FOR SAFETY EFFORTS

The Whitesboro Central School District is one of at least 160 school districts and Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) in New York State to receive the Utica National Insurance Group's "School Safety Excellence Award" for 2024 at the Titanium with Honors level.

The honor is presented annually and recognizes school districts' safety efforts as they work to help keep students, staff and visitors safe. Whitesboro Central School District received its award at Utica National's 42nd school safety seminar, one of seven such seminars the company hosts in the state. For 50 years, Utica National has kept kids and school staff safe and currently insures more than 300 school districts in upstate New York alone.

Whitesboro Central School District officials accepted a certificate to commemorate the District's safety efforts and a check for \$500 for use

as reimbursement for and/or in connection with the school safety program.

Utica National's School Safety Excellence Award Program has three levels - titanium, platinum, and gold - in which schools can earn a meritorious distinction by meeting specific criteria to enhance overall safety. Through the program, schools with their own transportation, schools with contract transportation and BOCES are evaluated. Categories covered include bullying prevention programs, playground safety and other areas, and are measured using specific, quantifiable surveys.

Safety and security remains a top priority within the Whitesboro Central School District, and the District continues to enhance these efforts and initiatives at every opportunity.

STOPTHE **BLEED** KITS

ASSEMBLED BY NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY STUDENTS

On March 12, members of Whitesboro High School's Chapter of National Honor Society gathered in the District's Board of Education conference room to assemble 200 Stop the Bleed kits.



Stop the Bleed kits contain the necessary items to control serious bleeding and prevent further blood loss for a victim suffering a traumatic injury. The included instructions prioritize which injuries to treat with the appropriate components, including how to treat with a tourniquet and direct pressure using gauze. Each kit contains:

- **American Red Cross Soft Case Pouch**
- **American Red Cross Tactical Medical, SOF Tourniquet**
- **SWAT-T Tourniquet**
- Krinkle Gauze
- Sponge Gauze 2-pack
- **Trauma Shears**
- Two Pairs of Nitrile Gloves

The assembled kits were dispersed to classrooms throughout the District.

This project aligns with the National Honor Society pillar of Service. Service represents the choice of stepping outside oneself to meet the needs of others, fueled by an unwavering passion for a cause, heartfelt empathy for others, or driven by personal circumstances. It's about performing selfless acts that transcend the ordinary, engendering transformative changes that resonate throughout schools, ripple across communities, and reverberate on a global scale. In the noble act of service, students sculpt a better world with their hands, hearts and humanity.

PROPOSED BUDGET

The District budget vote and Board of Education election will be held on Tuesday, May 21, 2024, from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. at Parkway, Deerfield and Marcy schools. If the proposed budget is passed by voters, it will be enacted for the 2024-25 school year. If not passed, the Board of Education can:

- Place a revised budget before District residents for a vote.
- Place the same budget before District residents for a vote.
- Immediately adopt a contingency budget.

If a contingency budget is adopted, only ordinary contingent expenses necessary to provide the minimum services legally required to operate and maintain school buildings and the educational program, preserve the property of the District and ensure the health and safety of students and staff, are budgeted. Additionally, when on a contingency budget, school districts must charge fees to non-district organizations that use school district facilities, including groups such as little league, biddy basketball, boy scouts and girl scouts.

PROPOSITIONS ON THE BALLOT

THE BALLOT WILL READ AS FOLLOWS:

Be It Resolved, that the District voters be asked to approve the following propositions at the Special District Meeting held in conjunction with the Annual Election on May 21, 2024:

Budget Proposition

Shall the budget for the school year 2024-2025, in the amount of \$84,090,616, as adopted by the Whitesboro Central School District Board of Education, be approved, and a tax be levied upon the taxable property of the school district to raise same?

Proposition 1 – School Buses

Shall the resolution authorizing the Board of Education of the Whitesboro Central School District to undertake the acquisition of six (6) full-sized diesel fueled school buses, and two (2) small buses, all at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$1,290,350, less trade-in value, if any, and that such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$1,290,350 shall be issued, or the School District may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the School District to finance the purchase in that method, be approved?



