Humanities Department Required Reading: Select **one** book from the following list of memoirs.

<i>Path to the Stars</i> by Sylvia Acevedo*	The inspiring memoir for young listeners about a Latina rocket scientist whose early life was transformed by joining the Girl Scouts and who currently serves as CEO of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A.
<i>Someone Like Me</i> by Julissa Arce*	Liz Kendall wouldn't hurt a fly. Even when times get tough, she's devoted to bringing up her two kids in a loving home. But there's another side to Liz, she will do anything to get her way no matter how extreme.
<i>Life in Motion</i> by Misty Copeland*	As the first African American principal dancer at the American Ballet Theatre, Misty Copeland has been breaking down all kinds of barriers in the world of dance. But when she first started dancing—at the late age of thirteen—no one would have guessed the shy girl would one day make history in her field.
<i>Proud: Living My American Dream</i> by Ibtihaj Muhammad*	At the 2016 Olympic Games, Ibtihaj Muhammad smashed barriers as the first American to compete wearing hijab, and she made history as the first Muslim American woman to win a medal. But before she was an Olympian, activist, and entrepreneur, Ibtihaj was a young outsider trying to find her place.
<i>This Kid Can Fly</i> by Aaron Philip*	In this heartbreaking and ultimately uplifting memoir, Aaron Philip, a fourteen-year-old boy with cerebral palsy, shows how he isn't defined so much by his disability as he is by his abilities.

<i>No Summit Out of Sight</i> by Jordan Romero*	On May 22, 2010, at the age of thirteen, American teenager Jordan Romero became the youngest person to climb to the summit of Mount Everest. At fifteen, he became the youngest person to reach the summits of the tallest mountains on each of the seven continents.
<i>Knucklehead</i> by Jon Scieszka*	How did Jon Scieszka get so funny, anyway? Growing up as one of six brothers was a good start, but that was just the beginning. Throw in Catholic school, lots of comic books, lazy summers at the lake with time to kill, babysitting misadventures, TV shows, jokes told at family dinner, and the result is <i>Knucklehead</i> .
<i>I am Malala</i> (Young Readers Edition) by Malala Yousafza*	<i>I Am Malala</i> is the memoir of a remarkable teenage girl who tells her story of bravery and determination in the face of extremism, detailing the daily challenges of growing up in a world transformed by terror.

Humanities Department Required Reading: Select one book from Section 2

Genre: Realistic Fiction

<i>Wishtree</i> by Katherine Applegate*	Once a year, people gather to tie their wishes onto a red oak tree. The tree tells the story of one year when a new immigrant family moves to the neighborhood and the tree's future is threatened.
<i>Better Nate Than Ever</i> by Tim Federle+*	Nate's dream is to perform on Broadway, so when he sees an open audition for <i>E.T.: The Musical</i> , he concocts a harebrained scheme to sneak off to New York for the weekend to try out.
<i>Front Desk</i> by Kelly Yang*+	Mia manages the front desk of the Calivista Motel. If the mean motel owner, Mr. Yao, finds out they've been letting other immigrant families stay in the empty rooms for free, the Tangs will be doomed.
<i>A Mango-Shaped Space</i> by Wendy Mass*	Mia thinks she's crazy because she sees color with every letter, number, and sound, so she tries to keep it a secret—until life gets too overwhelming to keep it in anymore.

Genre: Fantasy & Science Fiction

<i>Wild Robot</i> by Peter Brown+*	Roz the robot finds herself alone on a remote island with no memory of why she is there. Her only hope of survival is to learn about her new environment from the island's hostile inhabitants.
<i>Aru Shah and the End of Time</i> by Roshani Chokshi+*	Aru may sometimes stretch the truth to fit in at her private school, but when she is dared to prove an ancient lamp in her mother is cursed, she accidentally frees an ancient demon who stops time.

<i>City of Ember</i> by Jeanne DuPrau+*	Ember is a society deep underground and the last refuge for the human race. But 200 years after its creation, supplies are running low, and it's up to Lina and Doon to find a way out.
<i>Dactyl Hill Squad</i> by Daniel José Older+*	It's 1863 and dinosaurs roam the streets of New York as the Civil War rages between raptor-mounted armies.
Genre: Mystery	
<i>The Ghost Road</i> by Charis Cotter*	Ruth's father sends her off to spend the summer with family in Newfoundland, where she meets her cousin, who looks more like her twin and hears about a family curse.
<i>The Greenglass House</i> by Kate Milford+*	Milo, the innkeeper's adopted son, plans to spend his winter holidays relaxing, but guests arrive with stories about the inn that send Milo and Meddy, the cook's daughter, off to solve a mystery.
<i>The Goldfish Boy</i> by Lisa Thompson*	Matthew struggles with a disorder and almost never leaves his room, but watching the neighbors from his window one day, he is the last person to see a toddler before he disappears.
<i>Three Times Lucky</i> by Sheila Turnage+*	Mo LoBeau and her best friend Dale set out to uncover the truth behind a murder in their small town to save the family that pulled Mo out of the river when she was a baby.
Genre: Historical fiction	
<i>The Inquisitor's Tale: Or, the Three Magical Children and Their Holy Dog</i> by Adam Gidwitz*	William, a monastery oblate; Jacob, a Jewish refugee; and Jeanne, a psychic peasant girl, join forces on a chase through France to escape persecution, accompanied by Jeanne's greyhound.
<i>How I Became a Ghost</i> by Tim Tingle	A Choctaw boy tells the story of his tribe's removal from the only land its people had ever known, and how their journey to Oklahoma led him to become a ghost--one with the ability to help those he left behind.
<i>Echo</i> by Pam Muñoz Ryan*	Friedrich in Germany, Mike in Pennsylvania, and Ivy in California struggle to overcome challenges at different points across time, drawing hope and strength from the same enchanted harmonica.
<i>One Crazy Summer</i> by Rita Williams-Garcia+*	Delphine and her sisters move from New York to California in the summer of 1968 to live with a mother they've never known, and the sisters end up in a summer camp with the Black Panthers.
