Board Chair Ritcheson officially called to order the Annual Budget Meeting for Regional School Unit No. 5 at 6:35 PM.

Pledge of Allegiance

ARTICLE 1A: To elect a moderator to preside at the meeting.

Board Chair Ritcheson nominated Mr. Gregory Im as Moderator. Board member Beth Munsen seconded this nomination. No further nominations occurred, and Mr. Im was elected by unanimous vote. Superintendent Skorapa swore in Mr. Im.

Mr. Im welcomed everyone and explained the following:

- All ballot clerks were previously sworn in.
- The Maine Moderators Manual will be used as a procedural guideline.
- Mr. Im asked to allow the administrators in RSU5 who live outside Durham, Freeport or Pownal be allowed to speak at this meeting.
- Must be a registered voter to vote. Check in with the ballot clerk.
- Warrant articles will be gone through as printed.
- Speakers must come to the microphone for discussion, state their names and town of residence.
- You can make a motion to call for a vote. Requires $\frac{2}{3}$ majority vote.
- The Recording Secretary is Cynthia Alexander.

ARTICLE 12: To see what sum the Regional School Unit will appropriate for the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and to see what sum the Regional School Unit will raise and assess as each municipality's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15688.

Explanation: The Regional School Unit's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act is the amount of money determined by state law to be the minimum amount that the Regional School Unit must raise and assess in order to receive the full amount of state dollars. [Note: The above appropriations are determined in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15688(1); the amounts to be raised reflect the required local contribution in accordance with the RSU Reorganization Plan.]

ARTICLE 13: To see what sum the Regional School Unit will raise and appropriate for the annual payments on debt service previously approved by the Regional School Unit voters for non-state-funded school construction projects or non-state-funded portions of school construction projects in addition to the funds appropriated as the local share of the Regional School Unit's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12.

School Board Recommends \$121,247.63

Explanation: Non-state-funded debt service is the amount of money needed for the annual payments on the Regional School Unit's long-term debt for major capital school construction projects that are not approved for state subsidy. The bonding of this long-term debt was previously approved by the Regional School Unit voters.

ARTICLE 14: (Written ballot required.) To see what sum the Regional School Unit will raise and appropriate in additional local funds (**Recommend \$12,965,830.54**), which

exceeds the State's Essential Programs and Services allocation model by **(Recommend \$13,087,234.53)** as required to fund the budget recommended by the School Board.

The School Board Recommends \$12,965,830.54, which exceeds the State's Essential Programs and Services allocation model by \$13,087,234.53. The School Board gives the following reasons for exceeding the State's Essential Programs and Services funding model: The State's Essential Program and Services funding formula is a minimum model to support education in grades preK-12. RSU No. 5 provides additional funds to support lower student/teacher ratios and additional co-curricular activities in addition to complete educational programs for all our students.

Explanation: The additional local funds are those locally raised funds over and above the Regional School Unit's local contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and local amounts raised for the annual payment on non-state funded debt service that will help achieve the Regional School Unit budget for educational programs.
[Note: The additional local funds reflect the adjustment to the required local contribution in Article 12 in accordance with the RSU Reorganization Plan.]

ARTICLE 15 SUMMARIZES THE PROPOSED SCHOOL BUDGET

ARTICLE 15: To see what sum the Regional School Unit will authorize the School Board to expend for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2025 from the Regional School Unit's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from pre-kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act, local funds for non-state-funded school construction debt services, additional local funds for school purposes under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15690, unexpended balances, tuition receipts, state subsidy, and other receipts for the support of schools.

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Regional School Unit will appropriate **\$220,276** for adult education and raise **\$112,000** as the local share, with authorization to expend any additional, incidental, or miscellaneous receipts in the interest and for the well-being of the adult education program.

