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Assemblywoman Buttenschon Visits 3rd Grade to Celebrate Agricultural Literacy Week

Assemblywoman Marianne Buttenschon visited Marcy Elementary on March 25 in celebration of Agricultural Literacy Week. For the past 18 years, Agricultural Literacy Week has been celebrated by New York Agriculture in the Classroom (NYAITC) as a way to promote agricultural literacy and learning to students across New York State. With the help of county-based coordinators, thousands of volunteers visit schools to read an agriculture-themed book to elementary students each year.

During her visit to Mrs. Meiss' third grade classroom, Assemblywoman Buttenschon read the book "Farmer Will Allen and the Growing Table" by Jacqueline Briggs Martin and spoke to students about agriculture – a topic with which she has personal experience with. In addition to being a member of both the NYS Assembly Committees on Agriculture and Education, Assemblywoman Buttenschon is also the owner of the Buttenschon Christmas Tree Farm in Marcy.

The 2022 Agricultural Literacy Week book of the year, "Farmer Will Allen and the Growing Table" follows a former basketball star and problem solver who uses innovative urban farming methods to highlight the importance of healthy, homegrown food and civic engagement. After hearing the story, students from Mrs. Meiss, Mrs. Countryman and Mr. McGowan's classes were able to ask Assemblywoman Buttenschon questions about agriculture and her experience with her own Christmas tree farm.

Assemblywoman Buttenschon presented Mrs. Meiss' class with their own copy of the book and a New York State Assembly Citation for their participation in Agricultural Literacy Week.

Shoot for the Stars ... You'll Land on the Moon!



A recent Whitesboro graduate, Reid Burkdorf (Class of 2019), and his University team have been selected by NASA to present at the agency's Revolutionary Aerospace Systems Concepts – Academic Linkage (RASC-AL) competition. They will be joined by 14 additional undergraduate and graduate finalist teams to present their concepts to NASA and aerospace industry leaders at a forum in June.

Reid Burkdorf is part of the Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University team, which will be presenting their project SALVARE - Self-Acquisition of Liquid propellant Versatile Arsenal of Resources Endeavour. The RASC-AL has a long history of encouraging students to bring fresh ideas compatible with NASA's space exploration program. These student-made projects were selected due to the potential they have to advance deep space missions. The Whitesboro Central School District is extremely proud of our alumni and the groundbreaking work they continue to accomplish!

2022-2023 PROPOSED BUDGET

The District budget vote and Board of Education election will be held on **May 17, 2022, from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m.** at Parkway, Deerfield and Marcy Schools. If the proposed budget is passed by voters, it will be enacted for the 2022-23 school year. If not passed, the Board of Education can:

- Place a revised budget before district residents for a vote.
- Place the same budget before district residents for a vote.
- Immediately adopt a contingency budget.

If a contingency budget is adopted, only ordinary contingent expenses necessary to provide the minimum services legally required to operate and maintain school buildings and the educational program, preserve the property of the district and ensure the health and safety of students and staff, are budgeted. Additionally, when on a contingency budget, school districts must charge fees to non-district organizations that use school district facilities, including groups such as little league, biddy basketball, boy scouts and girl scouts.

PROPOSITIONS ON THE BALLOT

THE BALLOT WILL READ AS FOLLOWS:

Be It Resolved, that the District voters be asked to approve the following propositions at the Special District Meeting held in conjunction with the Annual Election on May 17, 2022:

Budget Proposition

Shall the budget for the school year 2022-2023, in the amount of \$77,027,772, as adopted by the Whitesboro Central School District Board of Education, be approved, and a tax levied upon the taxable property of the school district to raise the same?

Proposition 1 – School Buses

Resolved that the Board of Education of the Whitesboro Central School District is hereby authorized to undertake the acquisition of two (2) 66-passenger diesel school buses at an estimated maximum cost of \$146,550 each, two (2) 66-passenger school buses at an estimated maximum cost of \$72,500, and one (1) 30-passenger school bus at an estimated maximum cost of \$72,500, and one (1) wheelchair bus at an estimated maximum cost of \$86,500, all at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$722,500, less trade-in value, if any, and that such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the School District as may be necessary not to exceed \$722,500 shall be issued, or the School District may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the school district to finance the purchase in that method.

Proposition 2 – Capital Reserve Fund

The Whitesboro Central School District, is hereby authorized to establish a capital reserve fund for the construction of improvements, reconstruction of, and additions to various School District facilities, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery, apparatus, appurtenances, and site and incidental improvements and expenses in connection therewith, at an ultimate amount of \$10,000,000, plus accrued interest and investment earnings with a probable term of ten (10) years, the source of the funding being the District's available funds balance, State aid reimbursement to the District on account of capital projects, such other monies as the voters may direct, and other legally available funds of the District in an amount determined by the Board of Education up to the maximum authorized amount.

It is important to note that the proposition to establish a Capital Reserve allows the District to create a "savings" account for future capital projects; the proposition is not asking taxpayers to fund the account, and has no impact on the 2022-2023 budget or taxes. Should funds become available in future years, the District can make deposits into the account, which will later be utilized to fund future capital improvement projects with little or no impact to local taxpayers, as is the case with our current capital project. The maximum amount that could be deposited into this Capital Reserve is \$10M (cumulative), over a ten-year period.


ANTICIPATED REVENUES AND PROPOSED EXPENDITURES



EXPENDITURES

2022-23 Annual Capital Outlay Project

The capital outlay account is an account funded for the purpose of completing specific capital improvements within the 2022-2023 budget year. This allows us to perform the necessary work to our facilities independent of a capital project while generating 100% of the building aid in the following year (unlike the 15-20 year aid reimbursement payment schedule of a typical capital project). Our building aid ratio for 2022-2023 is 86%, meaning next year's expenditure of \$100,000 will be followed by building aid revenue the following year in the approximate amount of \$86,000. The plan for next year's work includes replacing 16 interior doors to the high school auditorium.

While the tax levy limit is often referred to as a "2% tax cap", each district is required to annually calculate their specific tax levy limit in accordance with a formula that accounts for individual district conditions and variables. For districts across New York State, this calculation rarely results in a limit of exactly 2%; calculated rates can vary as high as 6% or more. For Whitesboro CSD, the proposed tax levy increase of 2.59% does **not** exceed the tax levy limit, and requires a simple majority of votes for approval.




