

Superintendent's Message

It is with sincere appreciation that you reserve just a few moments to read this detailed District Newsletter which highlights the proposed 2024-2025 Budget. There is valuable information included for your review as you prepare to cast your vote on May 21, 2024 when our annual Budget Vote takes place at John F. Kennedy High School.

This year, we have continued to enhance and implement what we refer to as our **Positivity Push Plans** in all schools. We found them to be so successful in the 2022-2023 school year that we worked hard to further develop individualized building plans for this school year. Our goal continues to be focused on increasing student engagement through the incorporation of school-wide activities that concentrate on celebrating school spirit and pride, building positive relationships, and maintaining a safe, caring and respectful school environment. We hope that you were able to attend one or more of your child's school events this year, such as our Theodore Roosevelt (TR) and Woodrow Wilson (WW) Family Fall Fest, our Evening of the Arts recently held at John F. Kennedy Middle School (JFK MS), and our incredible musical production of The Sound of Music at John F. Kennedy High School (JFK HS). These are just a few examples of events that join everyone together to share positive moments, to develop relationships, and to celebrate the talents of our students.

We are all looking forward to the musical gifts that our students will be sharing with all of us at our upcoming band and choral concerts, our drama productions at TR and WW, our JFK Drama One Act Play, and our Spring Fest at JFK MS. It was a true privilege and honor to have played the flute with our talented music teachers, Mrs. Fitzner and Mr. Prutsman, during the spring concert on April 30th at Theodore Roosevelt. Music education is such an important component of a child's educational experience and it strongly contributes to our philosophy of the importance of Educating the Whole Child. Our excitement is growing for all of our end of the year celebrations such as our field days, field trips, Flag Day ceremonies, our Junior & Senior prom, our Senior Class Day, our most special Class of 2024 Cap & Gown parade through all school buildings, and finally our Class of 2024 Commencement Ceremony. We look forward to sharing these significant and memorable events with our students and families and sincerely hope you are able to join us for these notable occasions.



Something that we are most proud of in our District is *Restorative Practices* and it seemed like the perfect time to share an update

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on our progress with our community. The Cheektowaga-Sloan UFSD is currently in its fifth year of implementing *Restorative Practices*. Over the years, our partnership with the Erie County Restorative Justice Coalition



(ECRJC) has provided our District with professional learning, training, consultation work, and support. During the first three years of our partnership, the ECRJC helped our faculty and staff understand the components of Restorative Practice. Their direct support through modeling and training helped build the confidence of the faculty and staff with this work. Throughout the last two years, our collaboration has focused on our Building-Level Restorative Practice teams taking full ownership of this initiative. Each school now has Restorative Practice Liaisons who work directly with our Assistant Superintendent, Mrs. Janelle Finn, and the ECRJC to implement individualized professional learning plans. The Restorative Practice Liaisons and Mrs. Finn meet with the ECRJC eight times a year for guidance and support. The ECRJC helps us monitor the implementation of our strategic plan, and they are there to provide us with support and guidance with whatever is needed.

2023-2024 has been a tremendous year for the Restorative Practice Liaisons, who are really taking ownership of their individualized plans in each of our schools. Currently, they are planning community events for their school buildings that include Restorative Circles. This year, the ECRJC collaborated with the Restorative Practice Liaisons to train students in grades 3-12 to be leaders with Restorative Circles. There is nothing more important to us than observing our own Cheektowaga-Sloan Students take on leadership roles and flourish into dynamic student leaders in our school environments. This year's final goal is to formally

build Restorative Practice into our discipline procedures at each building. We believe that repairing harm and helping students recognize and understand how a situation could have been handled differently is critically important so that learning takes place and better decisions are made moving forward.

We are extremely honored to share that the ECRJC has encouraged us here in the Cheektowaga-Sloan School District to share our success with other school districts not only here in Erie County but throughout the State. On December 11, 2023, Mrs. Finn and the Executive Director of the ECRJC were featured on the *What's Next, Buffalo?* Podcast. A link to the podcast can be found under the Headlines section of our District website. We encourage you to take a few moments to view this Podcast if you haven't already done so. We are so proud of this accomplishment and look forward to mentoring other school districts in the future. We have received numerous calls and requests for us to help other districts and even businesses learn our process for effective implementation. The airing of the Podcast also led to an in-depth interview with the *Buffalo News* which also included classroom visits to see Restorative Practices in action.

