From the Superintendent's Desk...

The school year is off to another great start and the district is sincerely grateful for the investment and support of the entire community. As we move forward, the district will continue to explore new courses, new policies, and improved facilities as we strive to educationally prepare our students in the best possible learning environment.

Communication - As a district, we continue to seek ways to improve our communication. The district has developed a userfriendly website that is utilized on a regular basis to recognize the work of both our students and faculty. In addition, the website provides a venue for important announcements as well as information regarding upcoming events. The website provides access to important parent forms, employment opportunities, and



other important documents related to the district. As always, we will continue to explore new avenues of communication to provide information in the most efficient manner.

Capital Project - At this time last year, the community voted in support of the proposed capital project. The capital project will update and improve many of the district's campus features. Parking areas as well as sidewalks will be reconstructed and reconfigured to enhance safety and efficiency. Original metal roofs will be replaced. The elementary school will complete its renovation with new airflow units and remodeling/updating of the halls and classrooms. The entrance to the elementary building will also be redesigned to enhance the safety/security of students and staff. In addition, the outdoor track and tennis courts will be reconstructed to create a safe surface for students as well as the community. In the months ahead, the district will be working with the project management firm to finalize details within the budget approved by the community.

Evacuation Drill Reminder – On Thursday, November 10th, we will execute our mandatory Evacuation Drill. All students, K-12 will be released at 2 PM. We will be using one (1) bus run in order to complete this drill. Please be aware that students will arrive home earlier than normal. Please make note of this so that you may arrange care for your children. Thank you in advance for your understanding and cooperation.

School Closing – With winter rapidly approaching, inclement weather is right around the corner. We will continue to use Blackboard Connect, local radio, and television to keep the public informed about closings and delays. Your patience on these days is also appreciated as we will continue to work closely with our local towns when making a closing/delay decision. The goal is to remain open as long as we feel we can safely transport students to school.

Dignity for All Students

The New York State Dignity for All Students Act became effective July 1, 2012. The goal of this Act is to create a safe and supportive school climate where students can learn and focus, rather than in fear of being discriminated against or harassed.

The District condemns and prohibits all forms of discrimination and harassment of students based on actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientations, gender, or sex by school employees or students on school property and at school-sponsored activities and events that take place at locations off school property. In addition, any act f discrimination or harassment, outside of school sponsored events, which can reasonably be expected to materially and substantially disrupt the education process, may be subject to discipline.

If you need to report an incident of bullying or harassment at WCV, please stop and see a counselor or Deputy Lawson. Anonymous reporting forms are available in the Guidance Office.

Automated Attendance Calls Beginning this Month

On November 14th, WCV is going to begin automating our daily attendance calls. This means that if your child is absent from school, you will receive an automated telephone call in the morning alerting you.

These calls will use the same alert system that we use for school closings and will come from the same telephone number. In order to receive the calls, we must have your current telephone number.

WINTER WEATHER BUS SCHEDULE REMINDER

On bad weather days and we still have school; the buses may leave the garage a little earlier to get to their routes. The students that are the first on the bus should be ready 5 to 10 minutes earlier. The students at the end of the run may see their bus arrive 5 to 10 minutes late. This will all vary due to road conditions. Please try to help the bus drivers out on those bad weather days by being patient and understanding.

THINGS PARENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

- School buses are the safest form of highway transportation.
- The most dangerous part of the school bus ride is getting on and off the bus.
- Pedestrian fatalities (while loading and unloading school buses) account for approximately three times as many school bus-related fatalities, when compared to school bus occupant fatalities.
- The loading and unloading area is called the "Danger Zone".
- The "Danger Zone" is the area on all sides of the bus where children are in the most danger of not being seen by the driver (ten feet in front of the bus where the driver may be too high to see a child, ten feet on either side of the bus where a child may be in the driver's blind spot, and the area behind the bus).
- Half of the pedestrian fatalities in school bus-related accidents are children between 5 and 7 years old.
 Young children are most likely to be struck because they:
 - Hurry to get on and off the bus
 - Act before they think and have little experience with traffic
 - Assume motorists will see them and will wait for them to cross the road
 - Don't always stay within the bus driver's sight

THINGS STUDENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

- The bus driver and others cannot see you if you are standing closer than 10 feet to the bus. Stay out of the danger zone.
- If something falls under or near the bus, tell the driver. Never try to pick it up yourself!
- While waiting for the bus, stay in a safe place away from the road.
- When you get on or off the bus, look for the bus safety lights and make sure they are flashing.
- Be alert to traffic. When you get on or off the bus, look left, right, left before you exit the bus and before you enter or cross the road.
- When the driver says it is safe to cross the road, remember to cross in front of the bus.
- Stay in your seat and sit quietly so that the driver is not distracted.
- Our school buses have seat belts. We urge you to use them. Learn to use them correctly.

Science in Ancient Egypt?

This month the 6th graders have been studying Ancient Egypt in Mrs. Wiatr's Social Studies class. Along with their study of the Nile River and the geography of Egypt they visited the IMAX theater at the Museum of Science and Technology in Syracuse to see "Mysteries of the Nile".


During class they talked about mummies and the mummification process. Using the scientific method that was taught in class, the students enjoyed the science experiment "The Mummy of all Science Experiments" which demonstrates the drying out process used by the ancient Egyptians.

The 6th graders also participated in a social studies distance learning program with the Milwaukee Public Museum featuring Egyptian Mummies.

STEM Challenges

Mrs. Ludwig's 5th graders experiment with a STEM based challenge. STEM (Science, Technogy, Engineering & Mathematics) education is active and focuses on a student-centered learning environment. Students engage in questioning, problem solving, collaboration, and hands-on activities while they address real life issues.

In this particular challenge, students were given 6 cups, 4 pieces of string and a rubber band. Their task was to get the cups into an assigned position without utilizing their hands; they were able to accomplish this by communicating and working collaboratively with all group members. Upon completing the challenge, they had to write a reflection on how they felt their group did with the activity & express their group's strengths and areas needing improvement. It's amazing to watch the groups realize that working as a team is a must for STEM success!
