## **MISSION STATEMENT**

Granite Bay High School is a positive learning community of high expectations that prepares ALL students for postsecondary success.

### **SCHOOL & COMMUNITY**

A public suburban high school located in Granite Bay fifteen miles north of Sacramento. The attendance area serves the community of Granite Bay as well as the southeastern part of the city of Roseville. Situated on a beautiful campus featuring state-of-the-art technology, multiple athletic venues, and a 500-seat performing arts theater, the school is the centerpiece of the community. Economically, it is primarily a middle to upper-class community. The school, which serves grades 9-12, opened in the fall of 1996. It is one of six comprehensive high schools in the Roseville Joint Unified High School District.

### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ACADEMIC PROGRAM

- GBHS is a robust college & career preparatory focus providing students with multiple pathways to achieve secondary success.
- GBHS is on a four-by-four block schedule with the school year split into two 18-week terms.
- Students are enrolled in four classes each term.
- Each term is equivalent to two traditional semesters. Therefore, each semester-long course at GBHS is equal to a yearlong course in a traditional high school.

- GBHS students score higher on CAASPP
   English and math exams than Placer County and RJUHSD high schools.
- Students choose from 20 Advanced Placement courses
- GBHS is a part of the 1% of high schools nationwide who have true equity in the makeup of the students who are taking Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate classes
- GBHS hosts the International Baccalaureate program with 22 courses available.
- Four sequenced career pathways include industry-related and academic content standards to prepare students for success in postsecondary education, careers, and lifelong learning. Career Technical Education programs feature Engineering, Computer Science, Business, and Media Production Pathways.
- Based on state test scores, college readiness, graduation rates, SAT/ACT scores, and teach quality, Niche rates GBHS as the number one public high school in the Sacramento Metropolitan Region.
- COVID-19: Asynchronous instruction began March 16, 2020. Families chose C/NC or letter grades using a lowered grading scale. In Fall 2020, RJUHSD opened in distance learning; pre-pandemic grading resumed. In spring 2021, 200 students enrolled in a district virtual academy; 1775 were on campus or in hybrid. For 2020-2021, California mandated that all students have the option to convert traditional grades to C/NC.

### MARKING SYSTEM

Letter grades of A, B, C, D, and F are used. Cumulative GPA is computed using a 4.0+ scale and includes all work completed in grades 9 - 12. The transcript includes both weighted and unweighted GPA as well as a State GPA, which excludes freshman grades, as well as all P.E. grades. AP, IB, Honors, and some community college classes that are board-approved and transferable to the University of California are weighted. If a course is repeated, the higher grade is calculated into the GPA.
