Welcome to the 2022-2023 school year! As I anticipate my 23rd reopening of school here in Whitesboro, 7th as Superintendent, I am optimistic that our school year will have a much more traditional feel and include all the experiences and opportunities our students most certainly deserve.

We have made tremendous progress on our District's Five-Year Plan. With guidance from the University at Albany, our building level teams worked on SMART goals they set based on the needs assessments they conducted and the survey feedback gathered by UAlbany. I am pleased to report our teams have made significant progress on their goals and spent time this summer extending our plan by an additional year, thereby always having five-year goals in mind.

Around the District, you may have seen some of the capital project work that is underway. You will see updates and information regarding this work later in this issue.

As a District we are continuing to provide professional development for our staff along with opportunities to update and revise our curricular programs. Over the past few months many of our instructional staff members have participated in 58 summer curriculum projects which will continue to align our K-12 curriculum to the Next Generation Standards, NYS Frameworks, and mandates from the NYS Education Department. In addition we were able to offer 19 summer camp opportunities for students in grades K-12 which were facilitated by Whitesboro staff members in areas such as ELA, math, science, health and wellness, STEAM, drama, music, and art.

We are also pleased to offer the following new courses at our high school: Mandarin Chinese 2B, American Sign Language IV, Introduction to Computer Science, a dual credit course through Mohawk Valley Community College, and the reinstatement of Food and Nutrition, Food Entrepreneurship, and Regional and International Foods. These additional courses along with our current rigorous course offerings provide our students with unique opportunities to help them to not only be college or career ready, but also have the availability to graduate with transferable college credit.

Throughout this issue you will find more examples of the many accomplishments we have made in our District. In addition, you will find important information about busing, schedules, and medication in school to name a few. Please take some time to review this issue and familiarize vourself with its contents.

Two Teachers Receive Empire State Excellence in Teaching Award

Two Whitesboro Central School District teachers were announced as recipients of the 2022 Empire State Excellence in Teaching Award by Governor Kathy Hochul on June 15.

High school chemistry teacher Stephen Costanza and high school physical education teacher Sara Stamboly-Warner we among the 54 pre-K-12 public school teachers who were recognized for their impressive skillsets as educators and commitment to success for all of their students.

The Empire State Excellence in Teaching Program was created in 2016 to support exemplary teachers across New York state who foster creativity, instill a love of learning and motivate students to maintain high expectations and academic goals, inspire thinking and student initiative. These professionals are eager learners who pursue meaningful professional development throughout their careers. This prestigious award recognizes the dedication, expertise and mission of New York teachers, who demonstrate the excellence seen in classrooms across the State.

Costanza and Stamboly-Warner were selected after an extensive application period where several New York State professional education associations were involved in the selection process.

Wolfspeed Visits Whitesboro

Students in Mrs. D'Accurzio's English 12 class recently had the opportunity to interact with members of the Wolfspeed team. Wolfspeed is a powerhouse semiconductor company focused on Silicon Carbide and GaN technologies. Students were informed about the addition of the largest Silicon Carbide FAB lab which is located right in their home district, Marcy.




Members from the team provided students with an overview of the semiconductor industry. Students were informed about opportunities in engineering, math and computer science. The difference between Silicon and Silicon Carbide was explained as well as the educational pathways required to work in the microelectronics and/or semiconductor industry.

The OHM BOCES School and Business Alliance (SABA) provides career exploration opportunities for students and helps them to make informed decisions about their future in the ever changing workforce. We look forward to partnering with Wolfspeed for additional opportunities allowing for internships and business tours.

AP Bio Students Investigate RNAi

Partnering with Dr. Carolyn Adler of Cornell University, TCCC BIOL105/AP Bio students at Whitesboro Senior High were able to partake in an experiment involving a biotechnology rarely used in high school classrooms. Mr. Ryan's students studied the effect of RNAi (or RNA interference) on planaria. Planaria are small flatworms whose bodies consist of a large number of stem cells (almost 20%). The abundance of stem cells allow planaria to regenerate amputated body tissue. If a planarian has its head amputated, it can regenerate a new one (as well as regenerate a tail from the severed head).

Though flatworms have been a staple of high school biology classroom for decades, working with RNAi is a rarity. Whitesboro is only one of six schools in the state that are implementing this technology. RNAi is a process that suppresses certain genes by targeting specific RNA sequences for their destruction – therefore "silencing," or shutting off, the gene.



regenerated. In order for flatworms to obtain the RNAi, it was incorporated into a food source (the food was dyed so that it could be visible in the body once ingested) and fed to the planaria on two occasions.

