A survey was conducted asking families if they prefer an extended break at Thanksgiving or during the winter holiday break. 61% responded that they wanted winter break extended. As students will now attend school on election day and Veteran's Day, these extra days will be added to the winter holiday break while still ending school on June 12. Although we have tried to align the calendar with sending towns as much as possible, we will start school on August 28 and have an extended winter holiday break, while some sending towns will start after Labor Day.



# Personnel/Students

# Harassment

The Woodstock Academy Board of Trustees strives to provide a safe, positive working and learning climate for its students and employees. Therefore, harassment, in any form, will not be tolerated at The Academy. This policy applies to all students, staff members, board members, parents, vendors, contracted individuals, volunteers, other employees and other visitors who are on Academy grounds or Academy owned property; on buses operated by The Academy; while attending or engaged in Academy activities; and while away from Academy grounds if the misconduct directly affects the good order, efficient management, and welfare of the Academy.

Employees, students, and others are expected to adhere to a standard of conduct that is respectful and courteous to all. The principle of freedom of expression that might otherwise protect the most offensive public speech does not protect or encompass a right to threaten the dignity and privacy of an individual. Such personally directed behavior will not be tolerated. It is contrary to academic values, debilitates its victims, compromises the offenders, and undermines The Academy's fundamental commitment to individual freedom and respect for all its members. Furthermore, acts of intolerance may destroy the very atmosphere in which freedom of expression is otherwise tolerated and cherished.

For purposes of this policy, harassment consists of verbal, written, graphic, or physical conduct relating to an individual's race, veteran status, color, religion, sex, national origin/ethnicity, physical attributes or disability, parental or marital status, sexual orientation, gender identity/expression, or age when such conduct/harassment:

- is sufficiently severe, persistent or pervasive that it affects an individual's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity or creates an intimidating, threatening or abusive educational environment;
- 2. has the purpose or effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with an individual's academic or work performance;
- 3. otherwise adversely affects an individual's learning or work opportunities;
- 4. is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's education, employment, or participation in district programs or activities; or
- 5. exposure to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for decisions affecting the individual.

Harassment as set forth above may include, but is not limited to:

- · verbal, physical, or written intimidation or abuse;
- · repeated remarks of a demeaning or condescending nature;
- repeated demeaning jokes, stories, or activities directed at the individual.

For purposes of this policy, sexual harassment shall consist of unwelcome sexual advances; requests for sexual favors; and other inappropriate verbal, written, graphic or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

- 1. acceptance of such conduct is made, either explicitly or implicitly, a term or condition of an individual's continued education employment; or participation in district programs or activities;
- 2. submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for decisions affecting the individual; and
- such conduct is sufficiently severe, persistent or pervasive that it has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with the employee's job performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment.

Examples of conduct that may constitute sexual harassment include, but are not limited to sexual flirtations, advances, touching or propositions; verbal abuse of a sexual nature; graphic or suggestive comments about an individual's dress or body; sexually degrading words to describe an individual; jokes; pin-ups; calendars; objects; graffiti; vulgar statements; abusive language; innuendos; references to sexual activities; overt sexual conduct; or any conduct that has the effect of unreasonably interfering with an employees' ability to work or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment.

Each staff member shall be responsible to maintain an educational environment free from all forms of unlawful harassment. Each student shall be responsible to respect the rights of all students and to ensure an environment free from all forms of unlawful harassment.

Should harassment be alleged, it is the policy of this Board that it shall be thoroughly investigated, that there should be no retaliation against the victim of the alleged harassment, and that the problem/concern shall be appropriately addressed.

In order to maintain a work environment that discourages and prohibits unlawful harassment, the Board designates the Head of School or his/her designee as the District's Compliance Officer.

The Academy shall annually inform students, staff, parents, independent contractors and volunteers that unlawful harassment will not be tolerated with the school system.

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# Consecutive Absence Policy

Employees at The Academy are expected to be at work as scheduled and to work overtime as requested by The Head of School or their designee. Employees are expected to report to work based upon the scheduling needs of the Academy.

It is the responsibility of employees to notify their supervisor as soon as they know that they are going to be absent for any reason. Because of the need to operate as efficiently as possible, and in fairness to other employees who must assume the duties of absent employees, any employee who is, or has been, unable to report to work for any reason for a period of six (6) consecutive months, will be terminated. This termination will not affect whatever rights and/or benefits the employee might have under either The Academy's disability or worker's compensation (injury/not termination) programs.
