April 30 and May 2, 2024: Graduation Material Pickup

Graduation material pickup is held in the Senior Cafe during lunch hours. Graduates may pick up their tickets, cap, gown, and tassel at this time. Students are required to sign a confirmation of pickup for their graduation items. We ask that families attempt to have financial obligations met before graduation materials pickup.

May 15, 2024: Deadline to Meet Graduation Requirements

All graduation requirements must be met by Wednesday, May 15 at 3:10 pm for your student to participate in the ceremony. Check Skyward and contact individual teachers or Student Services with questions about your student's academic status.

May 17, 2024: Graduation Rehearsal

Graduation rehearsal will be held on Friday, May 17 at 1:00 p.m. in the East Gym. All students participating in the graduation ceremony must be present at rehearsal.

May 19, 2024: Graduation

Commencement Ceremonies for the Graduating Class of 2024 will take place on Sunday, May 19, in the Grant Community High School Field House beginning at 2:00 p.m. Graduates should report to the East Gym at 1:00 p.m.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION PRIOR TO GRADUATION DAY

Due to limited seating in the Field House, each graduate is permitted six (6) graduation ceremony tickets. Tickets are required for entry to the ceremony. <u>TICKETS WILL NOT BE REISSUED IN THE EVENT OF LOSS</u>.

We ask that families make every effort to meet all financial obligations before graduates receive diplomas. Fees may be paid with cash or check in the main office during normal business hours, or with a credit card online via the school website <u>www.grantbulldogs.org</u>. You can check your fees on Skyward Family Access or contact the main office at 847-587-2561. GCHS is partnering with The Commencement Group this year to offer families the opportunity to purchase flowers for their graduate. You can place your pre-order via <u>www.thecommencementgroup.com/grantcommunity/</u>. Orders will be available to pick up upon your arrival to the graduation ceremony.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR THE DAY OF GRADUATION

- Graduates participating in the ceremony must arrive with their cap, tassel, and gown and meet in the East Gym promptly at 1:00 p.m.
- Graduation is a formal ceremony. To participate, appropriate attire is required. Appropriate attire includes dresses, collared shirts with or without a tie, long pants or dress slacks (no jeans or shorts), dress shoes, and school-provided regalia.
- Students are not allowed to wear a decorated cap at graduation.
- General parking will be available on a first-come, first-served basis on the north and south school parking lots.
- Due to construction in the Field House parking lot, handicap parking will be available at Stanton School on Hawthorne Lane and transportation will be provided to and from the Field House. Handicap seating will be available for the ceremony.
- Live streaming of the graduation ceremony will be available on Grant's homepage via YouTube Live. Please check <u>www.grantbulldogs.org</u> the week of May 13 for details.

AP Exams

The 2024 AP Exams will be administered in schools over two weeks in May. For paper-pencil exams, students should bring two #2 pencils. For digital exams, students need to bring their school-issued Chromebook fully charged and a charging cord. Students taking a digital exam should open the Bluebook app and take the practice test prior to their exam date to ensure the app is functioning properly.

Morning AP Test Students

Students will report immediately to their testing rooms at the beginning of the school day. **Please arrive no later than 7:40 AM for instructions and preparing the answer documents.** Morning testing begins at 8:00 AM. Morning AP tests are typically completed by 11:30 AM. Students who miss lunch while testing will be provided a pass to the cafeteria when testing is finished. After testing, students will return to their regular schedules. *Please note that Wednesday tests DO NOT follow the GCHS flex start schedule. Wednesday morning exams will begin at 7:40 AM, and students are responsible for their own transportation.*

Afternoon AP Test Students

Students will attend a regular schedule for the morning. **Students should plan on arriving no later than 11:40 AM for instructions and preparing the answer documents.** The exam will begin at 12:00 PM. Testing will end between 3:10 – 3:45 PM depending on the exam. Students should expect to take the 4:05 PM late bus or arrange for a ride home since testing time might vary. The library will be open for students who need to wait for the late bus.

Two Tests on the Same Day

Students will be provided with a pass to eat lunch in the cafeteria between the two testing times, if time allows. If not, they should bring an easy to consume snack to eat between the tests.

Any additional information will be communicated through email, your AP teacher, and morning announcements. Students should check with their individual teachers to make sure they are current with their class work and homework assignments. Food Service Updates for 2024-2025

With the new academic year on the horizon, students, faculty, and parents will notice a slight uptick in lunch prices. Beginning Monday, August 12, a complete lunch meal will now cost \$3.60. Despite the increase, our partnership with Quest Food Management Services allows us to refresh menu options based on school-wide feedback and input from our Principal's Advisory Committee (PAC). With student feedback and input from PAC, Quest Food Management Services will continue to innovate, ensuring that menu options cater to diverse preferences while meeting nutritional standards set by the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and the United States Department of Agriculture.

At the start of the new year, parents are welcome to add money to their student's food service account online through <u>Skyward Family Access</u>, by check (made payable to Grant Community High School), or by cash. Please be aware that students may choose to purchase a la carte items for an additional charge.

For those families in need of assistance providing breakfast and lunch for their students, visit our website for the <u>Income Eligibility Guidelines</u>. Both application documents have been attached to this email for easy access but can be obtained through our website as well.



Copies of this form are available in the Main Office or via PDF on our school website under "<u>Transcript Requests</u>."
