## CHILD FIND

FDLRS Child Find Specialists, in coordination with school districts, locate young children who are potentially eligible for services under the Individual with Disabilities Act (IDEA). FDLRS Child Find provides diagnostic screening, placement coordination, training, and support to parents of young children who have or are at risk of developing disabilities.

# BEESS Portal to Professional Development Alternatives

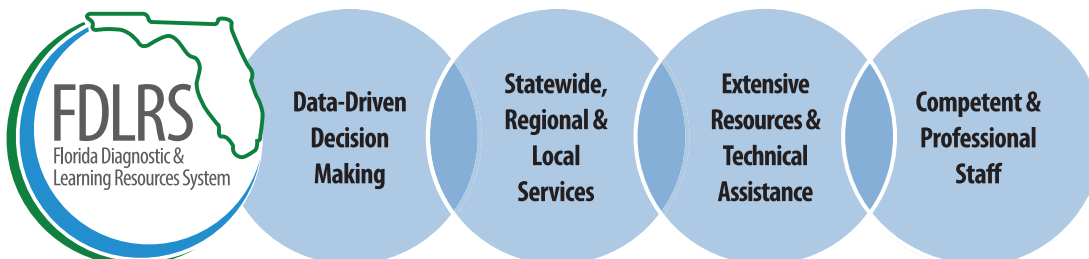
## An Online Professional Learning Program

FDLRS collaborates with BEESS to update content, facilitate PDA courses, and communicate with districts to apply inservice credits for educators.



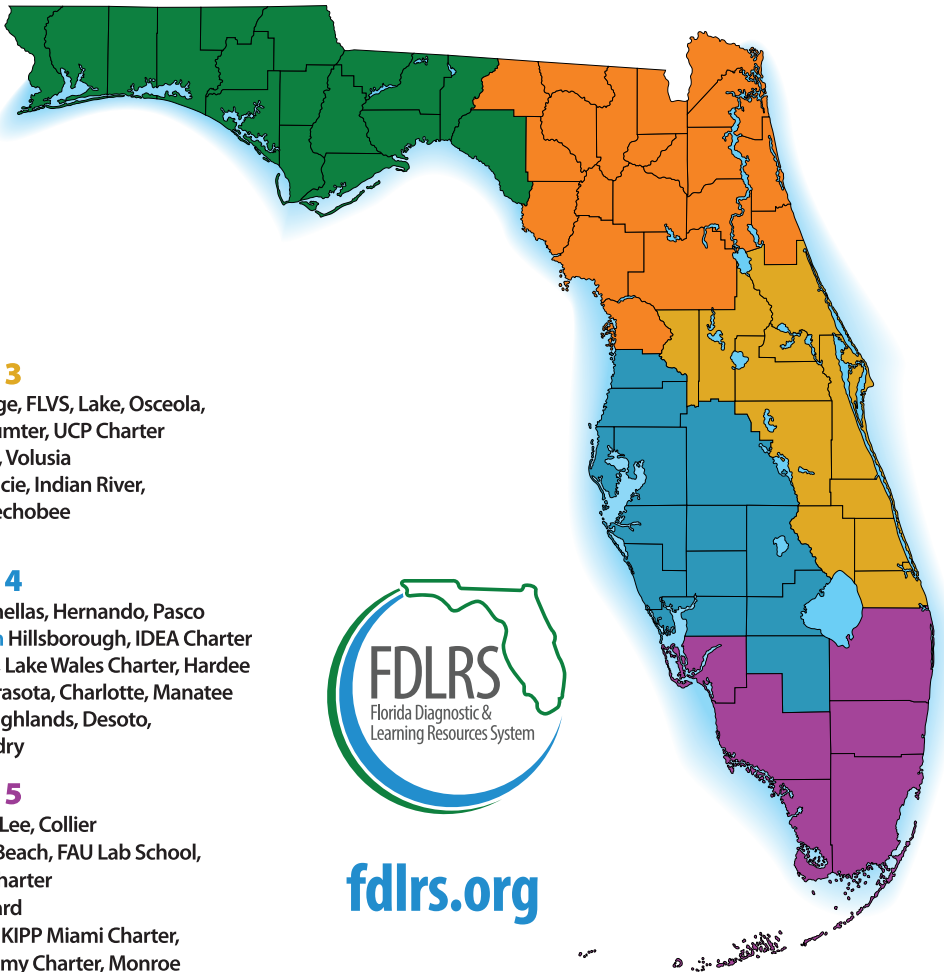

## FDLRS MULTIDISCIPLINARY CENTERS

There are six regional Florida Diagnostic and Learning Resources (FDLRS) Multidisciplinary Educational Services Centers in Florida that are funded by the State of Florida through the Department of Education, Bureau of Exceptional Education and Student Services (BEES), to serve Florida's at-risk children and youth, their families, and schools. They are a unique resource for students, families, and school districts providing multidisciplinary evaluation and consultation services for children and youth at-risk for or identified as having complex medical, educational, socio-emotional, or behavioral problems. The centers also provide support services and training for educators and other professionals.



## FDLRS SPECIALIZED CENTERS



Florida Instructional Materials Center for the Visually Impaired (FIMC-VI) is a statewide resource center designed to assist schools in obtaining specialized materials for students with visual impairments.

The Resource Materials and Technology Center for the Deaf/Hard of Hearing (RMTCD/HH) is a statewide discretionary project that supports the education of students who are Deaf/Hard of Hearing in Florida.