ARTICLES 17 THROUGH 21 ESTABLISH, AUTHORIZE TRANSFERS TO AND EXPENDITURES FROM CERTAIN RESERVE FUNDS

ARTICLE 17: Shall the School Board be authorized to (i) establish a Regular Instruction reserve fund to pay unanticipated regular instruction costs; (ii) transfer **\$190,000** from available fund balances to the Regular Instruction reserve fund; and (iii) expend from the Regular Instruction reserve funds as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

ARTICLE 18: Shall the School Board be authorized to (i) establish a Special Education reserve fund to pay unanticipated special education costs; (ii) transfer **\$450,000** from available fund balances to the Special Education reserve fund; and (iii) expend from the Special Education reserve funds as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

ARTICLE 19: Shall the School Board be authorized to (i) establish a Student & Staff Support reserve fund to pay unanticipated student & staff support costs; (ii) transfer **\$47,500** from available fund balances to the Student & Staff Support reserve fund; and (iii) expend from the Student & Staff Support reserve funds as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

ARTICLE 20: Shall the School Board be authorized to (i) establish a System Administration reserve fund to pay unanticipated system administration costs; (ii) transfer

\$37,000 from available fund balances to the System Administration reserve fund; and (iii) expend from the System Administration reserve funds as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

Moved and seconded by Ritcheson and Munsen
Hand Vote - Yes, Article 20 passes as written.

ARTICLE 21: Shall the School Board be authorized to (i) establish a Transportation Support reserve fund to pay unanticipated transportation costs; (ii) transfer **\$60,000** from available fund balances to the Transportation reserve fund; and (iii) expend from the Transportation reserve funds as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

Hand Vote - Yes, Article 21 passes as written.

ARTICLE 22 AUTHORIZES TRANSFER TO AND EXPENDITURES FROM THE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

ARTICLE 22: Shall the School Board be authorized to transfer up to **\$475,000** from available fund balances to the Capital Reserve Fund and to expend up to \$975,175 from the capital reserve funds as needed at the discretion of the School Board?

ARTICLE 23 AUTHORIZES TRANSFER OF FUNDS TO THE TRACK AND FIELD CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

ARTICLE 23: Shall the School Board be authorized to transfer up to **\$35,000** from available fund balances to the Track and Field Capital Reserve Fund; and to expend said reserve funds as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

Moved and seconded by Ritcheson and Munsen
Hand Vote - Yes, Article 23 passes as written.

ARTICLE 24 AUTHORIZES TRANSFER OF FUNDS TO THE TENNIS COURT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND

ARTICLE 24: Shall the School Board be authorized to transfer up to **\$40,000** from available fund balances to the Tennis Court Capital Reserve Fund; and to expend said reserve funds as needed in the discretion of the School Board?

ARTICLE 25 AUTHORIZES THE CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION BUDGET

ARTICLE 25: Shall the regional career and technical education operating budget as approved by the cooperative board for the year beginning July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025 be approved in the amount of **\$4,046,346**?

ARTICLE 26 AUTHORIZES THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS TO EXISTING CAPITAL RESERVE FUND AND EXPENDITURE OF CAPITAL RESERVE FUNDS FOR POTENTIAL COST OVERRUNS ON THE CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION BRIDGE PROJECT

ARTICLE 26: Shall Maine Region 10 Technical High School (“Region 10”) authorize the Cooperative Board to transfer up to **\$100,000** from undesignated fund balances to the Region 10 Capital Reserve Fund and delegate authority to the Cooperative Board to expend up to \$100,000 of the balances accumulated in that Fund to cover any excess or unanticipated costs related to a capital project required to remove and replace the bridge structure at the exterior of the Region 10 school building?

Moved and seconded by Ritcheson and Munsen
Hand Vote - Yes, Article 26 passes as written.

ARTICLE 27 AUTHORIZES EXPENDITURE OF CAPITAL RESERVE FUNDS FOR OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS OR EQUIPMENT FOR CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

ARTICLE 27: Shall Maine Region 10 Technical High School (“Region 10”) delegate authority to the Cooperative Board to expend additional balances accumulated in the Region 10 Capital Reserve Fund from time-to-time on such specific items or types of capital improvements or equipment as the Cooperative Board determines to be needed by Region 10?

Moved and seconded by Ritcheson and Munsen
Hand Vote - Yes, Article 27 passes as written.

ARTICLE 28 AUTHORIZES EXPENDITURES OF GRANTS AND OTHER RECEIPTS

ARTICLE 28: In addition to amounts approved in the preceding articles, shall the School Board be authorized to expend such other sums as may be received from federal or state grants or programs or other sources during the fiscal year for school and other program purposes, provided that such grants, programs or other sources do not require the expenditure of other funds not previously appropriated?



ARTICLE 29: Shall the School Board be authorized to transfer amounts exceeding 5% of the total appropriation for any cost center to another cost center or among other cost centers for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, provided that transfers shall not be permitted to increase the authorized total school budget?
