LETTER FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Community Members,

It is hard to believe we are already in the midst of winter! The fall parent-teacher conferences are being held next week and there is much to be thankful for. I have made many site visits to our schools and departments across the district since the start of school. It is always inspiring to see the learning that takes place in our classrooms!

In the fall of 2017, Cheney Public Schools began the Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) journey. According to PLC expert Dr. Janel Keating, one of the main concepts of PLC work is to have a team of people working together to improve adult learning so that students can learn more. Dr. Richard DuFour, was known as a leading authority in implementing PLC work in school districts across the nation, states, "The key to improved student learning is to ensure more good teaching in more classrooms more of the time."

As you are aware, the late start on Fridays creates time for our staff to collaborate in the PLC process. PLCs focus on four questions: 1) What do we expect all students to learn? (Priority standards); 2) How will we know if they learn it? (Assessment); 3) How will we respond if students do not learn? (Intervention); and 4) How will we extend the learning for students who are already proficient? (Extension). While simple in concept, diving deep into each question takes a team effort to best support every student ensuring access to grade-level standards, reteaching or extension if needed, and intensive support for foundational skills.

At a recent visit to Cheney Middle School on a

Friday late start, the English Language Arts (ELA) PLC had grades 6-8 discussing the percentage of students going to intervention per week. The lead teacher shared that in their discussions as a PLC, too many students were going to intervention, and that it was more of a whole group reteaching than a specific strategy. As a team, they decided to allow more time between the lessons (question 1) and assessing how the students did on the lesson (question 2). In doing so, the 6th grade ELA team found the percentage of students needing intervention was reduced from 40-50% to 15-18%. By doing so, intervention has been more focused for students that need additional exposure while offering extension opportunities for students that would have previously been in intervention.

While there is always room for improvement, I was impressed with the intentionality and true care given to every student in the PLC example above. This is only one example of many that happen on Friday mornings across the district during late starts. Thank you for your support of the PLC work being done in our school district!

In the end, Dr. Keating has shown us, we need our teams working together to improve our practices so that students can learn more.

We are Cheney Public Schools!

This season has been momentous for the Cheney High Marching Band and Color Guard. Before the season even began the Band Booster Club purchased and donated to the school a semi-truck trailer for the Marching Band. The trailer has allowed the band to transport their equipment safely to band competitions, the new semi-trailer is a great addition to the band program.

While most students were still relaxing at home, waiting out the last few days of summer, band students and members of the color guard were out on Oswald Field practicing in the hot sun to prepare for the season. The countless hours of preparation on the field, and the countless hours parents and boosters spent procuring and remodeling the trailer set the stage for the season.

The band performed at games throughout the fall and excelled at the competitions they entered. At the October 1st Cavalcade of Bands in Kennewick, the band picked up 2nd

place overall as well as winning Overall Best Visual, Overall Best Color Guard, and Best General Effect among AAA schools. The band traveled again on October 15 to WSU for the Marching Band Championships, taking overall 2nd place, and Overall Best Visual; as well as 2nd place among AAAs and winning Best Visual among AAA schools. These two competitions only whetted the band's appetite for competition.

On October 21st the band set off for the Puget Sound Festival of Bands. Along the way, the stopped at Central Washington University to rehearse with the CWU music department and CWU's director of bands Dr. T. Andre Feagin. After that, it was on to Everett.



The Band and Color Guard had an incredible showing, bringing home Best Overall Visual, Best Overall General Effect, Best Drum Major, the People's Choice Award, and the First Place Overall Sweepstakes. Cheney Public Schools is beyond proud of our band and color guard, not only the students and staff this year but all of the staff, students, parents, and community members who have helped build this program into the competitive group it is today.

When the band's bus returned to Cheney they were greeted by an escort of Cheney Police and Fire Department vehicles who lead the buses through town with lights flashing.

Facilities Improvements Projects Completed and Serving Students

The Capital Levies passed in 2019 and 2021 are providing value for our students and community as projects funded by the levy are completed. Two of the big ticket items completed in 2022 with levy funds were the renewal of two sports facilities in the district.

The Tennis Courts at Salnave Elementary were refinished allowing for a better play surface by students and community members.

Hatch Gym at Cheney High School was also reconditioned. A new gym floor was installed, lighting replaced with high-efficiency LED fixtures, and new bleachers installed. The newly refurbished gym has been a great improvement for our high school gym classes and our athletic programs.

Lastly, updates to HVAC systems are ongoing, new fixtures at Three Springs and other locations have been installed.



Educational Programs and Operations Levy Dollars at Work

Since taking effect in January 2022 (passed February 2021) the EP&O Levy has allowed the district to continue providing services to our students at levels above the state-funded minimums.

The EP&O funds assist the district in funding smaller class sizes, athletics, and extracurricular activities, as well as support competitive pay for substitutes. The levy dollars also contribute to funding many educational support positions such as additional school nurses and psychologists, and importantly levy dollars help support more certificated teachers than state funding provides. We also have more custodial staff and paraeducators thanks in part to EP&O levy dollars.

We are grateful for the ongoing support of our community to provide excellent and well-rounded educational environments for our students.

Tier 3 Intervention Positively Impacts Students at Middle Schools

Entering its second year, the math and ELA intervention programs at CMS and WMS are positively impacting students who need Tier 3 support. Tier 3 support is individualized instruction to help students meet grade level standards.

An example of this kind of classroom is Mrs. Kayla Portrey's math intervention room at Westwood. Students whose scores on i-Ready Standardized tests that indicate a need for additional support are referred to the intervention classroom. Here students receive individualized support to help bring them up to grade-level standards.

Students in Mrs. Portrey's class report that the positive classroom environment helps them comfortable. Because individualized attention students are able to work from many places in the classroom, from comfortable chairs to desks. The combination of environment and assistance in progressing in math skills helps create a positive learning





experience for the students who have often struggled.

Mrs. Portrey recognizes students as they master math skills in the classroom as 'math masters.' During class on September 27 Sofia Minor, a 7th grader mastered base ten operations and was recognized by having her photo placed on the 'math master' wall. As students master skills they support one another by assisting other students to learn those same skills.

Students Mike Masumoto and Sarah Lavin spoke positively about the classroom culture collaborative support students. Mike Masumoto shared that he

enjoyed the opportunity "to get to work together," while Sarah Lavin shared that "this is my favorite class."

Several students shared their love for the class. Evidence shows that the classes are making an impact too. In ELA intervention classrooms students are making multiple worth of advancement months' comprehension skills each month. Math intervention is likewise seeing rapid progression by students.





Professional Development Day Builds SEL Capacity

The Professional Learning Day on October 14th was a great success! We appreciate all our staff who came ready to participate and learn!

The focus of this professional development day was Social-Emotional Learning. For secondary educators the day was spent on Panorama training. Full use of the Panorama student software will help teachers access data to focus intervention individualized needs of students. This works by pulling data from multiple systems and placing it in teachers' hands.

Elementary teachers focused on State SEL Standards and how their schools incorporating standards into their School Improvement Plan processes. PLC Teams unpacked the six standards and talked about what it would look like at each grade level.


Blackhawks Give Back


