Schools qualify for funds based on economic need.

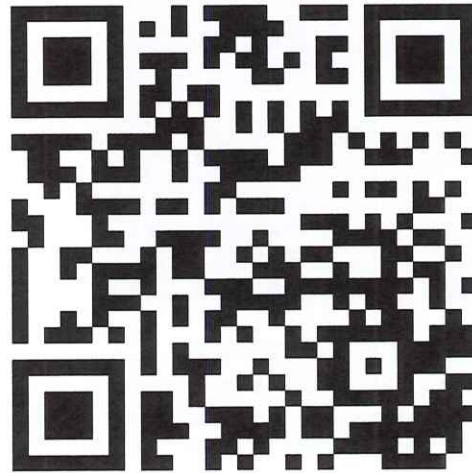
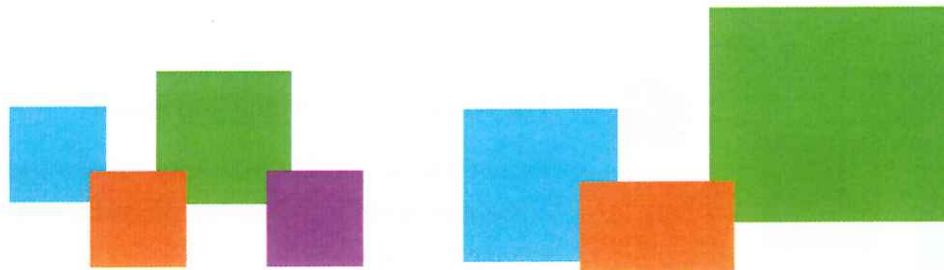
Which students receive the benefits?

The needs are assessed each year. Currently, the following campuses receive additional support:

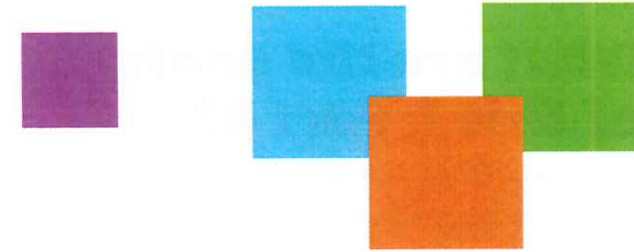

What are the goals of Title I, Part A?

- Increase academic achievement
- Provide direct instructional support to students
- Provide professional development to teachers
- Promote parent education and involvement

Increase Academic achievement

A part of the monies received from Title I funding goes toward purchasing materials to supplement the programs currently being used in the district. These could be digital licenses, manipulatives, books, field trips, extended day tutoring, and more.

Instructional Support

Providing students with additional support in the form of teachers and support staff has been found to be successful in increasing achievement. Additional staff allows for small grouping, focused lessons, and more opportunity.



Professional development

A well-trained teacher has the ability to better impact each and every child. Title I campuses work to provide their teachers with the information they need to do the best at their jobs, staying at the forefront of research and best practices.

Parent education & Involvement

Learn

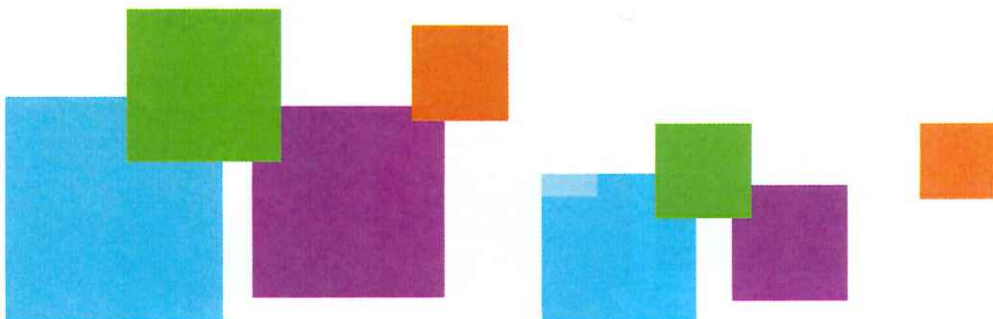
Find ways to help your child with classwork, homework, and future education plans.
