The Grant Community High School April Student of the Month is senior Julia Podgorski, daughter of Agnieszka and Marek Podgorski of Fox Lake.

Julia's academic achievements include induction into the National Honor Society during her sophomore year, and qualifying for Honor Roll each semester. She will have taken 10 AP courses through her senior year and scored a perfect 5 on three AP exams. She received the AP Scholar Award and Scholar-Athlete Award, and was named an Illinois State Scholar. She holds a remarkable 4.926 GPA.



She attended Girls State, was nominated to attend the World Affairs Seminar, and participated in State Senator Craig Wilcox's

Youth Advisory Council. She earned the Illinois Seal of Biliteracy in the Polish language and was recognized by the General Consulate of the Republic of Poland for completing Polish secondary education in the US. She was named a Questbridge College Prep Scholar and National Match Scholarship recipient. Additionally, she was chosen for the Social Studies Golden Globe award in January 2023.

Her extracurricular activities include Captain of the Debate Team where they placed 5th at a Public Forum competition and competed at multiple state tournaments, and Vice President of FBLA, where she and her group placed 5th at Nationals for Website Design. She is currently serving as Treasurer of NAHS and participated in Girls' Tennis, Academic Team, and Snow Dogs. She is the 2023/24 Student Representative to the Board of Education.

Julia volunteered in a variety of school events such as Parent University, Back to School Night, Wellness Fair, Eighth Grade Enrollment, Roadside Cleanups, face painting at football games, helped organize the Silent Auction, and raised money for the Grant Township Food Bank. She also assists her peers as a tutor in the English and Social Studies labs.

In addition to all of her activities, Julia helps out with her mother's self-owned business, works at the Wauconda Kumon Learning Center, and is the deputy intern coordinator for a local political organization in Lake County. She enjoys attending concerts, collecting vinyl records, reading, watching movies, and hanging out with friends.

Her plans for the future include attending Wesleyan University in Connecticut where she intends to double major in political science and English, and then on to law school.

PSAT TESTING

Grant Community High School will be administering the state-required digital SAT Suite of Assessments to all freshmen through juniors on Wednesday, April 10, 2024. This WILL NOT be a flex start day. Students will report to their assigned testing locations by 7:40 AM, and it is important that students are on time that morning. Students should bring a school-issued, fully charged Chromebook and their charging cords. Breakfast will be served before school in the commons, and a snack will be provided during testing. All testing will be completed around 12:30 PM (with the exception of some accommodated testing), and normal bus transportation will be provided after testing.

On Thursday, April 4, freshmen, sophomore, and junior students will receive a notice through their TEAM room that indicates the test the student is scheduled to take, the testing room location to report to that morning, and the necessary materials the student needs to bring for testing. Parents should make sure their student has received that information. Below you will find some more specifics about the tests

the students may be taking.

Seniors – *Most seniors will not be in attendance on Wednesday, April 10.* Only those seniors who have been notified that they need to take the school-day test to meet graduation requirements will attend. We strongly encourage seniors to use these two days for college visits, finishing up college entrance paperwork, job shadowing, or job searches.

Juniors – All juniors are required to take the state-required SAT with an essay exam as a graduation requirement. This is a college-reportable SAT score. The make-up date for juniors to take the SAT exam will be on Tuesday, April 23.

Sophomores – All sophomores are required to take the PSAT 10 from the College Board to better prepare them for the SAT exam they will take next year as part of the state-required college and career readiness exam. The make-up date for sophomores to take the PSAT 10 exam will be in the afternoon of Wednesday, April 24.

Freshmen - All freshmen are required to take the PSAT 8/9 from the College Board to better prepare them for the SAT exam they will take their junior year as part of the state-required college and career readiness exam. The make-up date for freshmen to take the PSAT 8/9 exam will be Monday, April 22.

For all three of these exams, students should bring their Grant Student ID, a calculator, and a fully charged Chromebook on the testing day of Wednesday, April 10.

This year's Prom, A Starry Night to Remember, is quickly approaching! Prom is Friday, May 3, and the destination is the Belvedere Banquets in Elk Grove Village, IL. In order to attend Prom, students must be a Junior or Senior currently enrolled at GCHS. Students wishing to bring a Freshman, Sophomore, or out-of-school guest are allowed. Early grads are considered out-of-school guests and must have a current student bring them as a guest. Students bringing an out-of-school guest will need to complete the <u>Grant Dance Guest Approval Form</u>. Out-of-school guest forms must be completed and turned in to the Deans by Friday, April 5.