While the tax levy limit is often referred to as a "2% tax cap", each district is required to annually calculate their specific tax levy limit in accordance with a formula that accounts for individual district conditions and variables. For districts across New York State, this calculation rarely results in a limit of exactly 2%; calculated rates can vary as high as 6% or more. For Whitesboro CSD, the proposed tax levy increase of 2.22% does not exceed the tax levy limit, and requires a simple majority of votes for approval.



On February 29, March 1 and 2, the high school music department rocked out on stage with the much-beloved stage adaptation of "School of Rock." Based on the hit 2003 film. "School of Rock" follows Dewey Finn, a failed, wannabe rock star who is down on his luck. After Dewey is kicked out of his band and threatened with eviction, his fortunes take a turn for the better when he intercepts a phone call meant for his roommate, Ned Schneebly. He guickly decides to make a bit of cash and pose as Ned to take up a substitute teaching job at Horace Green, a prestigious prep school. upcoming Battle of the Bands competition. However, he needs to do all of this away from the prying eyes of the school's principal, Rosalie Mullins. Along the way, Dewey finds romance, self-worth, a proper job and, most importantly, he teaches the children and their parents the beauty of rock!

Musical rehearsals were held from January through February directly after school in our auditorium. Students participated in activities and exercises to get them used to using the space on stage and interacting with other actors. Students also participated in choreography rehearsals with choreographer Maria Barresi to enhance the action on stage. Our sound technician, Elliott Lester, also worked tirelessly to amplify not only the students on stage, but the instruments on stage and in the pit. We thank Elliott for helping to showcase our students in their best possible light.

This year, five of our students embarked on a never been done before feat at Whitesboro they learned how to play real live instruments and formed a rock band that actually plays on stage! Matt Brinck (guitar), Gavyn Burgdoff (drums), Avery Davis (keyboard), Matia Rossi (bass) and Bradford Webster (guitar) all worked together once a week after school for "band" practice, learning several songs for the show on their instruments. These students rose to the challenge and even received certificates for graduating "band camp."

"School of Rock" featured a cast of 40 student actors, 10 student stage/lighting crew members and many set construction and design crew students. The performances were well-attended and well-received, and by the end of each show, everyone felt as if they were at a real life rock concert! Seeing the show come to life is a memory we will not soon forget. The powerful impact of the arts on these students' well-being was truly evident through this show. We are overwhelmed with joy knowing that our students will have this memory to fondly look back on. Many thanks are extended to all who were involved in the making and performing of our show. It takes a village to put on productions of this scale, and "School of Rock" could not have happened without all involved!

For over a decade, Whitesboro High School has been competing in the national recitation

competition Poetry Out Loud. Each year, students from Whitesboro compete; first in a classroom competition, then in a schoolwide competition where the classroom winners face off to become school champion. The top two students move on to the regional competition to face winners from other high schools. Remarkably, Whitesboro has won and moved on to compete for the title of New York State Champion five times. Now, that number is six!

Although we have never had a state champion, we have always placed well, with our top finish coming in second place, just a few points away from moving on to the national competition in Washington, D.C. Not surprisingly, Whitesboro students have earned a fine reputation as outstanding competitors.

That being said, this year's Poetry Out Loud competition was an exciting challenge for our students, many of whom felt they had what it takes to become New York State Champion. More than 100 Whitesboro students competed in classroom competitions, and 16 students moved on to compete for the title of Whitesboro High School Champion. In an incredibly close contest, Cayden Young edged out Matt Brinck, who was a regional finalist last year. The two of them went to Syracuse for

the regionals in February and did incredibly well, with Cayden Young being named Regional Champion.

The state finals were held on March 9 in New York City, at The Fashion Institute of Technology. Against the other regional winners and runner-ups, Cayden Young rose to the challenge and performed his absolute best.

"Unfortunately, I didn't win," Cayden said, "It was a tough competition: they were all amazing. I have definitely learned a few things based on watching the top five students perform." With his typical upbeat attitude, he added, "I will definitely be back next year!"

Congratulations to both Matt Brinck, who is graduating in the class of 2024, and Cayden Young, who we hope to see win it all next year.

A special "thank you" goes to the Whitesboro Literary Magazine and the English department, who help to make this contest a reality each year, as well as all the faculty and staff that support the program in numerous ways.

Celebration of Chinese Culture










MARCY AND HART'S HILL ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS HOLD **INCOMING KINDERGARTEN NIGHTS**
