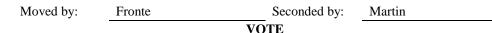

V. COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Citizens are invited to make comments regarding agenda items and are limited to five minutes, according to the Pascack Valley Regional High School District Board of Education policy number 0167. Persons wishing to speak must, upon being recognized, rise and state their name and address.

Carolee Adams of Montvale suggested that the Board postpone voting on the Equity Vision Statement and the new club under Policy until further discussion is held with all constituents, including the new superintendent. She added that there is no urgency to approve them. She cited examples regarding equity and commented that the fundamental problem with equity dogma is human inequality. Equity is impossible as there are human differences.

Eli Moallem of River Vale thanked Ms. Adams. He said hybrid learning has not been a good experience for his two children or his family. He did not understand why what he considers non-essential issues are being piled onto students, families and taxpayers. He commented that schools are a springboard to careers, prosperity and knowledge, and instead it's become destructive and false social justice laboratories. He commented that the equity conversation and Critical Race Theory are very divisive issues. He mentioned that he and his children experienced anti-Semitic things said to them when they attended the high school, but they did not complain to the school. He indicated that did not represent the community. The community is made up of good people. He commented that equity is earned and said that he does not see an equality or equity issue at Pascack Valley. He urged that the school not teach their version of equity to his kids and get back focusing on the kids.

Mayor John Ruocco of Hillsdale urged the Board to be less dependent in creating the vision statement on identity politics which is not embraced by all the residents and less reflective of a theory of modern Marxism. He asked to call it an Equality Statement and offered alternative language which would be far less controversial and accepted by the majority of the four towns. The Pascack Valley Regional High School District fosters acceptance for all people who wish to learn regardless of race, religion, ethnic backgrounds, nationalities, sexual orientation or gender. It recognizes the diversity of these characteristics within its student body, enhances the learning experience and creates tolerance among the student body.

Mr. Fronte commented that this could be an incendiary topic. He asked if Critical Race Theory will be presented to the club and would the district support it.

Dr. Gundersen indicated that all different topics faced by the district regarding student differences would be brought forward and embraced. The focus will be on climate and culture based on data to make improvements in order for all students to feel welcomed.

Ms. Stephans mentioned that she thought equity and diversity was already being done. Thus, she wanted to know the purpose of the club.

Dr. Gundersen commented that this is to bring students together to support the district in making measurable improvements, especially for those who feel marginalized. It's about students having a voice in these matters.

Mr. Blundo indicated that the club is not empowered to make decisions. It's about making suggestions.

Ms. Stephans asked who came up with the vision statement.

Dr. Gundersen said the Board's equity sub-committee drafted it and the community equity partnership was asked to review it. This based on the Board's goal to create an equity vision statement.

Mrs. Varghese clarified the proposed club currently exits and now it will be formally recognized as a club and that anyone can be a part of the club like a debate club where there can be two different viewpoints. She added she understood that it's voluntary to join the club.

Dr. Gundersen confirmed indicating that there is a probationary period for a new club. He indicated that joining the club is totally voluntary.

Mrs. Varghese referred to Mayor Ruocco comment that the term equity is politically charged and she asked who came up with them.

Dr. Gundersen indicated that the Board has been working on equity for several years.

Ms. Molinelli commented that it is a district and board goal. Goals are developed each year. This is a product of what the Board was guided to do. The hope is for the club to be a diverse group with discussion which is how students learn.

Mrs. Martin wanted to confirm that this is to recognize this group as a club with a paid advisor.

Dr. Gundersen confirmed.

Mr. Stankus mentioned that this has been in the works for a number of years. He referred to past discussions if there was equity in the facilities for the boys and the girls. He commented that politics has crept in and he said that the club is not about Critical Race Theory. He indicated that the club is trying to do good things. It's reflective practice.

Ms. Stephans asked about recommendations made by the club.

