# From the Superintendent's Desk...

As we move past the mid-point to this school year, it is certainly amazing how mild winter has been thus far. However, we are all aware that February and March will determine the final evaluation of the winter season. With that said, winter has shown its presence on a couple of occasions resulting in school being closed for the day. It is our hope that this information is being communicated in an efficient manner. As always, if you have any questions/concerns regarding closings and weather delays, do not hesitate to contact the district office.

Building Project – Oh behalf of the district, I would like to thank members of the community for their support of the proposed capital project. Since the positive vote in November, design groups continue to meet with the architect and/or the construction manager as we progress toward a final design. At this point, we have made a great deal of progress in each phase of the project. Updates on this process are a regular item at our monthly board of

education meetings as we work toward submitting our plans to the New York State Education Department for approval. The district will continue to provide updates as the project develops.

Budget time – The district has begun the process of building our budget for the 2016-2017 school year. The governor's proposed budget has provided West Canada Valley with a slight increase in operating aid over last year. At the same time, we anticipate much discussion in Albany over the next few months as they work to pass the state budget. With much of our revenue dependent on state aid, the district will watch closely as these discussions progress. As always, we will work diligently to provide a program that is high quality for our students and responsible to the taxpayers. We look forward to your support throughout this process.

State Assessments- So much discussion has occurred regarding state testing and teacher evaluation over the past few years. I am certainly pleased to hear our new state leadership has taken a step back to assess our curriculum/assessment practices while at the moment delaying their use for instructional evaluation. This is certainly an important first step in the process. While state assessments provide teachers, students, and parents/guardians with academic information, they are but one of several measures by which we determine if a student is making academic progress. I hope as we move forward these measures will be used to fulfill their intended purpose- to improve student learning.

Student/Staff Achievement - Congratulation to our entire educational community as recently released graduation data continues to place West Canada Valley CSD as one of the top schools in terms of graduation rates across the state. Our three-year cohort rate of 96% as well as our previous year rate of 99% is a strong indicator of the commitment to high academic standards in this district. I certainly look forward to working with the entire educational community as we build academic programs toward the future.

WCV Technology- As I mentioned in the previous newsletter, the district has redesigned our website with the intention of making it a valuable resource. The district is continually updating important information including the events calendar. In addition, the website provides members of the community with an opportunity to see what we are doing in the classroom and recognize both school-wide and individual student achievements.

Again, thank you for the continued support and we look forward to seeing you at the many events scheduled during the second half of the school year. If you ever have any questions/concerns, do not hesitate to contact me in the district office.

# From the Health Office

If your child has any of the following symptoms, please keep him/her home, or make appropriate child care arrangements. It will be necessary to pick your child up from school as soon as possible if he/she shows any of the following symptoms at school.

#### • Feve

Temperature of 100 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. Child must not have a fever for 24 hours without fever reducing medication before returning to school.

#### Vomiting

Child should not return to school for 24 hours following the last episode of vomiting

#### · Lice, Scabies

Children may not return to school until they have been treated and are free of live lice. Children with scabies can be admitted after treatment.

#### Diarrhea

Children with watery stools may not return to school until 24 hours after their last episode of diarrhea.

#### Chronic cough and/or runny nose

Continual coughing and greenish nose discharge. Conditions may be contagious and may require treatment from your health care provider.

#### Sore Throat

With fever or swollen glands in the neck.

#### Rash

Any rash, especially with fever or itching

#### Ear infection

Without fever can attend school, but the child may need medical treatment and follow-up. Untreated ear infections can cause permanent hearing loss.

#### Eye Infection

Pink eye (conjunctivitis) or thick mucus or pus draining from eye should not return to school for 24 hours after starting treatment

#### Unusual appearance behavior

Abnormally tired, pale, difficult to wake, confused or irritable. This is sufficient reason to exclude a child from school.

#### · Cough:

Children with a persistent cough who are sent to the health office, may be sent home and can return when able to resume class.

Please have current phone numbers and a current emergency contact on file with the office. We need more than one phone number to be able to call in case of emergency. Please do not have emergency contacts that live out of state listed. An emergency contact should be within 30 minutes of the school.

- The Mom and Dad that make sure their children are on time for the bus so that the bus does not have to wait in traffic.

# Three Board of Education Seats Open

Petitions are available in the District Office for candidates interested in running for a seat on the School Board. Qualified district residents will be electing three (3) members to the Board of Education on May 17th of this year as Mrs. Robin Louis, Mrs. Karen Murphy and Mrs. Shawn Schultz's terms expire on June 30, 2016.

To qualify for membership on a school board an individual:


- Must be able to read and write
- Must be a qualified voter of the district; that is, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age or older, and not adjudged to be an incompetent
- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election.
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family
- May not be a current employee of the school board
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office

Candidate's petitions must be returned to the District Clerk's office no later than 5:00 pm on April 18, 2016 and must contain a minimum of 25 qualified voters' signatures.



# **Newport Historical Society Supports Research Project**

Also, Ski Club is holding half court shooting contests at all varsity home games; proceeds will benefit the Club's scholarship fund. Think snow!




# In Spring 2016, WCV Presents I Never Saw Another Butterfly.

The West Canada Valley Drama Club will present I Never Saw Another Butterfly, a play by Celeste Raspanti on April 1st and 2nd in the West Canada Valley High School Auditorium. This memory-play is narrated by Raja Englanderova (Sarah Esty), who represents one of over 15,000 Jewish children who passed through the Terezin ghetto from 1942 to 1945. Throughout the play, she recalls life in the ghetto with her parents (Samuel Straney and Shayla Clark) and her brother, Pavel (Parker Esty). She also remembers her teacher, Irena Synkova (Jackie Bender), who struggles to keep educating and inspiring the children of Terezin, despite the fear and horrendous conditions they are living under. Throughout the play, Raja is able to connect with many of the children of Terezin (Adia Clarke, Khushalia Gondalia, Caeli Campbell, Baily Jackson), and develops a special friendship with Honza (Kurt Florian).

This one act play is based on a book by the same title which is a collection of poems, diaries, letters, journals, drawings and pictures created by the actual children of Terezin. When Terezin was liberated in May of 1945, only about 100 of these children were left to return to their lives. In addition to poems and pictures created by the children of Terezin, the play will feature Czech and Hebrew folk songs and music of the time period.

I Never Saw Another Butterfly is being performed by Drama Club in honor of Helen Sperling, a Holocaust survivor. Students at WCV were fortunate to be able to hear Mrs. Sperling share her experiences last November. The performance will begin at

# High School Artwork on Display


A Pen & Ink Drawing by Junior Morgan Brennan won a Scholastic Gold Key Award, the highest award. The Scholastic Art Awards are a national competition for junior and senior high school students. Morgan competed in the Central New York division. The 13-county region saw a record-breaking 6,400 pieces submitted this year. 1,587 pieces won awards. Awards range from Gold keys - first place, Silver keys - second place, to Honorable mentions. The winning pieces are on exhibit at Onondaga Community College's Whitney Applied Technology Center, in Syracuse, through February 26th. Gold Key winners go on to compete at the national level. National results are announced in the spring.

Drawings by Sophomores Stephen Morreale and Isaiah Farrell are on exhibit in the 26th Annual Legislative Student Art Exhibition. The exhibit is in the "Well" entrance of the Legislative Office Building in Albany. This exhibit features outstanding K-12 artwork and is open to the public. A reception for the artists and their families will be held on March 3rd. WCV high school artists will also be participating in 3 other exhibitions in the month of March.
