The Whitesboro Central School District is proud to announce that they have been recognized as a School of Excellence by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA).

Following each sports season, the NYSPHSAA awards varsity sports teams with Scholar-Athlete pins and certificates. At least 75% of a varsity sports team must have a GPA of 90% or higher to be eligible for the Scholar-Athlete award. If the entire team does not meet the goal of a 90% or higher GPA, there are individual awards for those who have met the NYSPHSAA Scholar-Athlete criteria during the season.

Welcome to the 2023-2024 school year! As I anticipate my 24th reopening of school here in Whitesboro, 8th as Superintendent, I am energized and excited that this year will present many great opportunities for our school community.

We have made tremendous progress on our District's Five-Year Plan. With guidance from the University at Albany and Dr. Luvelle Brown, our building level teams worked on goals they set based on the needs assessments they conducted and the survey feedback gathered by UAlbany. I am pleased to report our teams have made significant progress on their goals and spent time this summer extending our plan by an additional year, thereby always having five-year goals in mind.



As a District, we are continuing to provide professional development for our staff, along with opportunities to update and revise our curricular programs. Over the past few months, many of our instructional staff members have participated in 72 summer curriculum projects which will continue to align our K-12 curriculum to the Next Generation Standards, NYS Frameworks, and mandates from the NYS Education Department. In addition, we were able to offer 17 summer camp opportunities for students in grades K-12 which were facilitated by Whitesboro staff members in areas such as ELA, math, science, health and wellness, STEAM, drama, music, and art.

We are also pleased to offer the following new courses at our high school: Digital Application I (Dual Credit), Drawing and Painting Appreciation (Special Education), Fitness Room (Dual Credit), Introduction to Computer Science (Full-Year), Introduction to Web Development, Mandarin Chinese 3 (Dual Credit), and AP World History. These additional courses, along with our current rigorous course offerings, provide our students with unique opportunities to help them to not only be college or career ready, but also have the availability to graduate with transferable college credit.

Throughout this issue you will find more examples of the many accomplishments we have made in our District. In addition, you will find important information about busing, schedules, and medication in school to name a few. Please take some time to review this issue and familiarize yourself with its contents.

On May 21, Brett Cook, Felix "Bud" Guernier and Julie Venezia were inducted into the Whitesboro Alumni Teachers Hall of Fame during a luncheon at Hart's Hill Inn. Presenters included Kelli McGowan, principal of Deerfield Elementary; John Egresits, principal of the Middle School Campus and Monica Guernier, wife of Felix Guernier; who also accepted the award on behalf of her late husband.

The first teacher ever inducted into the Teachers Hall of Fame was Sophie Berryman in 1968. With the addition of these three outstanding individuals, there are now a total of 57 staff members who have their bronze plaques displayed on the wall outside the high school cafeteria to recognize their exceptional service to their school, students, District and community.

The Teachers Hall of Fame was conceived to express grateful appreciation for outstanding service as a teacher whose professional capability, integrity and sympathetic understanding inspired the admiration, respect and loyalty of students and associates, and whose wisdom and foresight left a lasting influence on the Whitesboro Central School District.

Students Receive New York State Seal of Biliteracy

On May 15, Whitesboro seniors who received the New York State Seal of Biliteracy (NYSSB) celebrated their accomplishments after school in the pit with cake, cookies and refreshments. Administration, teachers and staff joined the students to recognize their achievements. This is the first year that Whitesboro has offered the New York State Seal of Biliteracy. A total of 21 students received this honor, with a total of 23 seals earned!

The breakdown of awards is as follows:

- Nine students earned the seal in English and ASL.
- Eight students earned the seal in English and Spanish.
- One student earned the seal in English and French.
- One student earned the seal in English and Burmese.

Two students earned the seal in multiple languages: English, Spanish and Russian.

Science Department Receives New Scanning Electron Microscope

On June 21, the Whitesboro High School science department was trained by Ms. Ingrid Koch of NanoScience on how to use the department's newly-acquired G6 scanning electron microscope (SEM).

The department was broken up into groups based on discipline area, and teachers were able to prepare various samples, image them using scanning electron microscopy and learn how to capture images. Though teachers could view premade specimens, they chose to prepare items of their own interest.

Ms. Koch was the perfect instructor. She is incredibly knowledgeable in various science disciplines and passionate about the instrument and the possible uses in the high school classroom.

According to Ms. Koch, Whitesboro is one of only four high schools in the nation in which students have access to a SEM and the only one in New York State.