Mr. Stankus said they look at the climate surveys and where the trends are headed. It may be those who are neglected. The club is an extension of social studies where an

awareness of ideas are brought forward. He commented that it's a positive environment and they are not making anyone feel bad or guilty.

Ms. Stephans commented that the vision statement could be modified over time as things change.

Mr. Stankus indicated that he does not see anything wrong with the vision statement as it reads now. He added like all vision statements they are adjusted as things change.

WHEREAS, the Bergen County Special Services School District, referred to as the "BCSSSD" is a body corporate organized under the laws of the State of New Jersey pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:46-29.

WHEREAS, the LEA is required by law to provide remedial and auxiliary services to eligible students attending non-public schools within the public school district served by the LEA. N.J.S.A.18A:46-19.1, et seq. (Laws of 1977, Chapter 193); N.J.S.A. 18A:46A-1, et seq. (Laws of 1977, Chapter 192).

WHEREAS, the LEA is empowered by law to contract with another agency to provide the remedial and auxiliary services required under Chapters 192 and 193 of the Laws of 1977 pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:46-9.7 and N.J.S.A.18A:46A-7.

WHEREAS, the BCSSSD is empowered by law to contract with the LEA to provide the remedial and auxiliary services herein referenced pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:46-19.7 and N.J.S.A.18A:46A-7.

WHEREAS, the LEA and the BCSSSD hereby agree that the BCSSSD will provide those remedial and auxiliary services set forth in N.J.S.A. 18A:46-9.1 et seq., and N.J.S.A. 18A:46A-1, et seq., which services shall be limited to examination, classification, annual review services, speech correction, as well as the instruction, evaluation, and the necessary equipment, supplies, administration and supervision inherent in providing English as a second language instruction, supplemental instruction, home instruction, and compensatory education instruction, as appropriate, to eligible New Jersey resident students attending non-public schools within the public school district for which the LEA is responsible.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Pascack Valley Regional High School District Board of Education, at the recommendation of the superintendent, approve the service agreement with Bergen County Special Services School District to provide remedial and auxiliary services for the 2021-2022 school year.

11. Renewal of Food Service Management Company

RESOLVED that the Pascack Valley Regional High School District Board of Education, at the recommendation of the superintendent, approve the fifth renewal of the contract for food service management with Pomptonian Food Service Company of Fairfield, NJ, for the 2021-2022 school year based on the USDA Waiver of Food Service Management Contract Duration due to the COVID-19 Pandemic supported by the NJDA. The Food Service Management Company shall receive, in addition to the costs of operation, a fee of \$.0681 per meal equivalent to compensate the Food Service Management Company for administrative and management costs. This fee shall be billed monthly as a cost of operation. The Local Education Agency guarantees the payment of such costs and fee to the Food Service Management Company. Cash receipts shall be divided by \$1.00 to arrive at an equivalent meal count. The per meal management fee of \$.0681 will be multiplied by total meal equivalents, as per the addendum.

X. OLD BUSINESS

Negotiations Committee Report

Dr. Gundersen indicated that the committee had a first meeting with the supervisor's group and the administrator's group and a second meeting with each group is scheduled for tomorrow.

Mr. Blundo added that negotiations are moving along well.

XI. NEW BUSINESS

PVRHSD Board Member seat vacancies for the November 2021 election

Mr. Usami indicated that one seat in Hillsdale, Montvale and River Vale will be expiring at the end of the year and nominating petitions will be available through the district website to New Jersey School Boards Association. He mentioned that the deadline is July 26 to submit to the county office (elections/county clerk). He added that a press release will be sent to the Pascack Press as well.

Mr. Fronte asked if there is a policy that allows for the flying of a flag of an organization or club.

Dr. Gundersen and Mr. Blundo responded there isn't.

Mr. Fronte commented that this may come up for discussion. He indicated that he is for it as long as all clubs have that opportunity. He mentioned that there was a request to fly the rainbow flag. He said if this would fall under the equality and equity statement.

