to the Green Bay Area Public Schools Head Start Program

Head Start is a federal program for preschool aged children from low-income families that began in 1965 as part of the War on Poverty. Children who attend Head Start participate in a variety of educational activities. They also receive free medical and dental care, in-home support, transportation to and from school, have healthy meals and snacks, and enjoy a variety of activities in a safe setting. Research has shown that every child born into poverty who attends Head Start has a greater opportunity for school and lifelong success than a child without such an experience. Head Start has been a part of the Green Bay Area Public School District (GBAPS) since 1967.

The 2021-22 school year began with in person classes at both the Head Start Learning Center and Jefferson Head Start. Jefferson Head Start opened in the fall of 2020-21 with classes being held virtually, and students didn't return to the building until March 2021. After a year of virtual learning during COVID, it was exciting to see students in person again. It was another successful school year, and everyone was happy to be able to interact in person again.

All Head Start programs are under a vaccine mandate which means all staff working with Head Start students must be vaccinated. The health and safety of our students remains a top priority, and we were happy to be able to provide a level of confidence among our families that we were doing everything we could to

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protect our students and keep them safe and healthy.


Preparing Children for Kindergarten

Head Start was created to help children from low income families prepare for success as they enter kindergarten and for a lifetime of learning that will follow. We do this using a developmentally appropriate preschool curriculum aligned with the Head Start Outcomes Framework, Wisconsin Early Learning Standards, Common Core Standards and our own District Content Essential Documents.

- We track the work we do with children using a Preschool Assessment System. This includes a rating scale that translates a child's learning into measurable outcomes (see figure below).
- We discuss the results with the child's parents at least three times a year.
- We use data to guide instruction in the integrated curriculum.
- We use data to allocate training dollars for continuous improvement.
- We focus on building children's skills, including the areas of Language and Literacy, Math,
 Cognitive Development, Physical Development, Social/Emotional Development and Approaches to Learning.
- We share information with the child's future four-year-old and five-year-old kindergarten teacher to enable a smooth transition from Head Start to Elementary School.
- We create School Readiness goals in an effort to guarantee that children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and schools are ready for children.

School Readiness Goals

The Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act requires Head Start programs to establish school readiness goals. Using the Creative Curriculum and Teaching Strategies Gold,, the Green Bay Head Start program developed the following goals for the 2021-2022 school year:



Social-Emotional Development:

• Children will participate cooperatively and constructively in group situations (Follows limits and expectations).

Motor Development:

• Children will demonstrate fine motor strength and coordination (Uses fingers and hands).

Cognitive Development:

• Children will demonstrate positive approaches to learning by solving problems (Identifies and names letters).

Literacy:

- Children will demonstrate knowledge of the alphabet by identifying and naming letters.
- Children will demonstrate knowledge of the alphabet by using letter sound knowledge. (Uses letter-sound knowledge).

Mathematics:

 Children will use number concepts and operations. (Identifies numerals).



Family Activities

Each month we offer a variety of opportunities for family involvement and participation. During the 2021-22 school year all activities were held virtually with the exception of the last Men/Kids and Supper event in June which was in person. Activities include a Community Resource Fair, Men/Kids and Supper, Cooking Classes with University of Wisconsin Extension FoodWise Nutrition Educators, Community Resource Fair, and Scrapbooking; as well as Federally Mandated meetings such as Policy Council, Parent Committee and Health and Education Advisory Board. All activities give parents an opportunity to voice their opinion, learn new skills and meet other parents in a safe and nurturing environment.



Family Resource Center (Jefferson Head Start)

The Green Bay Area Public Schools Head Start program opened a Family Resource Center located at Jefferson Head Start. This facility provides meeting space, a childcare room, computer and laundry facilities for parents.

Volunteers

Head Start had 67 volunteers during the 2021-2022 school year. Of these volunteers, 26 were former or current Head Start parents. Volunteers must pass a criminal background check before volunteering with Head Start. While we are under a vaccine mandate, we have not had as many volunteers due to individuals having to show proof of vaccination.

Community Partnerships

Head Start programs take an active role in community planning to encourage cooperation and information sharing to improve community service delivery to our children and families. We work in partnership with many community service programs in Brown County to help create the best possible Head Start for the children and families we serve. We believe that every community's future is tied to the success of its children.



Child Health Services

Head Start programs must make a determination as to whether or not every child has an ongoing source of continuous, accessible healthcare. The results from the 2021-2022 school year were:

- 97% of children have an ongoing source of continuous and accessible routine, preventative and acute medical care.
- 43% are up-to-date on their annual physical examinations.
- 89% are up-to-date on all immunizations required for their age.
- 93% received professional dental examinations.
- 9% of staff received Mental Health Services for their students
- 49 children were diagnosed with a disability. 100% of these children received services.





Dental Services

Brown County Oral Health Partnership

The Brown County Oral Health Partnership (OHP) is a non-profit organization that provides comprehensive preventive and restorative dental care to children

in Brown County, including the Green Bay Area Public School District. OHP provides dental services to children that have Medical Assistance and to those that do not have any dental insurance as well as those that qualify for the Free or Reduced Lunch Program. Head Start children are provided dental services at school throughout the year; OHP participates in our classrooms, giving many children a dental screening during the school year. OHP also provides Head Start students with two fluoride applications yearly, if agreed upon by the parent/guardian. Fluoride treatments are important to help fight tooth decay as a child's teeth are developing. OHP plays a vital role in providing our Head Start children with dental services that are vital to their developing teeth.



Total enrollment of families throughout the year was 308.

- 57% received services under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)


Parent, Family, and Community Engagement (PFCE)
