



During her time at Shawnee, Lynlee Phillips exhibited a powerful force in both basketball as well as track and field, where her strength was in her throwing. On the court, Lynlee made the “1,000 Point” scorer club in the 1999 game versus Cherokee, held the record number of three-pointers in a single game versus Lenape on December 22, 1998, was First-team All-Conference (1998,) First-team All-County and All-Group (1999,) and Third-Team All-South Jersey (1999). Lynlee was on the South Jersey Group IV Championship Teams of 1998 and 1999 as well as Olympic Conference Division Championship Team in 1997, 1998, and 1999. Lynlee earned a total of eight varsity letters while at Shawnee.

In Track and Field, Lynlee excelled in javelin, shot put and discus. She was the National Scholastic Outdoor Track and Field Champion in the Javelin (1998,) as well as State Champion in the Javelin 1997, 1998, and 1999. She was the **Meet of Champions** Champion in javelin 1998 and 1999, and second in shot and discus 1999. Lynlee had an impressive second place finish in the Penn Relays in both 1998 and 1999, and was Conference Champion in shot, discus, and javelin 1997, 1998, and 1999.

In addition to being the Shawnee High School Outstanding Athlete in 1999, Lynlee still holds the Shawnee school records in shot put, javelin and discus, as well as the South Jersey record in javelin.



After leaving Shawnee, Lynlee attended Michigan State University, where she continued to compete in track and field, and again, attaining a school record in the javelin in 1999. She still holds the Michigan State women’s javelin record which she set in 2000. While at Michigan State, Lynlee competed in the 2000 Olympic Trials, and was named All-American in 2002. She secured a third place finish in the javelin throw during the Big Ten Championship in 2001, earned four letters at Michigan State, and graduated with a Bachelor’s degree in Family Community Services, and a Master’s Degree in Kinesiology.

After graduating Michigan State University, Lynlee accepted a position at the University of Louisville as an Academic Advisor for student athletes. In that role, she was responsible for overseeing men’s tennis, women’s lacrosse, and both men’s and women’s track and field/cross country. A few years later, Lynlee made the move back home to New Jersey and became a Physical Education teacher. Lynlee taught Physical Education and coached girls’ basketball and track for seven years. Lynlee then moved to southern Delaware, where she continued to teach physical education. In 2010 Lynlee was inducted into the south Jersey Track and Field Coaches Hall of Fame and recently completed her Masters of Education in School Leadership.

Currently, Lynlee is still in the field of education, and teaches in the Seaford School District. Lynlee and her spouse Casey are expecting their first child in October, 2018.
