LETTER FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Community Members,

Often times in education we are looking for the perfect program or to "experts" who have all of the answers related to school improvement, when in reality there isn't a single magic formula that can ensure high levels of student learning. Rather, it is my belief high levels of student achievement occur when we are committed to intentional collaboration, focus our efforts, and do not chase after "shiny objects". This is why we have focused our efforts on a single mission statement, and priorities that align with our mission.

The mission of Cheney Public Schools is to guarantee a safe and caring environment where all students learn at high levels and graduate with options for post-secondary education, careers, and civic engagement. In order to achieve our mission, we created a five-year strategic plan and are in the third year of carrying out that plan. The plan contains goals and action steps in the areas of academics, college and career readiness, social and emotional support, and community engagement. Based on research and proven results, we believe the best way to achieve our goals is through the implementation of Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) and we are fully committed to this work. PLCs are defined as a practice where the entire staff engages in an ongoing, collaborative process of collective inquiry and action research to achieve better results for their students. To guide this work, grade level and subject specific PLC teams continuously work through the following four questions:

- 1. What specifically do we expect all students to learn? (Standards)
- 2. How will we know when each student has learned? (Assessment)
- 3. How will we respond when students experience difficulty learning? (Intervention)
- 4. How will we respond when students demonstrate they have learned? (Extension)

Each day many students attend school having experienced a variety of circumstances that impact their ability to be learning ready. In conjunction with our PLC work, the district is committed to supporting the social and emotional learning (SEL) needs of each of our students. As part of our effort to do so, we hired an assistant director of teaching and learning with the specific assignment of leading and supporting social and emotional learning. Although there is a lot of exceptional SEL work occurring in schools throughout the district, our goal is to create a system-wide approach, while supporting the needs of our staff members at the same

In order to provide the best possible education system for ALL students it is important to have adequate learning spaces, a variety of educational programs, and up to date technology. We are very thankful to our community for supporting the recent bond and levy measures. With the community's support, additional classrooms and a variety of improvements at three of our elementary schools and Cheney High School have been made possible (2017 bond). In addition, the community approved a two-year capital levy in November that will allow the district to purchase property for future school sites, provide significant technology upgrades in each school, and update fleet vehicles in maintenance and operations. We are extremely thankful to our community for all of your outstanding support!

We are accomplishing great things in Cheney Public Schools and are deeply committed to ensuring high levels of achievement for each and every student. 
NEWS: Cheney teachers win big!
