Become a Youth Apprentice

1. Get prepared and apply to Youth Apprenticeship

Talk with your parent / guardian and consider completing a job shadow through the Pathway Partners Mentoring Program to explore your career interest. Then submit the Career-Based Learning application, available in the School Counseling Office or on the MHS website. Applications for this competitive program open in Quarter 3 of sophomore year and are accepted through Quarter 1 of senior year. The first round of applications may be sent to employers right after Spring Break, so students are encouraged to submit their application to Mrs. Fredrick before Spring Break.

2. Apply and interview with area employers in chosen industries

If accepted into YA, you are eligible to apply and interview at an area employer in the industry where you're looking to gain experience – MACCI can help!

3. Participate in all employer orientations and safety trainings

After a successful interview in this competitive program, you will complete online program registration, participate in an onsite orientation, and meet mentors.

4. Participate in regular progress reviews

Complete your industry specific YA requirements as you work on mastering skills from the On-the-Job Learning (OJL) Guide.

5. Complete industry specific classroom and worksite YA requirements

Once all your requirements are complete, receive your Certificate of Occupational Proficiency from WI Department of Workforce Development.

Level One

- Junior / Senior Year
- Minimum 450 work hours
- 1 HS / 3 college credits of related instruction
- OJL Guide competencies

Level Two

- Junior and Senior Year
- Minimum 900 work hours
- 2 HS / 6 college credits of related instruction
- OJL Guide competencies