Mrs. Varghese asked if there has been a practice not to fly other flags.

Dr. Gundersen said he needs to ask building administration if other flags such as the MIA POW flag or the state flag have been flown.

Mrs. Martin said that they need to be cautious of who is allowed to fly a flag. She supports this group, but they need to be careful who is allowed and who is not.

Dr. Gundersen agreed. He had reached out to other superintendents who received this type of request and he spoke to one. He mentioned that their board had similar concerns. The superintendent indicated that there were no other requests and that not many school-based organizations have a flag.

Mr. Blundo said Dr. Gundersen made a distinction that it is a school-based organization. He fully supports this group for equality for all. He is concerned that since there is no policy, how will they control it. He indicated that politics have caught up to the issue. He commented that flying the flag could bring out opposition when maybe five years ago there may not have been any opposition publicly. He is concerned that this could become another issue that takes away from the re-opening of schools or focus on academics.

Mr. Fronte commented that he agreed with Mr. Blundo and he fully supports the cause, but said that they are not the arbiters. He mentioned they should strongly consider it which would support a consistent vision.

Mrs. Varghese indicated that they absolutely believe in equality. However, she raised concerns about another club wanting a flag raised and where do we draw the line, the support may be against some people's religion and the flag is a symbol, but they do not discriminate as the district has a transgender bathroom. She believed that flying the flag was passive support and at the risk of offending people.

Ms. Stephans commented that the district is a government entity and it does not mix government with religion. She said it's a slippery slope. How do they objectively decide which organization to support by flying a flag? She indicated setting a new precedent by allowing this and it could disrupt the district due to other requests. She commented that students could celebrate Pride Week in other ways. She added that the United States flag stands for equality and justice for all and we need to respect that.

Mr. Stankus said banners and signs are fine, but the Unites States flag is intended to be an inclusive flag. He said it may not feel that way for some now, but hopefully someday it will. He indicated that the U.S. flag stands for all/unity and should be flying alone and other flags would distract from it.

Ms. Molinelli commented that the flag celebrates all students. It represents everything we believe in such as equity and inclusion. She thanked Mr. Fronte for bringing up the conversation.

Mr. Blundo said that the majority of the Board does not support the flying of other flags except the American flag.

Mr. Fronte agreed. He asked that a policy be developed to address which flags may be flown.

XII. COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Citizens are invited to make comments and are limited to five minutes, according to the Pascack Valley Regional High School District Board of Education policy number 0167.

Persons wishing to speak must, upon being recognized, rise and state their name and address.

Carolee Adams of Montvale asked if the mascot decision came from the equity movement or Mr. Russo.

Dr. Gundersen indicated that it came from conversations with staff, students, board members, and community members and not the Equity Committee or Mr. Russo.

Ms. Adams indicated that the Critical Race Theory is not nonsense. She read a situation in Loudon County, Virginia Board of Education. She suggested that the Board be careful with the equity statement and equity club. She mentioned the BLM rally at Woodcliff Lake where there were anti-police signs. She asked that people be respectful to the police who do an incredibly good job.

Dr. Gundersen indicated that he and other district employees who were at the rally did not agree with the anti-police signs. He mentioned that some people took liberties with photos of those signs and associated them with district employees.

Ms. Adams mentioned that the Montvale electric bulletin board recognizes events 365 days a year. She said that the school sign board celebrated BLM for a month and they may want to consider other things. She related a story of the 400 plus Navajo Code Talkers who prevented the Japanese military from decoding messages during WWII by using Navajo words.

Eli Moallem of River Vale asked what the Board's version of equity is. He said that equity and equality are being used and they are not inter-changeable.

Mr. Blundo said that he believes that equity is to ensure all students are treated equally and given the same opportunity. Everyone is given equal access.

Mrs. Varghese agreed with Mr. Blundo.

Mr. Stankus mentioned enhancing and positivity. He commented that it's about building people up and not down. He added that it's to give people equal opportunity.

