

BISHOP APPEALS TO McADOO.

BYRAN PREPARE TO SIGN VISA FOR PROTECTION.

Mr. Osborne says the priest is the victim of a plot. Bishop Hawaweeny has received a letter from the Russian Red Cross.

The trouble among the Syrians of this city, which seems to center chiefly about Bishop Hawaweeny of the Greek Church, has been a subject of interest to the Russian Red Cross.

As a result of the surface between the Bishop and anti-Bishop men on both sides of the East River, over fifteen warrants have been issued and there is scarcely a day passes but some badly frightened person appears in a police car.

Commissioner McAdoo assured Mr. Osborne and the Russian Consul that the Bishop should have protection.

DEAR SIR: I am requested on behalf of the Consul-General of Russia to address you in regard to the Right Rev. Russian Prelate, His Beatitude, the Syrian Catholic Bishop of Antioch.

In replying to this letter Inspector Cross said he had personally assured the Bishop that the actual line of protection, and added:

It appears that while Bishop Hawaweeny was sent to this country originally by the Patriarch of Antioch, the head of the Syrian Greek Church, a year ago, the Holy Synod of the Russian Greek Church combined with the Antioch authorities to elevate him to the Bishopric and place him at the head of the Syrian Greek Mission in North America.

There are many anti-Russians among the Syrians, and, according to Mr. Osborne, the fact that the Bishop raised \$5,000 for the Russian Red Cross has been one of the causes of the trouble.

In spite of the fact that Inspector Cross found that the Bishop was innocent of every charge made and was a Christian and a man of peace, said Mr. Osborne yesterday.

Some of Bishop Hawaweeny's friends were in the Butler street police court yesterday when George Shober, one of those arrested in the row Monday night, was arraigned.

They were held for extradition yesterday by Magistrate Mackay and admitted to bail. The lower part of Washington street last night there were several small lights and three men were arrested.

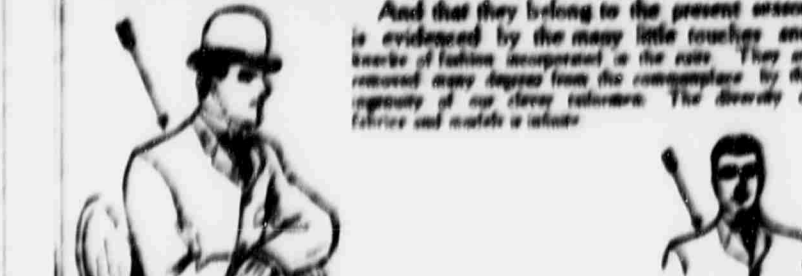
