1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Vice President Higgins at 7:02 p.m.

2. Head of School Recognition—April and May Honorees

Associate Head of School, Holly Singleton described the character and contributions that lead to the selection of Irene Askitus, Cedric Bilica and Michael Bilica as April Head of School Award winners; and Yvie Bessette and Giorgia Giannini as May Head of School Award winners.

- Irene Askitis (Grade 12, Brooklyn)—Irene is described by her teachers as enthusiastic, intellectually curious, and dedicated. Her coaches call her a tough, gritty athlete! Irene is also a genuine leader inside and outside of the classroom. In the classroom, Irene tackles every task with enthusiasm and curiosity. Her lab skills are phenomenal, and she has dedicated her time in an independent study to learn the skills of a laboratory technician. As a peer tutor, she has increased the understanding and interest of her students in science. She even created a new lab experiment for the class by collaborating with the science department teachers. Outside of the classroom, she is the President of the Science National Honor Society and a valued teammate on the ice rink and soccer field. After taking a cleat to the face during her ECC championship game, true to her nature, Irene got right back up to protect the net from a goal, never giving up! The next day, she came in with a big smile as she showed off her "battle scars" to her peers with pride. Mrs. Lovegreen calls her "an INVALUABLE resource." And Mrs. Gronsky said this about Irene: "She is one tough young person. It is no wonder that she is receiving the Head of School award, she is truly Centaur Strong.
- Cedric Bilica (Grade 10) and Michael Bilica (Grade 12, both from Eastford)—Just when you thought having one Bilica at school was fantastic, you realize the school is blessed with the benefits of two! In recognition of Black History month this year, the Bilica brothers took the initiative to provide an educational service to The Academy students by creating informational posters about Great Black Leaders. They met with administration to create a plan, researched key individuals across history, designed, and then created displays which they put up on both campuses. The Bilica brother's dedication to an inclusive school culture that celebrates diversity is one of the many special contributions these two make to The Academy. In the classroom, both students have been a delight to their teachers and peers.

Michael is described by his teachers as intellectually curious and an excellent thinker and conversationalist. Mr. Bourgeois stated that, "Michael is a smart young man who is very personable. He has a wonderful sense of humor. I enjoy having him in class every day."

Cedric's teachers describe him as kind, considerate, and always willing to help his peers. He is also willing to share new perspectives and insights in class, and his thoughtful perspectives often encourage other students to share new ideas and open a larger dialogue in the classroom. Mrs. Duquette had this to say about Cedric: "Cedric is the kind of student that stands out in the most positive ways. What I admire about Cedric is that I can always tell he thinks before

he speaks, which is something so rare to see in both teenagers and adults. He is humble and doesn't often recognize how successful he is. I am glad he is getting this recognition he deserves."

• **Yvie Bessette (Grade 11, Woodstock)**—If you've ever had the pleasure of meeting Yvie, then you know she is made up of positivity, joy, music, and dance. She has a deep passion for the theatre; you might recognize her from this year's *Footloose* where she played the lead part of Ariel.

Aside from many contributions and accolades in the performing arts, Yvie is being recognized tonight for her work as a peer tutor. She has been working with one specific student for 3 semesters. Yvie is the one who implements each lesson plan and sometimes she has even created her own lesson. As a direct result of Yvie's connection and dedication to this student, this student has made significant progress in her academics, independent living, and social skills; the student is even more willing to talk with other people.

What makes Yvie special is her genuine personality; she shows real friendship to the student. Outside the classroom, they walk to the shuttle stop together, Yvie visits her lunch table, and is always introducing her friends to the student. Yvie goes out of her way so that they can have meaningful conversations; she has all of the student's favorite music ready for her so they can listen and sing to it as they cross campus. Yvie even watches the student's favorite show so that they can talk about it. As Mrs. Hotta says, "Yvie is a very exceptional individual that shines a special brand of kindness whereever she goes. All the students at The Academy have benefited from her commitment to others."

• Giorgia Giannini (Grade 12, from Italy)—Giorgia has been a positive presence on the South campus since she arrived in the fall. Giorgia is always willing to try new activities or lend a helping hand, but she is best known for going out of her way to make others feel welcomed and included. She has been a big sister to the younger family members on South campus and has made many friends throughout the community. She works incredibly hard academically and strives for excellence in everything she does. She has helped as a wing prefect, offered insight to staff regarding improvements that could possibly enhance Res Life, and has been an avid fan of our sports teams.

Mr. Zolobkowski had these words to say about her: "Giorgia is a shining example of what WA is all about. Her story finds her here accidentally when her school was unable to continue its international student program. I have had multiple conversations with her about her appreciation for this place. She is thankful for the teachers and the amazing choices of classes she has had. She truly is grateful to be here and wishes it was for longer. She is kind, respectful, focused, creative and interested in the world around her. She gets it. She gets the hard work. She gets why she is doing things and can see the value. She truly has been a pleasure to meet, to chat with, and have as a student. She is the reason we should continue to reach out and bring people here from all over the world. She makes this place better and more interesting by being here and being a part of what we are trying to do."

7. Woodstock Academy Administration Reports

- a. Associate Head of School for Finance and Operations Report
 - i. <u>2018-2019—Budget Update</u>—Interim Associate Head of School Guillot reviewed the year-to-date reports for encumbrances and revenues, noting more in-depth analysis occurs at the Finance Committee level. Various questions were asked and answered.
 - ii. <u>Facility Project Update</u>—Interim Associate Head of School Guillot reviewed the underground storage tank projects, both of which are scheduled to begin around June 17. Buildings and Grounds Chair Blackmer complimented administration's job vetting contractors and saving money. Failure to perform penalties are in place. Some expensive, unexpected facilities costs have been incurred. Upgrading/replacing our fire alarm system on North campus became necessary after our 3rd or 4th lightning strike and will cost over \$80K. We are hoping for at least partial insurance coverage. The front steps, slate patio, and planter area at the Center for the Arts also required repairs recently at a cost of approximately \$30K.
 - iii. <u>Approve Scholarships</u> Scholarship amounts needed Board approval for the last time, since the Foundation will be managing these funds in the future.
