
Only five of the 39 superintendents in Lakes Country Service Cooperative's service area are women. Megan Myers is one of those five women and has nearly completed her first year as the Parkers Prairie Public School Superintendent. She recalled her first day walking into the school. Myers said she felt excited to work towards improving the budget and leaving it better than how she found it.

Myers' upbringing as the daughter of a Special Education teacher instilled in her the importance of education from an early age.

She grew up in Park Rapids, Minnesota, where she completed her high school education before attending Cottey College, an all-girls school in Missouri. Later, she received her Bachelor's in Education from Bemidji State University, her Master's from Southwest Minnesota State, and attended Minnesota State University Moorhead's Principal and Superintendent Licensure program.

Before joining Parkers Prairie Public School, Myers worked as a teacher at New York Mills from the Fall of 2004 to the Spring of 2016. She then accepted the role of Principal at the Circle of Life Academy in White Earth, Minnesota, for two years. From there, she moved her family to the northeast community of Grand Marais and served as the K-12 Principal for five years at Cook County Public Schools. Cook County Public Schools has a similar student enrollment as Parkers Prairie Public Schools: however, Cook County Public Schools travel over the entire county to bring students to school, including the very remote Gunflint Trail. When the pandemic hit, Myers was asked to step in as Superintendent at Cook County Public Schools while the current Superintendent took a leave.

When asked about the challenges she faced while serving children in a large and remote service area, she mentioned that she had an excellent transportation and groundskeeping team that coordinated all the challenges that winter transportation could bring. According to her, this also helped the students to develop a sense of grit. Myers added that people living in Cook County live differently than those with easy access to resources in nearby towns. She shared that her family loved Grand Marais, but she wanted to return to this area to be closer to her family. Myers admitted that her first year in Parkers Prairie has been a steep learning curve, and she is thankful for her administrative team and great school board. Her immediate challenges were to reduce deficit spending and find a solution to manage the fund balance that was about to go below where their policy allowed. They are working to reduce the budget and ultimately will come out better than where they started. Unexpectedly, Myers also served as the elementary principal in Parkers Prairie while the existing Principal, Steve Radtke, was on leave. "It was an opportunity to develop a relationship with the elementary students and staff, " said Myers.



"I wasn't fully prepared for the quick decisions and long-term projects that come with being a superintendent, even with the support of our state's mentorship program for new superintendents. However, having Blaine Novak, the Superintendent of New York Mills, as my colleague has been crucial to my growth. Novak and I went from being co-teachers in New York Mills to him being my principal and, eventually, my superintendent. It's great to have that kind of shared history. When working in Grand Marais, Novak would call me monthly to catch up and see how I was doing. I've learned so much from him," said Myers.

"I have found Lakes Country Service Cooperative to be a valuable asset. I have attended several meetings for new superintendents at LCSC and the Great Starts program through MASA.

Additionally, I am a Runestone Area Education District member and have found the other superintendents in that group to be valuable members of my network. I also rely on the calendars published by the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE), which help tremendously

with meeting deadlines," said Myers.

Myers said that she has learned that the students are the best part of the job. She shared that the students are incredibly respectful towards their teachers and constantly show appreciation towards them, even awarding them monthly with recognition. No choir teachers were available this past year, so two retired teachers came in to help fill the role. They worked alongside the instrumental music teacher, Dale Plasek. The dedication of the former teachers touched the students, and they felt they wanted to show their appreciation. Myers is proud of the students and said, "They are phenomenal. They give their all in both academics and sports." Parkers Prairie Public School provides a range of group and individual activities that cater to the diverse interests of their students. Myers shared some activities she believes offer opportunities for all students to participate and feel included.

- The Parkers Prairie History Club has been active since 2012. History Teacher Mr. O'Brien came up with the idea to coordinate field trips and do some reading and research on state history during the summer, working with students as a volunteer. Students must apply to gain membership, with an emphasis on academics, interest in history, and staff recommendations. Over one hundred students participated.
- The Parkers Prairie first-grade students go to St. William's Living Center and spend time with the residents. They play BINGO, visit with the residents, make cards for the residents during the holidays, and hand deliver the cards.
- Parkers Prairie students have a crochet club, and Art Teacher Shannon Wicklund gives her time during lunch and Panther Time to help students learn how to crochet. Students sell their projects at school activities and sporting events.

