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# PHSD Facilities Projects

Here's a snapshot of the current and upcoming facilities projects at Pleasant Hill School District (PHSD):

## HIGH SCHOOL FORESTRY BUILDING REMODEL

The forestry building is being remodeled into a functional Agriculture Science Classroom. Work is already underway and progressing smoothly.

## MIDDLE / HIGH SCHOOL LIBRARY RENOVATION

PHSD is in the design phase of renovating the middle and high school library, aiming for completion by September 2025. The renovation will likely include new floors, lighting, windows, HVAC systems, paint, furniture, and a redesign of the space.

## HIGH SCHOOL GYMNASIUM SEISMIC REHABILITATION

The historic arched high school gymnasium is set for seismic rehabilitation. PHSD is set to receive the Seismic Rehabilitation Grant which is a State of Oregon competitive grant program that provides funding for the seismic rehabilitation of critical public buildings, particularly public schools and emergency services facilities. The proposal request will be developed over the 2024 summer, with the design process occurring next school year and construction slated for the summer of 2025.

## NEW EDUCATIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE (DEC) FORMING TO START IN THE FALL

In 2021, the Oregon Legislature passed Senate Bill 732 amending Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 328.542 and 329.095. This legislation requires each school district to establish an Educational Equity Advisory Committee (EEAC), also known as the District Equity Committee (DEC).

DECs are designed to help school leaders identify factors that support or hinder the success of students historically excluded or underserved by Oregon's educational systems. These committees advise school boards and superintendents on the educational impacts of policy decisions, district-wide climate, issues affecting underserved student groups, and other relevant topics to fully assess student experiences. DEC's provide a vital mechanism for engaging community voices and advancing equity in Oregon's school districts.

In the coming months, we will share additional information on how to get involved in this committee. The committee is set to start by September 2025.

# UPDATES ON THE SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND OBLIGATION


Bonds are essential for funding buildings, materials, textbooks, and computers. Typically, school districts use bonds to finance major construction projects, such as building new schools and upgrading existing ones. A school construction bond is essentially a loan that the school district takes out and repays over time using revenues from local property taxes.

The funds from bonds can be allocated for high-cost projects, including new construction, property purchases, remodeling, large maintenance or repair projects, furnishing, equipment buildings, technology upgrades, curriculum, and classroom improvements. However, bonds cannot be used for operating costs, salaries, retirement benefits or other expenses.

In 2012, PHSD sold \$17.9 million worth of General Obligation Bonds, using those funds, in part, to construct new wings at the Pleasant Hill Middle and High School, thanks to the support and election approval of Pleasant Hill community voters.

Below is a current snapshot of the remaining bond obligations for PHSD.

## 2024-2025 SCHOOL YEAR REGISTRATION & KINDERGARTEN INFORMATION

It is also that time of year to begin preparing for the 2024-2025 school year. The process begins with families verifying their student's information in Synergy, our student information system. We are asking all of our families to complete the Verification of Information, formerly known as Spring Registration, by visiting <https://www.pleasanthill.k12.or.us/registration/returning-students>.

If you have a student who will be attending Pleasant Hill Elementary as a new student in the fall, please register your student by visiting <https://www.pleasanthill.k12.or.us/registration/new-student-registration>.

If we can be of any assistance, please call our office at (541) 736-0400.

In addition, online registration for kindergarten students is also open. Any Pleasant Hill School District family who has a child who will be 5 on or before September 1, 2024, may enroll your student for kindergarten by visiting <https://sites.google.com/pleasanthill.k12.or.us/pheskindergarten/>.

Before your child may officially start school the first week of September, we will need you to provide our school with:

- Birth Certificate for the student(s)
- Immunization records
- Proof of Residency consisting of:
  - Electric bill with your name and address listed;
  - Lease/rental agreement; or
  - Mortgage statement

You are welcome to upload these documents as part of the online registration process or bring them directly to the school office.

We will be implementing Kinder staggered start this coming fall. Staggered start provides an opportunity for teachers to introduce the rituals and routines of the classroom plus time to get to know your student so they can create balanced environments to better meet the needs of each child.

Kinder families will be assigned to start either Wednesday, September 4, 2024, or Thursday, September 5, 2024, to attend school. Students will not attend on Friday, September 6, 2024. On Friday, once the classes have been finalized you will receive a call from the teacher your student will be working with for the 2024-25 school year. All students will report to their assigned classroom on Monday, September 9, 2024.

You will receive a postcard about 2 weeks prior to the start of school letting you know which day your student will be attending, providing you time to plan for childcare if needed. If a student registers after post cards are mailed, we will call you letting you know which date your student will attend that week.

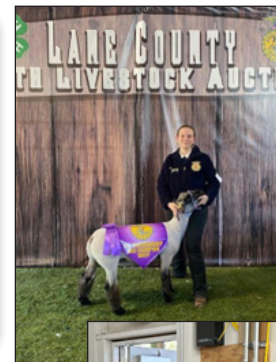

# Student Safety Notice: Harm Reduction

Dear Parents and Guardians of Pleasant Hill Students,

Short-acting opioid antagonists such as naloxone (commercial name Narcan) are medications designed to quickly reverse the effects of opioids in the body. They bind to the opioid receptors in the brain, displacing any opioids present and blocking their effects. These antagonists are typically used in emergency situations, such as opioid overdose, to rapidly restore normal breathing and consciousness. The purpose of short-acting opioid antagonists include:

## 1. OVERDOSE REVERSAL:

The primary purpose of short-acting opioid antagonists is to reverse the life-threatening effects of opioid overdose. Opioids, such as heroin, fentanyl, or prescription painkillers, can suppress breathing and lead to respiratory failure, coma, or death. Administering an opioid antagonist promptly can counteract these effects and restore normal breathing, potentially saving the person's life.