I have included some photographs that represent the leadership work that is taking place as well as the important element of parental involvement that contributes to the success of

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We want to share how proud we are of our proven record of commitment to our taxpayers and we pledge to you that we will continue to add to this established record. We have fought and have continued to fight for what we believe in and what we feel the Cheektowaga-Sloan Community fairly deserves. For the past twelve years, we have continued to make thoughtful and precise reductions when we can and where we are able to without losing quality programming and staffing for our PreK-12 students. It is our sincere hope that our community continues to recognize that it is through our systematic saving actions that we have been able to remain below the tax cap since 2013 with an average of only a 0.40% increase in the tax levy over the last twelve years. We are exceptionally proud of this record and are inspired and determined to sustain this reputation for many years to come. We are once again asking for the support of our taxpayers on May 21, 2024.

What will be asking for from our taxpayers?

We will be asking for a 0.97% increase in school taxes which is below the District's Tax Cap of 1.86%.

How much will my taxes increase as a result of a 0.97% increase?

As we have done each year, we have taken a sample of homes from within our District to determine the estimated increase in annual taxes on the average home. The average increase for an average home will be approximately **\$23.87**. Please remember that this is the **total increase for the entire year**.

Each year as we plan, prepare and bring forward the proposed budget to our community, it is important for us to express to our taxpayers that we are extremely reflective and vigilant of the impact that any increase, even if very small, has on our community especially in today's society where we are living through a very steep inflation rate. We continue to take pride in our record of a 0.40% increase in taxes over the last twelve years which we believe cannot be found in any other school districts in Western New York. As you have seen in recent weeks, many surrounding school districts are in the unfortunate position where they have to make significant cuts resulting in numerous staff layoffs. This **will not** be happening in the Cheektowaga-Sloan School District which we believe is a direct result of the meticulous and thoughtful planning that we do each day to ensure that we are in solid financial standing from year to year and into the future. We have and will continue to always prioritize the wide-ranging accountability of fighting to keep our tax levy as low as possible.

We encourage you to attend our Public Hearing on May 14, 2024 at 7:00 p.m. in the Theodore Roosevelt Cafetorium. We also hope you exercise your right to vote on May 21, 2024 at our District Budget Vote which will take place in the gymnasium at JFK HS from 12:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. Throughout the evening on May 21st, we are excited to offer our students, families and community an evening of enjoyment. We hope that you will take advantage of our hot dog dinner that you can buy for just **one dollar** (hot dog, chips, drink) and enjoy with your friends and family in our JFK Cafeteria. We will once again have a delicious sundae bar free of charge for all to enjoy! This same evening, our students will be engaged in musical performances in the JFK Auditorium and their exquisite artwork will be on display in the gymnasium. We hope that you are able to join us on this special evening and we look forward to seeing you very soon.

Thank you for your time in reading this detailed article and the entire newsletter which we hope has provided you with images of what we are most proud of in our District especially the accomplishments of our students PreK-12. We are unbelievably proud of our students, we are beyond grateful for our relationships with the parents and community, and we thank you so very much for extending your trust in us as we work with your children each day. Our students are the reason that we are all here and they provide us with the inspiration each day *to welcome*, *adore*, *educate and support each and every one of them*.

Woodrow Wilson Elementary - Growing Together

Woodrow Wilson students had an opportunity to become Restorative Practice leaders in their classrooms. We are proud to say that we have 13 student restorative leaders who have completed their training and are putting the practice to work in their classrooms. We have already had students leading restorative conversations on the conflict yoga mats, and using affective language to help create calm conversations. You can even hear students creating their own community circles at their lunch tables. Way to go Woodrow students.

Physical Education

Woodrow Wilson students are staying busy and active in the gym. If you come into the gym today you would see lots of nets set up. Our students are beginning volleyball. Students will play modified and active games once they have fully learned the rules of the games. Resources are provided for students who are still working on their hand-eye coordination. Our goal is to get all students ready so that we can play more active games before moving on to other netted games inside. Soon the weather will warm, the grounds will dry up, and we will take our PE class

outside. We will continue to emphasize the importance of teamwork and sportsmanship as we move throughout the coming weeks inside and outside of the gymnasium.