The experiment was a complete success and Mr. Ryan's students obtained phenomenal results as many of the planaria grew two or more heads. Special thanks to Dr. Carolyn Adler of Cornell University and to Tompkins Cortland Community College for arranging the professional development necessary to introduce this technology into high school classrooms. THE BUS SCHEDULE

Morning pick-up times will begin at the approximate time stated. We ask that students arrive at their bus stop **five** minutes prior to pick-up time.

Bus arrival times, routing and stops will become finalized several days into the school year. Post cards with initial route/bus information will be sent home the last week of August.

All routes are **<u>subject to change</u>** during the school year.

STOP AND PICK-UP TIMES

Approximate times are given for the bus stop on each run. A time pattern for all stops will be established within a few days. Students should be ready at the stop five minutes ahead of the estimated time. Exact arrival times are affected by many factors, including weather, traffic, substitute drivers and mechanical problems. These are suggested times for the first week of school and are **subject to change**. Drivers will notify students of changes.

BUS SAFETY GUIDELINES

- 1. Line up single file as soon as you see the school bus approaching. Do not start toward the bus until it has come to a full stop and the driver has opened the door. If you have to cross the street, wait for the bus driver to signal.
- 2. Use the handrail when boarding and exiting the bus.
- 3. Be courteous.
- 4. Do not walk behind the bus.
- 5. Bus passes must be obtained from school personnel (available with written permission from parent or guardian) in

order to discharge student at another stop other than his/her normal stop.

ITEMS PROHIBITED ON SCHOOL BUSES

For the safety of all riders, students are requested not to carry potentially harmful items on the bus. Nothing should be carried that will interfere with seating, space or safety. The following are examples of items prohibited on the bus:

- Insects or animals of any kind.
- Glass objects and breakable objects.
- Balloons.
- Skate boards.
- Sleds and skis of any kind.
- Any sharp or pointed objects.
- Medicine, medications.
- Projects that don't fit on a student's lap.
- Large musical instruments.
- Weapons of any kind or any object that could be perceived to be a weapon (toy guns, knives, etc.).
- Matches/lighters.

SCHOOL BUS RULES OF CONDUCT

- 1. Follow directions of the driver at all times.
- 2. Stay seated in your seat at all times.
- 3. Keep all parts of your body in the bus and to yourself.
- 4. No pushing, shoving or fighting.
- 5. No eating, drinking, smoking or spitting.
- 6. Do not litter, write on or damage the bus in any way.
- 7. Do not use profanity, rude gestures, tease or harass anyone on the bus.

BUS DISCIPLINE

Improper behavior may result in the suspension of bus riding privileges. The following procedure is followed when a student's conduct may warrant suspension.

IF A STUDENT VIOLATES THE CODE OF CONDUCT:

1st time: Driver verbally warns student

and documents on daily log.

2nd time: Parents contacted by driver

or transportation department personnel, documented on daily log form (probationary period

begins).

3rd time Bus Conduct Form issued,

parents contacted by Building Administrator, three (3) day bus

suspension.

4th time: Five (5) day bus suspension. **5th time:** Principal's Hearing (10-30 day bus

suspension).

6th time: Superintendent's Hearing.

SEVERE DISRUPTION

The following inappropriate behavior will result in suspension of transportation privileges **IMMEDIATELY:**

- 1. Physical harm to student.*
- 2. Physical harm or threat of physical harm to driver.*
- *May result in referral to law enforcement

It's "Back to School" time. School buses are back on the roads, and students are walking along the side of the road and waiting for buses.

- Please watch carefully for children near school buildings, in areas where school buses are traveling or where there are signs for school zones or bus stops.
- Remember that if you are approaching a school bus from either the front or behind, and its yellow lights are flashing, the bus is preparing to stop.
- If the bus' red lights are flashing, YOU MUST STOP. It's the law!

This **includes** school buses that are: on the opposite sides of divided highways, on multiple lane roadways, in parking lots and on school grounds. **NOTE:** The **only** exception to this law is if the bus driver or a police officer signals that you may pass the bus.

PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

School districts and BOCES are required to maintain a list of parents or guardians who wish to receive written notification 48 hours prior to application of a pesticide that is covered by notification requirements, at their child(ren)'s school/facility. If you wish to be included on the School District Notification List, please contact Kevin Storsberg, director of facilities, at (315) 266-3312. You will then receive advance notification of a pesticide application at your child(ren)'s facility of pesticide products covered by notification requirements.

For further information about the products being applied, including any warnings that appear on the label of the pesticide(s) that are pertinent to the protection of humans, animals, or the environment, call the National Pesticide Telecommunication Network at 1-800-858-7378 or the New York State Department of Health Center for Environmental Health at 1-800-458-1158. USE OF SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

The Whitesboro Central School District promotes student, staff and visitor safety in all District facilities, grounds and buses. In an attempt to ensure a safe and effective learning environment, the Board of Education supports the use of surveillance cameras, when necessary, in all District facilities, grounds and buses. Surveillance cameras will not be used in public areas and other non-public areas, such as restrooms and locker rooms, where there is reasonable expectation of privacy. Audio recordings will not be made in conjunction with the use of cameras. Such prohibition does not preclude the use of audio recordings by law enforcement or District personnel when used in accordance with their official duties as authorized by law.

The Whitesboro Central School District participates in the Federal School Lunch Program and offers free or reduced meals to qualifying students. Medication During the School Day

School policies regarding administration of medication are consistent with procedures established by state education law.

For students to receive medication (prescription or nonprescription, including cough drops and other "over-thecounter" medication) during the school day, the following procedures MUST be followed and renewed each year:

- The parent or legal quardian must submit a written request to school authorities, along with a written request from the prescribing physician, indicating the frequency and dosage.
- The medication must be brought to school by a responsible adult in the original container labeled with the name of the medication and the dosage.

These procedures must be followed in order for medication to be administered in school.

STUDENT PHYSICALS

New York State Education Law requires that each new entrant to the District and students in kindergarten, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th and 11th grades must have a physical examination, either by the school nurse practitioner or family physician. Vision, hearing and scoliosis screenings per NYS regulations will be done by the school nurse.

Please communicate with the school nurse if you will have your family physician provide the physical examination. The family physician will need to complete a physician's report form (available from the school nurse) and submit it to the nurse.

SCHOOLMESSENGER - SCHOOL COMMUNICATION & NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT PARKING

Driving a motor vehicle and parking on school property is a privilege granted to seniors and juniors at the high school. All students should have received a mailing home with information on how they can register a vehicle for the upcoming school year. Students may begin registering their vehicles on August 30 and September 1 in the Assistant Principal's Office.

There are designated areas for parking at the High School. Students must park in white lined areas only (including designated parking in the west end of the north parking lot). Staff parking is indicated by yellow lines; signs designate visitor areas. Anyone using a handicap space must have appropriate handicap identification on their vehicle or, for temporary reasons, must contact the Student Activities Office to secure permission.

Daily parking permits may be issued to students for medical reasons or for an out-ofdistrict education program for which transportation is not provided. Unacceptable reasons for granting day passes are:

- Participation in school sports or activities
- Work
- Tutor
- Any other reason not specified in acceptable criteria listed above

WORKING PAPERS

Before starting employment, students 14-18 years of age are required by New York State law to have working papers. There are restrictions on the type of work and the number of hours a student can work, particularly during the school year.

Students should apply for working papers at least one week before the start of employment to allow time for the paperwork to be processed. Students must provide proof of age and proof of physical fitness to work. School records can provide proof of age for students registered at Whitesboro High School. The high

school nurse can provide proof of physical fitness for students whose physicals have been done in school for sports. Students may also submit written documentation from their private physician.

Application forms (working papers) can be picked up in the High School Nurse's Office. Students should return their completed form to the nurse's office. The nurse will then verify that the student has had a physical within the last year and will attach a "Certificate of Physical Fitness" form, forwarding everything to the Student Activities Office, where the student will pick up their employment certificate (working card).

STUDENT DIRECTORY INFORMATION POLICY

New York State law allows school districts to release student directory information to an outside group without individual consent. Parents or eligible students have the right to refuse the release of such information by notifying Mr. Christopher O'Neil, Records Information Officer, in writing, no later than October 1 of the school year. Following this response period, the District may release such information.

The Family Education and Rights Privacy Act (FERPA) defines student directory information as the following: name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height (if members of athletic teams), degrees and awards received and the name of the educational agency or institution previously attended by the student.
