Who are our Multilingual Learners?



- ★ More than 1,450 students K-12
- ★ Comprised of students with 82 different home languages
- ★ English Learners (ELs) are emergent multilinguals who often speak 3-4 languages
- ★ Represented in all our K-12 buildings





Multilingual Learners




Type of Multilingual Learners



- Born in the US: Most Multilingual Learners are U.S. Born Citizens
- Newcomer/New to Country: A Multilingual Learner born outside of the U.S. within 2 years of entering US schools.
- Refugee/Asylee: A Multilingual Learner who was forced to leave their homeland.
- SLIFE: A Multilingual Learner with limited or interrupted schooling.
- LTEL (Long Term English Learner): A Multilingual Learner who has not met Exit Criteria for 6 or more years.
- Dually Identified: A Multilingual Learner who qualifies for both English Learner and Special Education Services.

New to Country Students

- ★ According to the U.S. Department of Education (2023), newcomers refers to K-12 students born outside the United States who have arrived in the country in the last three years and are still learning English.
- ★ 16% of our EL identified students are New to the Country, most are Spanish speakers



New to Country Students By Grade Level









Beginning with the 2023-24 school year, SLIFE are English learners (EL) who have at least two fewer years of schooling than their peers when entering school in the United States.

How are Students Identified for EL Services?




EL identification follows the Minnesota Department of Education's Standardized Procedures

Process Steps

- ★ Minnesota Home Language Survey during enrollment
- ★ WIDA Screener administered if a language other than English is spoken at home
- ★ EL identification needs to be completed within 30 days of the start of the school year







By LAW all English Learners are entitled to an educational program that provides:

- ★ Access to the core curriculum
- ★ Opportunities for English language development

EL Service will be differentiated by language levels/needs

Entering

For example:

- New to country students receive more EL instruction in their day.
- A level 4 EL student may have 1 co-taught class in their schedule
- A student is exited from EL services if their ACCESS composite score is 4.5, and all language domains above a 3.5


