It is difficult to believe the month of May has already arrived. Soon we will reach the end of another school year and will celebrate the graduation of the class of 2017. Our goal is that each and every child has a fantastic and learning-packed final six weeks of school!

Calendar Update: This winter there were four days when school was cancelled due to weather and road conditions. Our district requested, and received, a waiver from the state for one of the missed days. Therefore, we scheduled three make-up days—with the first one being held February 17, and the other two scheduled for June 15 and 16. Friday, June 16 will be the final day of the school year, with an 11:30 a.m. release time.

Capital Projects Update: To date, the district has selected a construction management firm (OAC Services) and an architect (ALSC Architects). In addition, we utilized the services of D.A. Davidson to sell bonds to finance our projects, and were able to secure a true interest cost of 3.22%. The goal of our project financing was to obtain the \$52,000,000 approved by voters while maintaining an overall school tax rate of \$5.42. As of the date of the bond sale, the overall 2018 school tax rate is projected to be \$5.40. Thus, the district has been able to acquire financing within the stated goals of the project proposal. Our next steps will now include identifying planning teams so that we can begin the specific design of each of our projects.

This past winter seemed extremely long, and thus far spring has been unusually cool and wet. We are all waiting for the weather to improve so we can get out and enjoy the outdoors with our family and friends. Recently, during one of my school visits, a kindergarten student stated, "After the rain comes rainbows." I am hopeful that my kindergarten friend is correct, and the rainbow is indeed just around the corner!

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
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CHS students received 2nd place in robotics competition