Big Goals, Big Work, and Big Results - Putting our Energy into Reading, Writing and Math

Our separate reading blocks have enhanced our ability to meet students where they are and due to this schedule, we are noticing more growth than in previous years. 

Instruction of students is the purpose for the Cheektowaga-Sloan Union Free School District's existence. This category includes: salaries, material, equipment and services relating to the instructional program of all students within the District attending our public schools and adults who participate in the Adult Education Program.





Letter from the Principal

TR Parents and Guardians,

There is no question about it, success at school begins at home. Parents are the single most important variable in a child's education. We count on our partnership with our TR parents every year. I wanted to share a few key areas that can make a huge impact on our youngest students: reading daily at home, sleep, and attendance.

I encourage our Theodore Roosevelt parents and family members to help our TR students finish off the year strong. At home, it is important to provide routines as we do in school. Build a daily "quiet time" when the television or screen time is turned off. This quiet time provides students the opportunity to complete schoolwork or for recreational reading. During this quiet time, a suitable place, somewhat free of other distractions, should be available. The routine of daily quiet time provides an opportunity to develop self-discipline, stimulate imagination, and enhance reading skills.

Below are 3 reasons why developing a habit of reading daily with your child at home can instill confidence, knowledge, and a love of reading:

- Reading with or alongside your child, models a love of reading for your child.
- Students and children listen better and longer, while developing a wider vocabulary.
- Reading together promotes social and emotional interactions among family members.

Below are the recommended hours of sleep for children by the National Sleep Foundation:

- 3 5 years need 11 13 hours of sleep
- 5 12 years need 10 11 hours of sleep

The #1 tip for children's good sleeping habits is to follow a nightly routine. Try to make bedtime the same time every night. Make bedtime a positive and relaxing experience without TV or screen time. According to many studies, screen time before bed can lead to difficulty falling and staying asleep. Save your child's favorite relaxing, non-stimulating activities until last, and have them occur in the child's bedroom. The best activity is 20 minutes of reading either to or with your child. Have students get outside and play right after school to provide physical activity and assist with helping them fall asleep more easily.

Finally, school attendance is one of the most powerful predictors of academic achievement. Knowing this, having every student attend school daily, when they are well enough to do so, is critically important. When a student is frequently absent, tardy, or leaves early from school, they lose valuable instructional time and can fall behind. Please continue to communicate your child's absences with the school and send in notes to the main office to ensure the ones that can be deemed excused are accounted for appropriately.






TR's UPK Students Have Been Working on their WIGS

Technology **Updates**

The Department of Data and Technology has continued to make progress in reaching the department's goals of providing modern technology to students and teachers to enrich instruction and learning, ensuring students can navigate technology in the 21st century, and protecting student, teacher, and staff members' data.

In the 2023-2024 school year, all 5th and 8th grade NY State assessments were required to be administered on a computer. Due to our successful one-toone initiative, every kindergarten through 12th-grade student has a Chromebook assigned to them. This allowed us to seamlessly transition to computerbased tests for all grade 3-8 students. We provided all teachers access to the eDoctrina testing platform to prepare students for the transition. This allowed teachers to introduce various online testing tools and provide practice time for students to become familiar with how to use the tools.

With the help of Federal and State grants and the previously approved budget, the Department of Data and Technology has met the refresh cycle requirements for hardware. We continue to purchase new Chromebooks for students entering kindergarten, fifth grade, and ninth grade. We are updating older SMART boards and Promethean boards with Newline interactive whiteboards to ensure that every instructional space in our District can provide interactive and engaging lessons to students. New laptops were purchased for the faculty at JFK, and there are plans to upgrade laptops for the faculty at Woodrow Wilson and Theodore Roosevelt in future years. Finally, 60 new iPads have been purchased to permit the most secure iOS to be installed for the unique cases when a Chromebook does not meet a student's needs.


We have increased our cybersecurity position by investing in Microsoft A5



security licenses. This investment utilizes endpoint behavioral sensors, cloud security analytics, and threat intelligence to detect and respond to advanced threats. We also purchased a new state-of-theart computer server to house our most sensitive student data with additional protections and backup options that ensure student data is always protected. In addition, we continue to train faculty and staff in email phishing tactics and regularly run phishing simulations to ensure that all employees are vigilant in protecting District accounts and student

data. The educational industry has a 29.2% phishing-prone rating. Our faculty and staff scored a 1.6% phishing-prone rating in our most recent phishing simulation, performing eighteen times better than the industry average.

