Staying Well During a Pandemic

families. Being hurled into completely unknown territory - some dealing with the stresses of a lost job, sick loved ones, anxiety, and more - our district quickly partnered with **Lyndsay Morris**, Founder of Generation Wellness and BHHS alumni, to address these important aspects.

Wellness is the foundation for learning and thriving. With our commitment to staff, student and community wellness, we are utilizing a phase-in system to provide ongoing resources, utilizing grant funds, as we endure the challenges of the pandemic:

Phase 1 – Staff Wellness: All of our staff members have access to Workplace Wellness Academy, an online course, as well as Zoom

reflection calls. We have received positive feedback and remarks of appreciation.

Phase 2 – Family Wellness: All families will soon have access to the Family Wellness Toolkit which includes morning messages, social/ emotional mini videos, audio

relaxations, sample plans, and more.

Phase 3 – New School Year Preparation:

Every staff member will experience a one-day Generational Wellness training at the beginning of the school year to set staff and students up for success when we re-start school.

Lyndsay states, "Well-being is not a program, it's a practice. Providing tools and creating space for students, staff, and families to practice these tools is the key to sustainable change. I'm excited to be a part of TSD's holistic approach to wellness, especially during this time. Coming back to the District that supported me from kindergarten on has been a dream come true."

Four Tumwater Schools Receive State Recognition Awards

The state recently recognized four Tumwater School District schools for growth, closing achievement gaps, and demonstrated achievement in specific areas during the 2018-19 school year. We celebrate and congratulate the staff and students at:

- East Olympia Elementary growth for students who receive special education
- Michael T. Simmons Elementary growth for students identifying as Asian
- Tumwater Hill Elementary closing gaps for one or more student groups at a targeted support school
- Tumwater Middle School growth for students identifying as Black and students who are English learners

Superintendent **Sean Dotson** states, "We are thankful for the ongoing commitment and hard work of our staff, teachers, and students that have resulted in these honors. Our staff continue to work together with a focus on helping all students grow. It is exciting to see Tumwater's commitment to improving educational equity is making a difference."

Congratulations to the 520 graduates that will receive their diplomas from Black Hills High School, Cascadia High School, and Tumwater High School! We acknowledge that the loss of events that are usually considered "rites of passage" ... prom, awards assemblies, senior sports nights, graduation ... have been difficult for our seniors. We are fortunate to have a multitude of creative staff members, students, and families that have come together to create new and innovative ways to celebrate these resilient students.

In April, our high schools (along with others in the state) turned on stadium lights at 8:20 pm (20:20 military time) to show support for and honor the Class of 2020! Yearbook staff encouraged students to continue with the tradition of special prom invitations (prom-posals), to dress up and take photos to share for the yearbook. Seniors at BHHS and THS received a "senior sign" to be placed at their home. Staff are looking for new and meaningful ways to present honors/awards in place of an assembly. High schools provided a day for seniors to pick up their caps, gowns, and celebrate their accomplishments with signing opportunities.

The results of a survey sent to seniors and their families show that an in-person graduation is very important to our community. A Graduation Task Force made up of students, parents, and staff has been meeting to make plans for a graduation that can honor their desires while following state orders and sound practices to protect community health. We will announce formal plans as soon as they are made.

Tech Team Responds to Covid Closures

With the quick change to how we are doing school and business at this time, here is a glimpse of how most of our meetings take place via **Zoom**, one of the platforms we are utilizing for classroom instruction and checkins, team meetings, School Board meetings, leadership meetings, and much more. Our Technology Team discusses the next steps for providing resources to our staff and students to enable continuous student learning. Since March, this team, along with building staff, have deployed over 1,600 Chromebooks to staff and students (elementary and middle school). Prior to the closure, one of our middle schools and both traditional high schools had 1-1 technology signed out to students. We are fortunate to have such a skilled and dedicated team guiding the technology efforts of our district!

across the school parking lot to make personal connections with students.

I have witnessed my own children participating in Zoom meetings with classes, asking questions and hearing from others about their learning. Teachers are using platforms to continue teaching and supporting their students that some of them have never used before - video, Google Classroom, and a variety of other online tools. They are providing paper packets to those who are unable to access technology. To stay connected with students, staff have made home visits to drop off materials, used phone calls, mail, and every bit of their creativity to let students know they care. As time goes on, we are getting better at this, and we will do whatever it takes to keep students learning. That said, we are all excited for the day when we can have students back in our classrooms and learning in the ways we know are most effective.

Beyond day-to-day teaching and learning, there are several topics that are equally important as we navigate this uncharted territory:

Graduation: We have approximately 520 seniors in our district who have been unable to enjoy some of the traditional experiences that would be considered "rites of passage." I am incredibly proud of our students and the resiliency they have shown. While events such as prom, awards assemblies, and more cannot take place in their regular form given the extended stay at home order, we really wanted to hear from our seniors and families on the topic of graduation. We asked them to participate in a ThoughtExchange survey and learned that families want us to make every effort to hold an in-person graduation, even if that means delaying the event into the summer. A Graduation Task Force of students, parents, and staff representatives has met to make plans for graduation that honor the

feedback from our community while also aligning with state orders and sound practices to protect community health. Graduation plans will be communicated to seniors and families as they are made

Last Day of School: To recover some lost learning time and to meet state expectations, our school year has been extended by five days to June 19th. Students are expected to continue to participate in continuous learning to the best of their ability during this time.

Thank you for your patience and understanding as we have made a monumental transition to continue teaching and supporting students during this closure. I promise you that we will continue to work hard, both within our district and with community partners, to keep improving our ability to provide the best quality education possible this spring. We don't know yet what options will be available in the fall, but we are looking ahead and preparing to offer safe, high quality educational options that will allow us to respond to a wide variety of circumstances.
