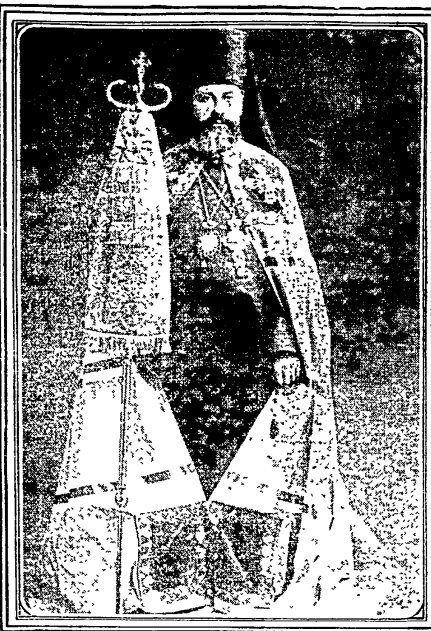


DEATH PACT KEPT AFTER MANY YEARS

Man Kills Himself and Leaves Note Giving Grewsome Story

GIRL REPELLED BY HIM KILLED HERSELF—LOTS DRAWN WITH RELATIVE FIX TIME OF HIS SUICIDE.

(By Associated Press.) BERLIN, Oct. 2.—Police officers who were summoned yesterday by Mrs. Theodor Von Hovens, whose husband had locked himself in a room of their apartments and would not open the door, broke it down and found him dead. By his side was a memorandum which stated that before his marriage he had worked at his calling as a wood carver in America, the localities not being given, and at a ball one evening a girl endeavored to kiss him, that he repelled her and she drowned herself.

COUNTERFEITERS ARE APPREHENDED

Largest Gang Operating in the South Detected

GEORGE OLENSTEAD, A MEMBER ARRESTED IN HUNTINGTON, W. VA., WITH LARGE AMOUNT OF BOGUS MONEY ON PERSON

(By Associated Press.) HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Oct. 2.—What is believed to have been the worst gang of counterfeiters ever known in this section, has been wiped up within the past few weeks.

George Olenstead was arrested today and a considerable sum of the counterfeit money was found upon his person. Olenstead confessed and disclosed the location of the counterfeiters' headquarters, under the Ohio river bank just below Central City.

Olenstead's confession implicated three other men. The operations of the gang have been chiefly in the vicinity of Charleston and Huntington.

ESCAPED LUNATIC STILL AT LARGE OTIS EVANS IS LOCATED, BUT NOT RETURNED—LAGENBOHN HAS NOT BEEN HEARD FROM.

News has been received of Otis Evans, who with Charles Lagenbohn, the wife murderer, escaped Davis night from Eastern Kentucky Insane Asylum, by breaking through the iron bars of their cell doors.

Evans will not be returned to the asylum and his brother-in-law has taken his children from that institution. He is considered dangerous by the Lexington officers and will be arrested if he enters the city limits.

RAPID SPREAD IN YELLOW FEVER

NATCHEZ NOW TIGHT IN THE GRIP OF PESTILENCE, ALL FOUR WARDS BEING INFECTED.

(By Associated Press.) NATCHEZ, Miss., Oct. 2.—Today's records show a rapid spread of yellow fever in the last twenty-four hours. Six new foci are listed on the local map.

PENSACOLA, Fla., Oct. 2.—Five new cases of fever were reported tonight. There has been one death.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 2.—An order was issued today by the State Board of Health quarantining Georgia against the whole State of Mississippi.

VICKSBURG, Miss., Oct. 2.—Sixteen new cases of yellow fever and one death are reported.

\$10,000,000 FROM J. D. ROCKEFELLER GIFT TO THE BOARD OF GENERAL EDUCATION OF NEW YORK, ANNOUNCED LAST JUNE, TURNED OVER IN CASH.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—\$10,000,000 of the gift of John D. Rockefeller to the General Education Board which was announced last June, was paid to the Board by Rockefeller in cash today.

OWENSBORO SHIPPERS GET THEIR DEMANDS. (By Associated Press.) OWENSBORO, Ky., Oct. 2.—Owensboro shippers received official notice from traffic managers, Compton, Louisville & Nashville railroad, that Illinois Central and Henderson and St. Louis railroads companies, and other roads entering Owensboro agreed to accept the Owensboro proposition of a settlement of freight rate cases.

FIFTEEN OF THE CREW DROWNED. CHIEFOFF, Oct. 2.—The coasting steamer Heister, plying between Shanghai and Tien Tsin, struck and was destroyed by a mine ninety miles south of the Shanghai promontory. Fifteen of the board were killed, including among them being engineers Mauchan and Muir. The foreign passengers and a portion of the crew of the Heister were rescued by two passing steamers.

MEMORIAL TO POCAHONTAS The birth of the American nation, the first permanent settlement of English speaking people on the Western Hemisphere, will be celebrated at Jamestown, Virginia, in 1907. It is thought eminently fitting that some memorial should be erected at this time to Pocahontas, the Indian Princess to whom the settlement owed its preservation from famine and from the attacks of the savages.

The officers selected are: President, Miss Lizzie McFall, 1229 Nineteenth street N. W.; Secretary, Miss Mary Decha, 502 E. Street N. W.; Treasurer, Mr. Charles C. Glover, Riggs National Bank; Legal Counsel, Mr. C. C. Calhoun, Colorado Building. Committees are being formed. Some are composed of the descendants of Pocahontas, others of the descendants of the early settlers of Virginia, who are scattered all over the United States, and particularly in the South and West.

The committees will be entrusted the work of collecting the money to erect this long-deferred tribute to the fidelity and devotion of the Indian maiden, but it is hoped that all Americans will be interested, and will contribute generously, for Jamestown was really the cradle of the race of this country.
