
Four years ago we entered Overlake High as bewildered freshmen and now we leave as triumphant seniors. Looking back over our many achievements we find that:




GIRLS' CLUB TOLO



The next week was a bye filled in with a game with Tahoma, a 22-18 victory for Overlake.




WOLVERINE CUBS

GIRLS' SPORTS


Under the direction of Mrs. Weider, P.E. teacher new to the school this year, girls' sports were well represented by all enthusiastic girl athletes of O.H.S.

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
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
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
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
