1) Universal and correct wearing of masks

Face coverings for students are optional when in the school building. Accommodations for students who are unable to wear a face-covering are addressed according to that student's need and in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations.

2) Physical distancing (e.g., including use of cohorts/podding)

All instructional and non-instructional rooms in school and district facilities complies with recommended social distancing standards to the maximum extent practicable. When a classroom or non-instructional room was not able to maintain this physical distance, additional modifications were implemented when possible, including having physical barriers between desks, turning desks to face the same direction (rather than facing each other), and/or having students sit on only one side of a table, spaced apart appropriately, if and when needed.

3) Handwashing and respiratory etiquette

The district promotes behaviors that encourage staff and students to stay home when appropriate, encouraging the practice of hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette; requiring the use of face coverings, and signs and messages in and around school buildings. Handwashing and hand sanitizing are permitted and encouraged throughout the school day. The district has prepared and maintains hand sanitizing stations with alcohol-based hand sanitizer (at least 60% alcohol). Such stations are located: in each classroom (for staff and older children who can safely use hand sanitizer); at entrances and exits of buildings; near lunchrooms and toilets; children ages five and younger are supervised when using hand sanitizer; for classrooms that have existing handwashing stations, stations are prepared with soap, water, and alcohol-based hand sanitizers (at least 60% alcohol). Handwashing is suggested before eating, after using the bathroom, and after blowing their nose, coughing, and/or sneezing.

4) Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation

The district consults with contracted busing companies to ensure CDC-recommended procedures are followed. Custodial dept. follows the cleaning schedule which includes regular cleaning/disinfecting as well as rotational "deep cleaning" of high touch/high traffic areas. We use Bioesque products from the EPA's acceptable list. We maintain an adequate inventory of cleaning supplies. Staff disinfects frequently during the day for touchpoints, classrooms, isolation areas, lunch tables, and nurses' offices including shared student items. Disinfectant is used throughout the building at the end of each day using an electrostatic sprayer. All outside damper units regularly circulate in outside air at a minimum of 10%. HVAC system is controlled remotely to ensure proper ventilation. We have installed 6 Bipolar Ionization units in the HVAC system for added filtration and improved air quality. Air filters are replaced regularly.

5) Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments

Contact tracing will be done in accordance with most current NJDOH guidelines.

6) Diagnostic and screening testing

Screening procedures include the following: staff must visually check students for symptoms upon arrival and/or confirm with families that students were free of COVID-19 symptoms; health checks must be conducted safely and respectfully, and in accordance with any applicable privacy laws and regulations; results must be documented when signs/symptoms of COVID-19 are observed; any screening policy/protocol must take into account students with disabilities and accommodations that may be needed in the screening process for those students. School officials have encouraged parents to be alert for signs of illness in their children and to keep their child home when they are sick.

7) Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible

Most educators and staff members voluntarily made vaccination appointments and

were vaccinated. We provided times in town for staff members to receive their vaccinations. The district also distributed all health notices, including notices of locations offering vaccinations. Students who are eligible for vaccines will make their own appointments to get vaccinated.
