children it is important they are taught to consider the needs, views, feelings and rights of others and the impact their behaviour has on other people and places. This is taught within the daily life of the children in the school. If a specific risk assessment or behavioural plan is required for an individual pupil, this should be done by the Head of Prep, Head of EYFS, key worker and parents.

### **Specific Training for staff**

- Aim for side to side contact
- Leave a gap between adult and child body
- Keep child's back as straight as possible
- Avoid holding at joints to avoid pain and damage
- Avoid lifting the child
- Do not restrict ability to breathe

If a member of staff has had to use physical intervention (reasonable force to prevent children from injuring themselves, or others, or damaging property) to control/restrain a pupil, this is to be recorded on My Concern. The Nursery Manager must be informed as soon as possible, that same day. The report should detail the incident in full and include 'who, what, when, where, why', names of all adults and pupils present during the incident, any injuries suffered by staff or pupils and any first aid and/or medical attention required. Parents of pupils involved will be informed of the incident on the same day.

There will be a post incident review which will allow the member of staff to talk with a senior member of staff and also allow the senior staff to monitor incidents.

### **Abbotsholme School is a non-smoking school**

We comply with health and safety regulations and the Safeguarding and Welfare Requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. No smoking is allowed anywhere in the school. This includes Vaping.

- All staff, parents and volunteers are made aware of our no-smoking policy.
- We display no-smoking signs.

- The no-smoking policy is stated in our information for parents.

### **Weather Protection/Adverse Conditions Protection**

In the event of adverse conditions, e.g. snow, gales, low temperature, electricity being switched off etc. the children's safety and welfare is paramount. We also protect children against the sun and hot weather. To protect children's safety and welfare, each situation will be assessed and a decision may be taken to close.

### **Snow**

- If parents/carers are unsure whether we are open, telephone the Nursery on 01889 594271 or the main reception on 01889 592017 and ask for advice.
- If parents are worried about the condition of the roads and snow looks like worsening, they may decide not to risk the journey. In this case, parents should telephone and advise us of the absence.
- When it is snowy and cold, the children need warm, waterproof clothing, hats, gloves and wellington boots, all named, for playing outside.
- If we have been advised that we are going to be without power supplies, parents/carers will be advised in advance.
- In the event of children being uncollected, we will follow the procedure in our Uncollected Child Policy.

### **Hot weather**

- Parents/carers are responsible for providing named sun hats which give head, face and neck protection from the sun, hats are a must for hot weather.
- Use of sunscreens is essential for protection against damage from UV. These should be applied by parents/carers before the child arrives. Shade is provided in our outdoor areas and children are not outdoors for extensive periods of time.
- Parents are asked to provide their children with named water bottles, to enable them to access drinking water freely.

### **Animals in the setting and use of the school farm**

Children learn about the natural world, its animals and other living creatures, as part of the Learning and Development Requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. This may include contact with animals, or other living creatures, either in the setting or on visits. We aim to ensure that this is in accordance with sensible hygiene and safety controls.

### Procedures

Animals in the setting as pets

- We take account of the views of parents and children when selecting an animal or creature to keep as a pet in the setting.
- We carry out a risk assessment with a knowledgeable person accounting for any hygiene or safety risks posed by the animal or creature.
- We provide suitable housing for the animal or creature and ensure this is cleaned out regularly and is kept safely.
- We ensure the correct food is offered, at the right times.
- We make arrangements for weekend and holiday care for the animal or creature.
- Children are taught correct handling and care of the animal or creature and are supervised.
- Children wash their hands after handling the animal or creature and do not have contact with animal soil or soiled bedding.
- Staff wear disposable gloves when cleaning housing or handling soiled bedding.
- If animals or creatures are brought in by visitors to show the children, they are the responsibility of their owner.
- The owner carries out a risk assessment, detailing how the animal or creature is to be handled and how any safety or hygiene issues will be addressed.

The school has its own farm

- Before a visit to the school farm, a review of the risk assessment is carried out. The school farm has completed a series of specific risk assessments.
- Children wash their hands after contact with animals.
- Outdoor footwear worn to visit farms is cleaned of mud and debris and should not be worn indoors.

### Emergency Contact

Parents may escort their children in to the EYFS classes in the morning and discuss any issues with staff before the start of the school day. The end of day collection time is another point of personal contact where parents and staff may share any issues arising from the day.

In Reception the school planner should be used as an informal method of communication for all EYFS children. Staff will communicate class information to parents each week and record daily information as necessary.

If parents need to contact staff during the school day they should telephone the main school number, the Nursery direct number or send a message on Family/Seesaw.

Parents must inform the school about any changes to collection arrangements and also sign out their children if they are collected for medical appointments.
