t was the first weekend in October 2023, and the campus was buzzing with homecoming activities and the third annual Athletic Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony - it was the perfect time to honor and celebrate the memorable spirit of the 1990 Raider Cheer Team. Although the members never cheered in the Gardner Gymnasium, their team presence was immediately felt as they pushed tables together in the front row to reunite and do what they did best: cheer for the Hall inductees.

There is no doubt how these Raiders clinched the Class C State Cheerleading Championship in 1990. Just as Head Coach Kathy Quimby Harmon '74 mentored their floor routines, Kathy retook center stage to highlight and honor the team's accomplishments as champions. Proudly, Kathy shared the team's preparation journey for that championship competition, including years of summer camp participation, endless practices, and the steady build of school spirit!

The Team was unique in its preparation, as their competitors were having their routines choreographed, these Raiders were determined to create their own routines as they continued to score high in creativity. Partner stunts proved challenging in these routines, so boys were added to the team for the first time. Keith Labonte '90 and Eric Tuck '90 were instrumental in providing the strength

to the team necessary for synchronized and difficult routines. There was still one more important goal for this team and its success, and that was incorporating cheers that encouraged crowd participation, creating undeniable spectator excitement. Coach Harmon fondly reflected on these moments, "School spirit was a continued upward climb. A high basket toss, 'High Flying Jessica,' added to the excitement, causing Athletic Director Mr. Gardner to tell me to put a lid on it!"

In February 1990, at the Bangor Auditorium, the Team performed at its peak, winning first place out of forty-one competing cheer teams and becoming state champions. It is an unforgettable memory for fourteen Raiders, and their induction into the Hall of Fame will be a historical memory forever.



For over three and a half decades, Dr. Gaddis '65 has tirelessly served Washington Academy, leaving an indelible mark that resonates in the hearts of many.


His relationship with Washington Academy began as a student, graduating in 1965. Dr. Gaddis' time at the Academy was marked not only by academic excellence but also by active engagement and leadership roles that foreshadowed his future commitment to the school and the East Machias community. As a student, he held positions such as class treasurer and president, exemplifying his early dedication to service and leadership. He also participated as a Raider athlete on championship cross country and basketball teams.

Dr. Gaddis' commitment to Washington Academy extended beyond his student years. He made significant contributions as an alum, serving on the Board of Trustees from 1987 to 2023. His achievements, both as a studentathlete and a dedicated trustee, are a testament to Dr. Gaddis' commitment to his alma mater. Throughout his life, he embodied the school's motto from his graduating class of 1965: "With fond memories of the past, we launch steadily ahead."

His passion for service was not only demonstrated by his work on the Board but also through his active involvement in the community. Dr. Gaddis has been known as a beloved family doctor in the community before recently closing his practice. As a practicing physician, he served as the WA school physician, providing school physicals to students. In 2016, he was recognized by the WA Board of Trustees with the Distinguished Community Service Award.

Mr. McBrine states, "Dr. Gaddis loves Washington Academy and cares very much for the people in our community. In my early years as head of school, it was not unusual for him to stop in during his lunch break, even though he had a hectic schedule, to see how I was doing. Even though he is no longer on the Board, he continues to stop in to offer help and encouragement for the school he loves."

The Team had a regular season record of 5-1 and a 2-0 playoff season record. The Raiders beat the Gladiators of Berlin, New Hampshire, for the league championship.

The 2024-25 school year will see Raider football returning to state high school competition in the small school eight-man competition. Washington Academy hasn't played at this level since 2019. The season will consist of eight regular season games and two playoff games. Athletic Director Justin Crosman '95 remarks about the return to the Maine Principals' Association competition, "Since WA is the only school in Washington County offering football as a sport, I am happy to have the program playing MPA teams as it continues to develop competitively."

The first home game is preseason and scheduled for August 24 against the Ellsworth Eagles.

2024 National Merit Finalist



The National Merit Scholarship Program named Washington Academy senior Dakoda Davis as a semifinalist at the beginning of the school year. The 69th annual National Merit Scholarship Program announced 16,000 semifinalists who will continue to the competition for 7,140 National Merit Scholarships worth \$28 million.

Dakoda is a well-rounded and engaged Washington Academy student. He is very active in Washington Academy student leadership as a class president, student council copresident, and a three-year member of the prestigious National Honor Society. Dakoda has been a high honor student throughout his years at Washington Academy. In the summer of 2023, he spent a week at the Consider Engineering Program at the University of Maine at Orono. Consider Engineering is a competitive program, with only half the applicants considered. Dakoda was one of two Washington County students chosen to participate. He also spent an additional week attending the University's Cohen Institute High School Leadership Program, honing his leadership skills and passion for civics.

Dakoda has recently been announced as the Class of 2024 Valedictorian and selected as a National Merit Scholarship Finalist. He is now eligible for 2024 National Merit Scholarship Award consideration.

When Dakoda isn't excelling in the classroom or being a student leader, he is the captain and runs with the Raider cross country and track teams. He is a four-year Raider athlete. He plans to attend the University of Maine (Orono) to pursue an engineering degree in the fall.