Oneida County Youth & Adults Awards Ceremony

Two Whitesboro High School students were among the 10 students and two adults who were honored for their positive impact on the community at the Fourth Annual Oneida County Youth and Adult Awards Ceremony on June 7.

The ceremony was held in the Board of Legislators Chamber at the Oneida County Office Building in Utica, and awards were presented by Oneida County Executive Anthony J. Picente Jr. and Oneida County Youth Bureau Director Kevin Green.

Whitesboro senior Jenna Sobel was a recipient of the Spirit of Success Youth Award and senior Emma Fasolo was a recipient of the Exceptional Youth Leadership Award.

"The exceptional qualities possessed by these honorees are something that all members of our community should strive to emulate," said Picente, according to an Oneida County news release. "This annual awards ceremony demonstrates that the future of Oneida County is in good hands with outstanding youth who are being guided by equally outstanding adults."

The event is sponsored by the Friends of the Oneida County Youth Bureau and this is the first year it has been held since 2019.

THE BUS SCHEDULE

Morning pick-up times will begin at the approximate time stated. We ask that students arrive at their bus stop **five** minutes prior to pick-up time.

Bus arrival times, routing and stops will become finalized several days into the school year. Post cards with initial route/bus information will be sent home the last week of August.

All routes are **subject to change** during the school year.

STOP AND PICK-UP TIMES

Approximate times are given for the bus stop on each run. A time pattern for all stops will be established within a few days. Students should be ready at the stop five minutes ahead of the estimated time. Exact arrival times are affected by many factors, including weather, traffic, substitute drivers and mechanical problems. These are suggested times for the first week of school and are **subject to change**. Drivers will notify students of changes.

BUS SAFETY GUIDELINES

1. Line up single file as soon as you see the school bus approaching. Do not start toward the bus until it has come to a full stop and the driver has opened the door. If you have to cross the street, wait for the bus driver to signal.
2. Use the handrail when boarding and exiting the bus.
3. Be courteous.
4. Do not walk behind the bus.
5. Bus passes must be obtained from school personnel (available with written permission from parent or guardian) in order to discharge student at another stop other than his/her normal stop.

ITEMS PROHIBITED ON SCHOOL BUSES

For the safety of all riders, students are requested not to carry potentially harmful items on the bus. Nothing should be carried that will interfere with seating, space or safety. The following are examples of items prohibited on the bus:

- Insects or animals of any kind
- Glass objects and breakable objects
- Balloons
- Skate boards
- Sleds and skis of any kind
- Any sharp or pointed objects
- Medicine, medications
- Projects that don't fit on a student's lap
- Large musical instruments
- Weapons of any kind or any object that could be perceived to be a weapon (toy guns, knives, etc.)
- Matches/lighters

SCHOOL BUS RULES OF CONDUCT

1. Follow directions of the driver at all times.

2. Stay seated in your seat at all times.
3. Keep all parts of your body in the bus and to yourself.
4. No pushing, shoving or fighting.
5. No eating, drinking, smoking or spitting.
6. Do not litter, write on or damage the bus in any way.
7. Do not use profanity, rude gestures, tease or harass anyone on the bus.

BUS DISCIPLINE

Improper behavior may result in the suspension of bus riding privileges. The following procedure is followed when a student's conduct may warrant suspension.

IF A STUDENT VIOLATES THE CODE OF CONDUCT:

- 1st time:** Driver verbally warns student and documents on daily log.
- 2nd time:** Parents contacted by driver or transportation department personnel, documented on daily log form (probationary period begins).
- 3rd time** Bus Conduct Form issued, parents contacted by Building Administrator, three (3) day bus suspension.
- 4th time:** Five (5) day bus suspension.
- 5th time:** Principal's hearing (10-30 day bus suspension).
- 6th time:** Superintendent's hearing.

SEVERE DISRUPTION

The following inappropriate behavior will result in suspension of transportation privileges

IMMEDIATELY:

1. Physical harm to student.*
2. Physical harm or threat of physical harm to driver.*

*May result in referral to law enforcement

It's "Back-to-School" time. School buses are back on the roads, and students are walking along the side of the road and waiting for buses.

- Please watch carefully for children near school buildings, in areas where school buses are traveling or where there are signs for school zones or bus stops.
- Remember that if you are approaching a school bus from either the front or behind, and its yellow lights are flashing, the bus is preparing to stop.
- If the bus' red lights are flashing, **YOU MUST STOP. It's the law!**

This **includes** school buses that are: on the opposite sides of divided highways, on multiple lane roadways, in parking lots and on school grounds.

NOTE: The **only** exception to this law is if the bus driver or a police officer signals that you may pass the bus.

PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

You will then receive advance notification of a pesticide application at your child(ren)'s facility of pesticide products covered by notification requirements.

MEDICATION DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

School policies regarding administration of medication are consistent with procedures established by state education law.

For students to receive medication (prescription or non-prescription, including cough drops and other "over-the-counter" medication) during the school day, the following procedures **MUST** be followed and renewed each year:

- **The parent or legal guardian must submit a written request to school authorities, along with a written request from the prescribing physician, indicating the frequency and dosage.**
- **The medication must be brought to school by a responsible adult in the original container labeled with the name of the medication and the dosage.**

These procedures must be followed in order for medication to be administered in school.

STUDENT PHYSICALS

New York State Education Law requires that each new entrant to the District and students in kindergarten, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th and 11th grades must have a physical examination, either by the school nurse practitioner or family physician. Vision, hearing and scoliosis screenings per NYS regulations will be done by the school nurse.

Please communicate with the school nurse if you will have your family physician provide the physical examination. The family physician will need to complete a physician's report form (available from the school nurse) and submit it to the nurse.

COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

The District, in consultation with our School Physician, will be following the current CDC recommendations in regards to COVID-19 mitigation protocols. Students and staff members with a confirmed positive test or diagnosis from a physician must isolate themselves for 5 days, and upon returning to school/work, wear a mask for the following 5 days after. Consult your physician or school nurse for additional information or guidance if needed.

STUDENTS MAY NOT CARRY MEDICATION WITH THEM

SCHOOLMESSENGER - SCHOOL COMMUNICATION & NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

The Whitesboro Central School District utilizes the SchoolMessenger automated communication system to provide timely information to parents and staff on matters such as attendance, general information, campus emergencies and school closings and delays.

There is no need to sign up for SchoolMessenger, as it uses contact information stored in our student information system. All households with students in the District will be notified by phone when important information needs to be communicated, such as delays, early dismissals, closings, emergency situations or other important messages.

Please ensure that the District is informed of any changes to your address, home phone, cell phones or place of business throughout the school year. If you do contact the District to update your contact information, please note that it may take up to 24 hours for the information to change in SchoolMessenger.

In the event that you receive an automated call, please listen to the message in its entirety to hear the important information.

SNOW DAYS OR EMERGENCIES

The decision to close school, delay the start of school or release students early because of adverse weather conditions (or another emergency situation) is made only after the road conditions in the District are reviewed personally by District staff. The final decision is made by the Superintendent of Schools. If a closing, delay or early dismissal occurs, the media is informed as a soon as possible. HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT PARKING

Driving a motor vehicle and parking on school property is a privilege granted to juniors and seniors at the high school. Information on registering vehicles for the upcoming school year is sent out to the parents of all 11th and 12th grade students in early August.

There are designated areas for parking at the high school. Students must park in white lined areas only (including designated parking in the west end of the north parking lot). Staff parking is indicated by yellow lines; signs designate visitor areas. Anyone using a handicap space must have appropriate handicap identification on their vehicle or, for temporary reasons, must contact the student activities office to secure permission.

Daily passes, which allow students to drive to and from BOCES internship sites, can be issued by Mr. Cognetti in the student activities office.

If you have questions or concerns, contact the student activities office between 7:15 a.m.-3:00 p.m. at 315.266.3230.

WORKING PAPERS

Before starting employment, students 14-17 years of age are required by New York State law to have working papers. There are restrictions on the type of work and the number of hours a student can work, particularly during the school year.

Students should apply for working papers at least one week before the start of employment to allow time for the paperwork to be processed. Students must provide proof of age and physical fitness to work. School records can provide proof of age for students registered at Whitesboro High School. The high school nurse can provide proof of physical fitness for students whose physicals have been done at school for sports. Students may also submit written documentation from their private physicians.

Application forms (working papers) can be picked up in the high school nurse's office. Students should return their completed forms to the nurse's office. The nurse will then verify that the student has had a physical within the last year and will attach a "certificate of physical fitness" form, forwarding everything to the student activities office where the student will pick up their employment certificate (working card).

STUDENT DIRECTORY INFORMATION POLICY

New York State law allows school districts to release student directory information to an outside group without individual consent. Parents or eligible students have the right to refuse the release of such information by notifying Mr. Christopher O'Neil, Records Information Officer, in writing, no later than October 1 of the school year. Following this response period, the District may release such information.

The Family Education and Rights Privacy Act (FERPA) defines student directory information as the following: name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height (if members of athletic teams), degrees and awards received and the name of the educational agency or institution previously attended by the student.