- Several students competed in the State Speech meet.
- The 6th Grade Football Team had an excellent opportunity to play at US Bank Stadium on April 16 against Wadena-Deer Creek (WDC).
- The Anatomy students fundraised to go to California to visit BodyWorks and then explore the attractions of Yosemite.



- Several teams participated in the Elementary Math Masters competition in grades 4-6 hosted at LCSC.
- Parkers Prairie students are taking advantage of an exciting, free opportunity to pursue their commercial driver's license (CDL).
- Parkers Prairie High School senior David Revering received a Minnesota National Honor Award as one of the top scholar-athletes in the State!

"We are making sure that we have the college, the career, and the tech courses, but we also operate the community childcare center. We start developing children when they are six weeks old and continue helping them to learn through graduation. We have a crib-to-career mentality, a point of pride that we would like to see enhanced even more," said Myers. Myers is proud of the school's ability to provide childcare to the community. Parkers Prairie families are fortunate to have a wellrun childcare program based in the elementary school. The school cares for eight infants and 12 toddlers and has four preschool classrooms participating in the childcare program. They currently have an infant waiting list, and there are plans next year to provide four all-day, everyday preschool classes.

Myers challenges her staff to think outside the box, so they do not get caught up in doing what has always been done. She wants them to constantly consider how they can make it even better than it is right now. "I want to ensure that Parkers Prairie has a niche," said Myers. She added, "There are all these schools around us that have their niche in what they are doing. I want to find that niche here and bring it to fruition. There is an opportunity through the Youth Skills Training grant and a big need for trade workers, and we have a lot of interest from our student body. By refacing our Industrial Tech and Ag program, we can enhance that Career and Tech Ed piece at our school, which could be our niche."

When asked about her most enjoyable experience since becoming the new superintendent at Parkers Prairie School, Myers said, "The students bring me the most joy. The community has been very welcoming, and I'm excited to keep improving the school's approach to learning, supporting a crib-to-career educational model."



REFERENDUM 2024 RESULTS: COMMUNITY SUPPORTS CONTINUED INVESTMENT IN SCHOOL

On Tuesday, April 9, 2024, voters in the Ulen-Hitterdal School District considered a two-question special election addressing facility and learning environment improvements.

Following the vote, the unofficial election results are:

Question 1 (GO Bonds for Roofing): 211 YES (65%) and 116 NO (35%)

Question 2 (GO Bonds for Security and Facility Improvements):

182 YES (56%) and 141 NO (44%)

District Superintendent Dustin Flaten expressed his gratitude to the community for their support: "I extend my sincere appreciation to the entire community for taking the time to learn more about the needs of the district. The passing of these special election questions is an exciting vote of confidence in our collective vision for education at Ulen-Hitterdal School District."

Flaten continued, "This community investment will provide a new school roof that will promote a healthier environment for students and staff. By incorporating safety standards such as ADA accessibility and improved security systems, we are ensuring a secure environment for our students, staff, and the entire community. We are deeply thankful for this invaluable support."

In the coming weeks, the District will work with their project partner SitelogIQ to begin finalizing the details of the facility improvements. We will continue to communicate with our school community regarding these exciting developments.

Collaborate to Create Culvert Cleaning Tool

The Otter Tail County Highway Department's Ditch and Drainage Inspector, Colby Palmersheim, joined forces with the Fergus Falls Kennedy High School (KHS) welding class. Together, they launched Otter Tail County's Culvert Grapple Hook innovation, a winchpowered tool to clean out culverts. With a grant from the University of Minnesota Local Operational Research Assistance (OPERA) Program, the County was able to purchase a winch to power the hook. This collaborative effort has resulted in an innovative solution that saves time, enhances worker safety, and highlights the talent of local youth.

Palmersheim's idea addressed the challenge of clearing clogged culverts, particularly those located beyond the reach of conventional equipment. The challenge of welding inspired a partnership with Mr. Dennis Wutzke, the welding teacher at Kennedy High School, who enlisted the talents of Micaiah Abramson, a sophomore student, to bring the concept to life. Abramson enthusiastically accepted the challenge and began working on the mockup.

Abramson reviewed Palmersheim's handwritten mockup and used scrap pieces of metal from the KHS welding shop to weld the prototype. Once he was satisfied with the mockup, he began to create. Using advanced welding techniques, Abramson dedicated over 45 hours to meticulously crafting the Culvert Grapple Hook. The final product features a heavyduty post with retractable fins that can be connected to a winch-powered mechanism used to clear culverts of various sizes.

