Our Goals

Primary Goal

To deliver a USCSD quality educational experience to all USC families, in-school and at home, in a way that minimizes exposure and disruption to the greatest extent possible.

Key Components

- Safe schools for students and staff
- Choice for families
- High-quality education (in-school or remote) with opportunity to transition seamlessly
- Emphasis on social-emotional well-being

We are committed to a full-return as soon as conditions permit, and we will continue to provide the option to remain fully remote.

We will monitor and adjust on a weekly basis.

Our Recommendation

Implement phase approach to move toward 5-day in-person option

- 1. Phase I: 2-day hybrid in-person learning option ends on Nov. 13
- 2. Phase II: 4-day (M,T,R,F) expanded hybrid in-person learning option begins on Nov. 16
 - a. Maintain Wednesday as a full remote learning day
- 3. Phase III: 5-day in-person learning option begins on Jan. 19

Key Points:

- Retaining full remote learning option through end of the school year
- Finalizing details of Phase II plan based upon commitment #s
- Implementing all changes for Phases II and III contingent upon changing, present conditions

In-Person Learning Schedules by Phase

What Will be Different in Phases II & III?

Key Differences

- There will be a reduction in physical distancing for students to less than six feet in most instructional spaces, excluding cafeterias and other areas where students may be eating.
 - We will maintain the greatest distance possible depending on class size and composition...estimated range
 4-6 feet (Average classroom is between 4- 4 1/2 feet in desk spacing measured from center to center).
 - Staff desks must always remain at a minimum of 6 feet distance from student desks.
- Mitigation continues to be layered.
 - No mask breaks will occur during classes.
 - Mask breaks will be provided with 6 feet of physical distance.
 - Opportunities for mask breaks will exist throughout the school day, but not in classrooms.
- Buses will have more students.
 - Masking and cleaning will remain in place.
- The Allegheny County Health Department (ACHD) is unlikely to require the quarantining of entire classrooms.
- We are asking for a 9-week commitment (if selecting remote).
 - If selecting remote, you may not be able to move to in-person during Phase II (2nd nine-weeks).
 - If selecting in-person, you can move to remote at any time.

Why four days and not five?

Safety of Students and Staff

- Providing 20% less contact
- Monitoring the virus on an on-going basis for an additional 9-weeks
- Updating of safety plan

Educational Considerations

- Allowing for development and implementation of a full-remote and a full-return teaching model
- Adjusting staff and student schedules
- Minimizing disruption for students and teachers during marking periods
- Retaining capability to transfer to remote temporarily if quarantine need arises

Operational Needs

- Updating transportation routes
- Considering all staffing implications
- Collaborating with labor groups
- Preparing facilities (furniture, food services)

Why is hybrid no longer an option in Phase II?

Consistency

- Three options would require significant re-sectioning (teacher changes and student schedule changes).
- Synthesis of data from the October survey shows that ~50% of all elementary students would change classroom teachers under a three-option model.

Staffing

- A third option would require significant increases in staffing. (Resulting in cost increases during a time where there is a significant shortage of qualified candidates.)
- Three options at the HS level would lead to the need for hybrid-only sections along with larger sections to maintain near status quo for staffing.


Complexity for Potential Contact Tracing

 Complicated scheduling could slow down the County's contact tracing process and result in avoidable closure.

Goal: Return to a 5-day in-person option

It is essential to ensure Phase II effectively leads into Phase III.

Key Factors in October for Phased Update

- 1. We need to balance mental health & academic needs with the impact of the pandemic.
- 2. Local data supports lower case counts in schools.
- 3. The PA Department of Health and ACHD have updated some processes.
- 4. Parent survey data consistently supports increasing in-person learning.

Mental Health Considerations

- Relationship between overall health and academic achievement
- Increased connectedness to peers and caring adults
- Access to preventative and responsive programming and services for all areas of student health



Key Points

- Low school transmission (Social gatherings is top cause for spread)
- Minimal difference in #s of COVID+ staff and students across instructional models
- Some closures due to challenges with contact tracing by the County





New COVID-19+ Cases in USCSD Sept. 8, 2020 - Oct. 23, 2020




ACHD determined all transmission occurred outside of schools.

COVID-19 Quarantines in USCSD Sept. 8, 2020 - Oct. 23, 2020




ACHD determined zero individuals have been quarantined as a result of in-school COVID+ close contacts.

Impact of CDC Clarification

Update from CDC 10/21/20:

"...15 <u>cumulative</u> minutes of exposure at a distance of 6 feet or less <u>can</u> be used as an operational definition for contact investigation."

Response from ACHD 10/22/20:

"[CDC update]...is a clarification, and we have interpreted it as consecutive, and will continue to do this based upon experiences to date."

**ACHD Rationale: Due to narrowness of rationale for update

USC Interpretation:

We are anticipating no change to close contact quarantining procedures.





Phase II & III: Health & Safety Updates



On-Going Mitigation Strategies


- Requiring daily health checks for staff and students
- Requiring quarantine after travel to high-risk areas
- Requiring "Return to School" process for any exposed/symptomatic individuals
- Collaborating with ACHD
- Using desk dividers
- Focusing on hand hygiene
- Ensuring high-frequency cleaning
- Emphasizing strategic movement of students in buildings
- Maintaining at least 6 feet of distancing for students while eating
- Planning carefully for any events/activities

Updating Mitigation Strategies

- Eliminating mask breaks within classrooms (will be conducted periodically in an alternate setting)
- Encouraging consistent seating charts by cohort when changing classrooms
- Articulating clear communication plan
- Spacing students as far apart as possible, but will likely be seated < 6
 feet apart in classrooms and on buses
- Reinforcing staff mitigation efforts on an ongoing basis to prevent staff-to-staff transmission (most identified spread in schools is occurring in staff eating/common areas, per ACHD)

Phase II & III: Facilities Updates






Social Distancing - Cafeteria *will remain at 6 feet in all eating areas*

Additional Phase II Mitigation Strategies: Facilities

- Providing auxiliary custodial support during second shift
- Reinforcing and utilizing CDC signage and other messages
- Running exhaust fans continuously to pull air out of the buildings
- Purchasing additional furniture to ensure maximum spacing



















Phase II & III: Instructional Updates



Phase II Updates to In-Person & Remote Offerings

Increase hybrid in-person learning option to 4-days while continuing:

- Full remote learning practices (will include robust synchronous and asynchronous instruction)
- Similar in-person instructional approaches and schedules to 2-day model
- Remote Wednesday schedule for in-person and remote learners


Modifications being considered:

- Adjusting schedules to ensure adherence to mitigation strategies regarding lunch & hallway traffic
- Continuing development of parent resources to support monitoring of student learning
- Minimizing section changes