Tickets to the event will be sold at \$80.00 per ticket. Prom tickets will be on sale online or in the Bookstore from April 8 through April 18. Only check and cash payments can be made in the Bookstore. All GCHS Senior and Junior Students must purchase tickets individually. Senior and Junior Students may not purchase two tickets under the same ID#. If you are purchasing a ticket for your date who is an underclassman (Sophomore/Freshman) or out-of-school guest, you must use that student's name and student ID#. Seniors/Juniors who are bringing a guest are responsible for their guests. When purchasing tickets for you and your guest, please select the appropriate ticket purchase. Students who have been approved to bring an outside guest will select the Senior/Junior taking an out-of-school guest ticket. If your guest has not been pre-approved, the student will not be allowed to attend.

Prom is a school function; all school rules and regulations, as stated in the Student/Parent Handbook, apply to all students attending prom. Students who behave improperly will be referred to a GCHS administrator and parents will be notified. All students and guests will be required to ride school-sponsored bus transportation to and from Prom. This bus transportation is included in the price of the ticket and is mandatory. Students are not allowed to utilize private transportation to or from Prom. Students who do so will not be admitted to Prom.

Prom check-in will begin in the Field House at 4:45 PM on Prom night. Students must present their ticket and current ID upon check-in to the Prom. Outside guests must present a valid state-issued photo ID to be admitted to Prom. Students who do not have proper identification will not be allowed to board a bus. Buses will depart beginning at 5:30 PM. All students must be present for the entire school day on Friday, May 3, in order to attend Prom. No absences, tardies, or passes off campus will be excused for students attending Prom.

Hall of Fame

Nomination Information

The Hall of Fame has been established to recognize and showcase outstanding graduates and dedicated staff as part of our efforts to promote excellence and achievement for learners in Grant Community High School District 124.

The Hall of Fame was designed to honor exemplary individuals who have achieved distinction, outstanding accomplishment, or significant contribution within their professions, communities, schools, families, or personal lives.

Nominations

Nominations will be accepted for the Hall of Fame, Class of 2024, until April 22, 2024. Visit GCHS Hall of Fame for the nomination forms.

Criteria to be Considered for Alumni

- Graduates of Grant Community High School are eligible for consideration, provided that graduation occurred at least ten years prior to the year in which they are nominated.
- Graduate has made a significant contribution within their profession, community, school, family, or personal life.
- Graduate positively promotes Grant Community High School.

Criteria to be Considered for Staff

- Staff of Grant Community High School are eligible for consideration if they have a minimum of twenty years of service to District 124 and provided they are either retired or have ceased active employment at least three years prior to the year in which they are nominated.
- Staff member has made a significant contribution at Grant Community High School, in their community, family, or personal life.
- Staff member positively promotes Grant Community High School.

Procedures for Nominations

- Nominations may be made by families, friends, alumni, faculty, staff, administration, and community members of District 124.
- In order to be considered, the nomination form should be fully completed and submitted as outlined on the form.
- Nominations will be kept on file and considered for a total of five years following submission. After five years, a candidate may be re-nominated.

Selection of Inductees

- The selection committee is comprised of a member of the Board of Education, administration, staff, alumni of Grant Community High School District 124, and community members.
- Selected inductees will be contacted by July 1, 2024.

Induction

- New members of the Hall of Fame will be inducted at a ceremony during Homecoming Week 2024.
- New members will be asked to participate in a variety of Homecoming activities, including a reception and awards ceremony at a meeting of the Board of Education, an all-school pep assembly, the varsity football game, and the Homecoming parade. While the intent of this program is to honor graduates and Grant staff, it is also to provide positive role models and inspiration for current students.



Henry Kusiak went from being a two-year letter winner at Grant, hitting a .415 with 13 doubles, to breaking Missouri Southern State University's (MSSU) All-Time Hits record as a starting senior. In their March 3 game, the MSSU Lions went up against Newman and took down the Jets 11-9. Henry first put the Lions on the board with a home run to left field. With that home run, Henry tied MSSU's all-time hits record at 257. He added another hit to his record with an

RBI single and set a new program record of 258. Not only is adding the title of all-time leading hitter to his stat sheet, but he also now holds the record for career at-bats at 776!

Kusiak finished with a .550 slugging and .410 on-base percentage for a .960 OPS." In addition to his stats, Henry was named Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) Hitter of the Week twice during his senior season.






Honors Spanish 5 students created children's books centered around an original fable. After coming up with the idea for their fable, they put together creative stories and illustrations to help convey the moral of the story.






As part of our French and Spanish classes, our Bulldogs traveled to France and Spain over spring break for a true cultural deep-dive.
