1. Call to Order

a. President's Report

i. Correspondence

Head of School Sandford highlighted various letters for employees whose status changed as they retired, resigned, or reduced their hours. Also included were letters congratulating award winners, many letters of condolence, a letter from a student at Woodstock Middle School who would like to take an American Sign Language class when at WA, a letter to the WBOE Negotiating committee about future negotiations, a letter to the assessor for the Town of Woodstock, and a letter which listed capital projects at The Academy which was sent to the WBOE.

6. Woodstock Academy Administration Reports

a. Associate Head of School for Finance and Operations Report

i. 2021-2022—Budget Update

Associate Head of School for Finance and Operations Mike Susi reviewed the Profit and Loss Report, saying he was watching the food service, transportation, and utility line items, but doesn't expect to see a huge spike in the next four months. He anticipates another \$1.1M in grants to come in and believes the year will end on a positive. Inflation is pushing fuel, electricity, and food costs up dramatically. He thanked Bill Guillot for creating the format of the handout.

ii. Academy Building Restoration Update

Head of School Sandford said that although a contract was awarded, both lawyers were still tweaking the exact language of the agreement. Thanks to the efforts of the Executive, Finance, and B&G Committees, he expects the contract to be signed on Friday. The goal is to have all the funding and signed agreements in place by March 15. Associate Head of School Holly Singleton was thanked for her hard work organizing the emptying of the Academy Building along with the maintenance department.

iii. 2020-2021 Audit

Associate Head of School for Finance and Operations Susi shared that the Finance Committee has endorsed the 20-21 audit; it will be sent to the full Board for review later this week. Finance Committee Chair Paul Kelly noted that we have been pleased with the auditors for the last five years and that the audit went well.

i. February Update

Associate Head of School Holly Singleton reviewed her comprehensive February Updates handout with the Board. Her entire report is attached below the minutes. ii. Aquaponics Proposal Presentation

Grade 12 student, Mia Ruggeri, was assisted by science teacher, Melany Gronski, as an Aquaponics proposal was provided to the Board both through handouts and a PowerPoint presentation. The hydroponics program involves building a greenhouse to create a learning lab which will serve a multitude of curricular and extra-curricular programs though food production and the problem-solving elements of engineering and design. Discussion included sustainability, summer gardens, inclusion, greenhouse placement, cost, project scale, and life-long earning.

Dean of Academics Dr. Harten provided a graduation rate update which compared Academy data with information provided by the state. Over the last ten years, The Academy's graduation rate has remained fairly consistent over time, which is a testament to the efforts of many. Topics included total budget numbers, special education, last year's 0% increase, contractual salary obligations, tuition rates in surrounding high schools, and a sensitivity to the limits of sending town budgets. The Finance Committee has already reviewed and recommended this increase. The regular education tuition rate was proposed at \$16,368.

February Updates from the Associate Head of School

School Updates

- Masking in schools will continue until the end of February. At that point, The Academy will follow the CDC's language of recommending but not requiring universal masking. Masking on public transportation has been extended until March 18, 2022.
- In November, the girls' cross-country team qualified for the State Open Championship the first time in school history.
- The music department received a grant from Horns for Kids to purchase, with additional funds from WAMPA, a new baritone saxophone case, a new tenor saxophone, and an electric upright 5-string base.
- The Football team concluded its fall season as ECC Division 2 Champions the first time in the history of the program!
- The Hockey team, during the holiday season, collected Toys for Tots. They were the largest donating group to the Willimantic distribution center this year.
- The Academy received a \$2,500 grant from the Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut to support various student wellness initiatives.
- The WA gymnastic dynasty continues its domination; the team won its 12th straight ECC championship!
- The Woodstock Academy is a 2020-2021 CIAC Michaels Cup in recognition of its "class act" sportsmanship.

- In November, Tri-M Music Honor Society inducted 16 new members.
- The Model UN competition team won the Outstanding Small Delegation award at the William and Mary conference. Students winning individual awards included: Isabella Miller (W) Best Delegate, Thomas Musumeci (W) Outstanding Delegate, Olivia Grant (W) Honorable Mention, and Mia Krzic (T) Verbal Commendation.
- 5 students won awards at the McGill University Model UN Conference. The winning students were: Baden Eaton (W) Peacekeeping Award, Sydney Haskins (W) Peacekeeping Award, Fiona Rigney (W) Honorable Mention, Owen Bland (W) Diplomatic Finesse Award, and Vincent Tocci (W) Outstanding Delegate
- Owen Bland (W) won The Woodstock Academy Oratorical Speech Contest and was second in the District 4 American Legion Oratorical Speech Contest.
- The MUN team won 5 individual awards at the Columbia University conference.