Finally, the Department of Data and Technology has been working on a new website for the 2024-2025 school year. The website will have a more modern look and be focused on easy navigation for parents, students, faculty, staff, and community members to find the information that is important to them.

Update from the Department of Special Education & Student Services

I am pleased to provide you with an update from the Department of Special Education & Student Services. This school year, our support staff have gone above and beyond to meet the needs of our students in creative, collaborative, and innovative ways.

Special Education Teachers & Therapists:

The Department of Special Education has focused on providing personalized and meaningful learning experiences for our students during the 2023-2024 school year. Our department has taken various steps to ensure that all decisions regarding student programming are made individually and through a creative approach. We have also developed a systematic approach to addressing student behavior, procedures regarding how meetings are conducted, and student transitions.

Our special education students have made significant progress in reading this year. At Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson Elementary School, our special education teachers used the Phonics First reading program to provide targeted instruction to students. This targeted instruction has allowed our students to achieve the following:

- All Kindergarten students who work with Mrs. Angrignon can recognize all upper and lower-case letters.
- Our 2nd-grade students working with Mrs. Stockwell have made significant reading growth through the multisensory approach and are close to reading on grade level.
- Mrs. D'Amato's 3rd-grade students are working on strengthening their foundational academic skills such as literacy, numeracy, problem-solving, and critical thinking. The growth they have made so far is exceptional.
- Our 4th-grade students working with Mrs. Moloney are taking on new leadership roles in restorative practice due to the confidence they gained by improving their reading level through targeted instruction.

At JFK Middle and High School, we have focused on developing processes and procedures regarding secondary transition planning. All teachers met individually with students, and assessments were completed to help students develop plans for life after graduation. During these meetings, students were guided through the transition planning process to set short and long-term post-secondary goals and to make informed decisions regarding their courses and instruction while in high school to support these goals. These conversations have empowered students to take responsibility for transition plans that focus on their individualized interests and strengths, as well as bring awareness to their specific needs. Many students have shared their plans with their families and teachers, which has increased meaningful conversations about their future and encouraged them to strive to reach their goals.

As a department, we have also focused on developing a multi-tiered system of support that specifically addresses how we will handle students' behavioral concerns at each tier. All educators were provided training on this system of support in November, and this model continues to be shared with



teachers through student-specific meetings at each building. We have also streamlined how meetings are facilitated within the department, ensuring that all meetings are scheduled six weeks before the date of the meeting to ensure all stakeholders have ample time to prepare, and meetings can be conducted in a timely student-centered manner. These procedures have helped the department function effectively, efficiently, and with students' best interests in mind.

At the beginning of the school year, we brought back the salad bar to JFK middle and high schools. Students are thrilled to build their own salads with a vast selection of vegetables, meats, dried fruits, seeds, cheeses and an array of dressings.

We also introduced two new lunch options at Theodore Roosevelt - salad platters, and

fun foods yogurt lunches. Our youngest students are very much enjoying a made fresh daily salad and a no-meat option of the yogurt lunch, which has a food component from each of the food groups: protein/meat alternative, fruit, vegetable, whole grain and dairy.

This year marked the return of Fine Dining at Theodore Roosevelt. Each month, Mr. Mochrie selects a class to dine with himself, the classroom teacher, and teacher aide in the cafeteria. Students are able to choose their own lunch from a menu for the day, sit at tables adorned with linens and china, and get served their lunch from monitors and food service staff.

New menu items this year have been Kung Pao chicken, lemongrass chicken, broccoli cheddar soup and the baked potato bar, which is wildly popular with both JFK students and staff.

The food service department continues to cater special occasions and meals for the district. Honors breakfasts at JFK middle and high school, new teacher orientation luncheons over the summer, Superintendent Conference Day staff



breakfast, pizzas for restorative practice training, and Superintendent Council luncheons. So far this year, we have done a Halloween themed lunch and most recently, a Soup-Palooza, where Mrs. Galenski, Mr. Julian and the members of the council were able to select from six different kinds of homemade soups.

The hard-working food service staff of Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson, and JFK are dedicated to serving up nutritious meals each day to help fuel up our students for a fun-filled day of learning!

surpassed 1,000 career points as a junior this season. Great job to Olivia and Mike on their individual accomplishments!


