Every single site uses a Meta Pixel, a tracking tool that silently collects and transmits information to Facebook as users browse the web. They are embedded on websites across the internet

allowing businesses and organizations to target their customers on Facebook with ads. However an investigation found that dozens of popular websites target kids from kindergarten to college, including sites that students are all but required to use if they want to participate in school activitites or apply to college.

When Naomi's daughter was 14, she had her first encounter with cannabis gummies, purchased with a fake ID at one of several unlicensed smoke shops in their New York City neighborhood. The



candy she ate contained at least 50 milligrams of the psychoactive compound <u>THC</u> – well above the typical recreational range of 2.5 to 10 mg – and it prompted severe vomiting and put her, if only briefly, in a near-comatose state.
