It's important to fill out your <u>FAFSA</u> and <u>CSS Profile</u>, to receive federal financial aid such as student loans and grants. Universities and colleges also rely on this information to determine eligibility for school-provided financial aid packages and offerings including work study, scholarships, and more. 2024-2025 FAFSA® Overview for Parents/Guardians

Drug overdose deaths in the United States continue to rise. Drug overdoses are killing young Americans in unprecedented numbers: The monthly total rose from 31 in July 2019 to 87 in May 2021, the period with the most recent data. Adolescents' overdose

deaths differ from adults' in terms of gender, race and ethnicity as well as the drugs causing these fatalities.