Mrs. Martin said saying something is equal is impossible. She indicated that equal opportunity is given, but children make different selections. She mentioned that equality is giving someone the same opportunity and access and it does not mean everything is equal. She indicated that a special needs student may have modifications to even the playing field.

Ms. Molinelli said their objective is to give the best education possible in an equal way. She suggested that the students on the committee should come and meet with the Board.

Mrs. Martin said students have met with the committee and what they shared was eye opening. The committee learned a lot from them.

Mr. Fronte said it is equality of opportunity and the result is somewhat on the students and somewhat on the circumstances. We give all students the same opportunities and make them feel safe and protected.

Mr. Moallem appreciated the responses. He commented that the members talked about equality and there is no shortage of equality and opportunity at Pascack Valley or in their communities. He said that equity means ownership and it is divisive and, in some communities, it has been done in a heavy-handed way which has alienated many people. He commented that equity is a politically charged term that means ownership that must be earned. He does not want students to be taught that are owed something other than freedom or equal opportunity otherwise it will be a path of misery. He urged the Board to get back to basics.

Al Tab of Hillsdale commented that the meetings have been a big waste of time and distraction for the past year. He mentioned that equity is ownership. He read from the vision statement. He asked how the content of the vision statement will leverage how students improve their math scores or any other subject.

Ms. Stephans indicated that many of this is coming from the state. She mentioned that the club is a safe place and we can all learn from each other. It's spreading more love than hate which will help schools. It can help students focus on education. It's all relative.

Mr. Tab did not agree. He said having the club is alright, but not when it interferes with students having to sit through it.

Mr. Blundo was confused by Mr. Tab's comment. He indicated that this was treated like any other club as it followed the guidelines. He said that the club does not set policy or academic standards or goals. He mentioned that the club may suggest improvements and he further commented that the Board or any future Board will have failed if the they make a decision based solely on a club's recommendation. He added that he does not see how this disturbs education.

Mr. Tab asked if all students will be required to enhance their learning through what is the vision statement.

Ms. Molinelli assured him that no student will have any social ideology forced on them.

Mrs. Martin indicated that focus is on overall acceptance. She related an experience of a middle school student experiencing gender identity. She mentioned that the student identified with a magnet in a classroom that made the student feel safe. She commented that when students feel safe and welcome, it impacts the student's learning.

Mr. Stankus said the discussions at the committee are productive and positive, and they are not looking for a problem as it is being framed tonight. He indicated that the climate survey has shown many positives and they want to keep them going. He mentioned that it's about elevating the schools. He recognized this topic has been going on for many years and now the politics have caught up to it. He commented that the committee is a positive group and they are doing good things.

Ms. Molinelli commented that the students in the committee said it's the best thing they've experienced and they feel empowered. They have a different understanding of people. She saw students glowing with excitement, being educated and aware.

Mr. Blundo commented that he works for one of the top five U.S. companies and he underwent a five-hour training today on equity. He reiterated that no student will be forced to join the club. He added that kids who are in the club will already have that experience that he did not have in high school. It will be educational for them in a club setting.

Ms. Molinelli commented that in the workforce it's about how to make people feel comfortable at work and how to teach people to get along. She said it's a strong tool for students.

Mr. Fronte indicated that every one of his major corporate clients require his employees to go through this training, otherwise they will not work with his company. He thinks this would be positive for the students to experience since this is what is going on in the workplace.

Mrs. Varghese indicated that the board members must leave their feelings aside. They have different views and they don't always agree. She commented that they learn when they listen to different views. She said they are responsible to apply governance to the entire district and not an individual or a group. She indicated that they are not forcing the club on any student. It's a voluntary club and parents should discuss this with their child if they wish. She reiterated that some things are mandated by the state and if anyone does not like it then they should contact the state.

XIII. ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made by Mr. Fronte to adjourn the public session at 9:14 p.m. Ms. Stephans seconded the motion, which was unanimously carried.