## 2. EMERGENCY TREATMENT:

Short-acting opioid antagonists are used in emergency medical settings, such as hospitals and ambulance services, to treat opioid overdose quickly and effectively. Time is crucial in such situations, and these antagonists provide a rapid response to counteract the overdose effects.

## 3. PREVENTIVE MEASURES:

In some cases, short-acting opioid antagonists may be prescribed as a preventive measure in high-risk situations, such as when individuals with a history of opioid abuse are prescribed opioid painkillers. Providing access to these antagonists alongside opioids can help mitigate the risk of overdose.

## 4. RESEARCH AND CLINICAL STUDIES:

Short-acting opioid antagonists are also used in research settings to study opioid addiction, overdose, and potential treatments. Clinical studies may investigate the efficacy and safety of different antagonist formulations or delivery methods.

Examples of short-acting opioid antagonists include naloxone (Narcan) and naltrexone. Naloxone is particularly well-known for its ability to rapidly reverse opioid overdose effects and is commonly used by emergency medical personnel, law enforcement officers, and bystanders trained in opioid overdose response. Naltrexone is also used in the treatment of opioid addiction but has a longer duration of action compared to naloxone. These medications play a crucial role in addressing the opioid crisis and saving lives threatened by opioid overdose.

In an emergency involving a suspected opioid overdose, the risks of administering a short-acting opioid antagonist, such as naloxone, to an individual must be weighed against the risks of not administering it.

The risks of administering a short-acting opioid antagonist include:

## 1. PRECIPITATING WITHDRAWAL SYMPTOMS:

Administration of naloxone can rapidly reverse the effects of opioids, potentially causing the individual to experience withdrawal symptoms such as agitation, nausea, vomiting, sweating, and increased heart rate. While withdrawal symptoms are uncomfortable, they are generally not life-threatening.

## 2. POTENTIAL FOR AGITATION OR VIOLENCE:

Some individuals may become agitated or hostile upon awakening from opioid overdose reversal, particularly if they were using opioids in combination with other substances. This could pose risks to both the individual and bystanders.

## 3. UNDERLYING MEDICAL CONDITIONS:

There may be underlying medical conditions or complications that are not immediately apparent, and administering naloxone could exacerbate these conditions or complicate subsequent medical treatment.

On the other hand, the risks of not administering a short-acting opioid antagonist are far more severe and may include:

## 1. RESPIRATORY DEPRESSION AND RESPIRATORY ARREST:

Opioids can cause severe respiratory depression, leading to respiratory arrest and ultimately death if left untreated. Naloxone rapidly reverses opioid-induced respiratory depression, restoring normal breathing and preventing fatal outcomes.

## 2. LOSS OF CONSCIOUSNESS:

Opioid overdose can result in loss of consciousness and coma, which can lead to aspiration, airway obstruction, and other complications. Administering naloxone can rapidly restore consciousness, allowing for proper airway management and medical assessment.

## 3. BRAIN DAMAGE OR DEATH:

Prolonged lack of oxygen due to opioid-induced respiratory depression can result in brain damage or death. Time is critical in such situations, and delaying administration of naloxone increases the risk of irreversible harm.

In summary, while there are potential risks associated with administering a short-acting opioid antagonist in an emergency situation, the immediate dangers of untreated opioid overdose far outweigh these risks.

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# Spring Band Activities

This spring has been filled with amazing musical experiences for our band students. On April 13th we hosted the 47th annual Pleasant Hill Jazz Festival. Fifty ensembles, over eight hundred students, local professionals, guest artists and judges, and our esteemed Grammy-winning guest artist Esperanza Spalding made for a very special day. To cap it off, Solar Jazz made it into finals and placed first at the end of the night in the single "A" division. Two years in a row! Thank you to everyone that attended and helped out, it was one for the record books.

Directly following that, we took over forty jazz band and choir students to Southern California to attend the Fullerton Jazz Festival at Fullerton College. This was a fantastic two days of performing, listening, and learning from established music educators from outside of our region. Following this we spent a couple days at the Disney theme parks and had a great time team building and creating lasting life-long memories.

Following this, our Wind Ensemble earned their first trip to the OSAA Band Championships since 2016. The students performed very well and ended up placing fifth in the state for the 3A division. Please congratulate a band student when you see one next.

# Student Safety

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Administering naloxone promptly can save lives by reversing respiratory depression and preventing potentially fatal outcomes.

In our school district, Pleasant Hill Elementary, Pleasant Hill Middle and Pleasant Hill High School are equipped with short-acting opioid antagonists, such as naloxone, and have access to the necessary medical supplies and training to administer these medications on site in the event of an opioid overdose emergency. This proactive measure ensures the safety and well-being of students, staff, and visitors by providing prompt and potentially life-saving intervention in cases of opioid overdose within designated school premises.

In the event of an emergency where a student appears to be unconscious and experiencing symptoms consistent with an opioid overdose, a representative of the school, such as a trained staff member or school nurse, is authorized to administer a short-acting opioid antagonist, such as naloxone. This proactive measure is in place to ensure the safety and well-being of students, providing immediate intervention to potentially reverse the effects of opioid overdose and prevent further harm.