Reflecting on his experience, Abramson shared, "I had finished my project, and Mr. Wutzke asked if I would like to make a culvert cleaner tool for the County. I had to make a few adjustments, add to the post, and weld two hooks at the top of the design that weren't included in the original design. It was a fun project."

Palmersheim and Abramson recently tested the hook in a mock demonstration. Branches were stuffed into two different-sized culverts, and the hook was connected to the winch on a pickup truck. The hook pulled all the tightly packed branches out of the larger culvert. Before it is used this spring, a few minor adjustments will be made for smaller culverts. Overall, the Culvert Grapple Hook was a success.

"Working with the high school shows the talent that will be in the workforce soon, shows students what types of positions are offered in County employment, and what types of problems county workers solve every day," remarked Inspector Palmersheim. "This project highlights our ability to tackle challenges, thanks to the ingenuity and dedication of our local talent."

Congratulations to the Knowledge Bowl teams from Region 4 who competed at the State Meet: Ashby, Hancock, Park Christian, Perham, and Moorhead. They all did great facing some tough competition! Ashby took the 13th spot in the A division, closely followed by Hancock in 14th place. Park Christian impressed with a 4th place finish in the AA division, while Perham secured 12th place. The Raising a Reader Early Literacy Program from the Lakes Country Service Cooperative (LCSC) Brandon-Evansville Pilot was chosen as a winner of the MNAFEE Innovative Programming Award for 2024. Based on a national model, the program involves reading take-home book bags and school-based parent-child activities.



Raising A Reader takes a family, school, and community collaborative approach, involving children starting at birth and continuing through second grade. The official launch was in the fall of 2021, with a trial run involving a few home—and center-based childcare centers in the summer of 2021.

Currently, there are 165 students involved; factoring in other family members, it's estimated that the program impacts approximately 735 people, more than half of the local population of roughly 1,300.

The research clearly shows that strong, engaged families significantly impact children's educational and life outcomes. When families read together, they share more than stories.

Reading together strengthens bonds between children and the caring adults in their lives.

BRINGING TECHNOLOGY TO THE LITTLEST OTTERS

544 FOUNDATION AWARDED GRANT TO OTTER PRESCHOOL

Lincoln School houses a number of programs: ECFE, School-Readiness-Otter Preschool and the United Way/ECFE Child Care Visitor Program. All of these programs are designed to support the development of children from birth to five years of age. Sarah Velde, ISD 544 Early Childhood Education Interim Coordinator, stated that, "A key component to ECFE programs is School Readiness-Otter Preschool. This component is aimed at ensuring that children enter formal schooling equipped with the necessary skills, confidence, and readiness to succeed academically and socially."

Thanks to a \$9,827.86 grant awarded by the 544 Education Foundation, Lincoln School now has three interactive panels in Otter Preschool classrooms to aid in curriculum and development programs.

Velde said, "With the acquisition of a new curriculum this year at Lincoln School, and several of its components having the ability to use technology, our request revolved around the increased need for interactive panels in our classrooms."

The new curriculum has an online component that will now be accessible to the teachers and students. Velde said that the panels will help the teaching staff use the curriculum to its full potential.

According to the Department of Education, "Early learners can use technology to explore new worlds, make believe, and actively engage in fun and challenging activities. They can learn about technology and technology tools, and use them to play, solve problems and role play."

With the grant, Otter Preschool educators have the ability to use more technology in the classrooms to provide age-appropriate enrichment material and further the development of the youngest Otters, Velde explained.


The interactive panels are not going to replace the superior preschool teaching experience that has always been a staple in the district. Velde said, "Incorporating technology into our

Otter Preschool programs offers many benefits, but it's essential to do so thoughtfully and purposefully." She goes on, "We want to use technology as a tool to enhance learning experiences rather than replace traditional handson, interactive experiences. It's important to ensure that the technology we use is appropriate for the children's development and accessible to everyone involved in our program."

Every year, the 544 Foundation approves thousands in grants to different departments and schools. At an October 2023 meeting, over \$38,000 was awarded throughout the district.



According to Velde, the interactive panels were initially a complement to the new curriculum, but they have also been versatile tools in the classroom. "Teachers have discovered a wide range of uses, from utilizing them as interactive whiteboards to aking virtual field trips, enriching music experiences and incorporating STEAM activities," she said. "We are incredibly thankful to the 544 Education Foundation and their generous donors' continued commitment to the students of Fergus Falls."
